

LEGION OPENS ITS DOORS TO YANKS IN VIET

Action Requires Congress O. K.

Washington, Aug. 30 — The
American Legion today voted unanimously to open its mem-bership to Viet Nam veterans and all service men who have served since Aug. 5, 1964.

The resolution was read to delegates at the opening day business meeting of the national convention by Judge Alfonse Wells, Circuit Court of Cook county, Ill., who is chairman of the resolutions committee.

The only opposition came during committee hearings from Legionnaires who argued that the new date should be set by Congress. There was no opposition to the admitting of Viet Nam veterans.

First Day of Retaliation

because that was the day American forces retaliated against torpedo boat attacks on two United States destroyers in the stallations in North Viet Nam.

Before today's action, only veterans who served on or before July 27, 1953, the date of the Korean armistice, were eligible for American Legion membership.

L. Eldon James, the national commander, told the 8,300 delegates in the District of Columbia armory that their action was "one of historical significance in the history of the Legion."

Needs Congress O. K.

Congress must amend the Legion's charter before the resolution becomes official policy, but a number of senators introduced the legislation shortly after the resolution was adopted. Congressional approval is considered a certainty

Legion Ranks Opened to Viet Veterans

Local men are reminded by Dr. S. C. Liedman, commander of the American Legion Post in Morris, that the American Legion membership ranks have been opened to the current generation of Viet Nam veterans.

In quick action by the Congress and President Lyndon B. Johnson, the amendment proposed by the legion's national convention was acted upon and in effect within 48 hours.

The legion's charter is now amended to make eligible the men and women of the armed services who have been honorably discharged who served on active duty from Aug. 5, 1964, until "the cessation of hostilities as determined by the gov-

ernment of the United States."
Other periods of service for American Legion membership are: April 6, 1917 to Nov. 11, 1918 (World War I); Dec. 7, 1941, to Sept. 2, 1945 (World War II); and June 25, 1950, to July 27, 1953 (Korean War).

was adopted, James presented the American Legion distinguished service award to Capt. The August date was selected Roger Donlon, the first American to receive the congressional medal of honor for brav-

ery during battle in Viet Nam, Vice President Humphrey Gulf of Tonkin by bombing told the commander's dinner to-shore batteries and naval in-night that he can "see no imnight that he can "see no immediate end to our struggle in Viet Nam," and "we must be prepared for many hard days ahead." He said that "if we are to remain alive . . . we have no choice but to hold our course and see it thru in Viet Nam."

Legion Admits First Veteran of War in Viet

Washington, Sept. 1 - The American Legion ended its national convention here today by indorsing American policy in Viet Nam and by admitting the first Viet Nam veteran as a member.

One of the last acts of the week-long convention was the swearing in of Gordon Saffold, 23, of Saltville, Va., who spent three years in the army, four months of which were spent in Saigon as a radio operator.

Saffold, who was chosen as the first because he was the first man to apply last night after learning of the Legion action opening membership to Viet Nam veterans, was sworn in a few minutes after President Johnson signed the bill, officially opening the Legion to men who have served since Aug. 5,

Johnson Speaks of Unity

In a White House ceremony, Johnson told 40 Legionnaires that "the struggle for freedom in Viet Nam today is as important as any conflict in which our countrymen have ever engaged."

He said the swift action of Congress in amending the Legion charter after the Legion voted to admit Viet Nam veterans has "made our stand of unity completely clear" to anyone who might question United States determination to remain in Viet Nam.

Among those present for the signing were army Capt. Roger Donlon, the first medal of honor winner in Viet Nam, who attended the Legion convention as an honored guest to receive its highest award, the Legion distinguished service award.

New Chief Elected

Also present were L. Eldon James, last year's Legion commander, and his successor, John E. Davis, former North Dakota governor, who was elected national commander by acclamation a few minutes be-fore the White House cere-

Davis, 53, was an army offi-cer in Europe during World War II and received four battle stars. For his one year as commander, he will receive \$25,000 and an unlimited expense account.

Legislative chairman Neal Young of Aurora reported on the acceptance of Viet Nam veterans to the American Legion and the speed in which the legislation was accomplished. The resolution was passed at the national convention of the American Legion, sent to Congress, passed in the house Wednesday morning, passed by the Senate Wednesday afternoon, and on Thursday, National Command-er Eldon James was asked to be present for the signing of the legislation by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Rehabilitation chairman Ray Accles of Rockford reported that Illinois is the only state to give a bonus to Viet Nam Veterans while conflict is still going on. A bonus of \$100 is paid to all veterans from Illinois, even while still serving, upon application.

So far there have been 12,671 applications for living veterans and 7,948 have been paid.

One thousand dollars is paid to widows or children of any deceased Viet Nam veteran. So far 173 applications for deceased veterans have been made and 137 have been paid.

Field representatives of the Legion have been given cameras and will take pictures of any industry or building flying the American flag daily. The post and the firm or industry will be issued a citation.

After Oct. 10, a letter will be sent to every member of the Legion, containing information on a "For God and Country" bumper sticker and a new prospect card.
