

Parent Code of Conduct

Positive Support and Encouragement:

- **Focus on effort, not just results:** Parents should praise their child's effort and performance, rather than solely focusing on winning or losing.
- **Respectful communication:**
Parents should avoid arguing with or yelling at officials and should address concerns with coaches privately and respectfully.
- **Positive role modeling:**
Parents should be positive role models, demonstrating sportsmanship, courtesy, and respect for all involved.
- **Encouraging all athletes:**
Parents should applaud good plays by both their child's team and the opposing team.
- **Maintaining a positive environment:**
Parents should create a positive and supportive environment for all athletes, free from negativity and criticism.

Respecting Officials and Coaches:

- **Respect for authority:**
Parents should respect the authority of officials and coaches and refrain from questioning their decisions during games.
- **Addressing concerns appropriately:**
If parents have concerns about officiating or coaching, they should address them with the coach at an appropriate time and place, not during the game.
- **Understanding the volunteer role:**
Parents should appreciate the time and effort of volunteer coaches and officials.

Safety and Well-being:

- **Prioritizing safety:**
Parents should ensure a safe environment for all athletes and avoid any actions or behaviors that could endanger them.
- **Avoiding inappropriate behavior:**
Parents should refrain from using profanity, engaging in violence, or using drugs or alcohol at sporting events.
- **Mandatory reporting:**

General Conduct:

- **No coaching from the sidelines:**

Unless a parent is also a designated coach, they should refrain from coaching their child or other players during games or practices.

- **Accepting outcomes:** Parents should accept the results of games with grace and encourage their child to do the same.

Understanding the game: Parents should familiarize themselves with the rules of the game and the policies of the league.
