



The Address by the Hon'ble President of India on the eve of Republic Day was played. This was followed by a short cultural program involving local artist and rendition of patriotic songs by students of Gandharva School of Music, Richmond and a violin recital by Mr. Kamalakiran Vinjamuru.





GOPIO CELEBRATES INDIA'S REPUBLIC DAY VIRTUALLY:

Ranking Democrat Congressman Gregory Meeks, Chairman of House Foreign Relations Committee was the Chief Guest at the celebration of India's 72nd Republic Day, organized by GOPIO New York. Beena Kothari, GOPIO-NY President welcomed the participants from across the globe to the celebration.

Rep. Meeks of New York was introduced by Lal Motwani, Honorary Chairman of GOPIO-NY and former president of NFIA. "He is a true friend of the Indian American community," Mr. Motwani said. Rep. Meeks in his address, said he has known Mr. Motwani for over two decades. While recognizing the contributions of Mr. Lal Motwani and the leaders of the Indian American community, he thanked GOPIO leaders for inviting him to the celebrations of India's Republic Day.









Rep. Meeks pointed to the Bill passed with bipartisan support by the US House of Representatives, that would establish an exchange initiative between the USA and India to study the work and legacies of Mahatma Gandhi and Martin Luther King Jr. On his inaugural address, Indian Consul General Randhir Kumar Jaiswal, greeted the Diaspora in the United States as well as those around the world connected online to the event on the occasion of India's 72nd Republic Day celebration. Calling it an important occasion and a milestone for India and the people of Indian origin, he said, "This is a time when we reflect on the past and the present and ways to go forward." Describing the current period as "difficult times," he referred to the health and the economic challenges India and the world is facing today. He expressed hope that the arrival of the vaccination will help make a new beginning.

NY State Senator Kevin Thomas was introduced by Dr. Thomas Abraham, as a friend and part of the Indian American community. Dr. Abraham conveyed Republic Day greetings from all GOPIO International officers including President Sunny Kulathakal from Bahrain, Executive VP Ishwar Ram Lutchman from South Africa, Vice President Ram Gandhi from the USA and all other International Coordinators from all over the world present at the Zoom celebrations.

Senator Thomas, who is chairman of the Consumer Protection Committee, conveyed his greetings to the Indian Diaspora and read out the Preamble of the Indian Constitution, reminding all of the high ideals of unity and diversity, urging the nation to live up to the high ideals enshrined in the constitution of India. Senator Thomas said that "India is not only an emerging power but today India contributes globally".

Additionally, the statue in Atlanta was visited by vice president Raj Rajdan, Director and former president Subash Rajdan and others.

Mahatma Gandhi, byname of Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, (born October 2, 1869, Porbandar, India—died January 30, 1948, Delhi), was an Indian lawyer, politician, social activist, and writer who became the leader of the nationalist movement against the British rule of India. As such, he came to be considered the father of his country. Gandhi is internationally esteemed for his doctrine of nonviolent protest (satyagraha) to achieve political and social progress and is remembered not only in India but everywhere where Indians are living.












STATUS OF COVID 19, UPDATES - NEW VARIANTS:

The Johns Hopkins Coronavirus Resource Center maintains an ongoing count of the COVID-19 cases and deaths in the United States and worldwide. As of 5:15 p.m. on February 12, 2021, the tally is:

Total cases worldwide: 108,054,984 (up from 107,631,068 Thursday) Total deaths worldwide: 2,378,143 (up from 2,362,735 Thursday)

Total cases in the United States: 27,464,442 (up from 27,356,234 Thursday) Total deaths in the United States: 479,949 (up from 474,198 Thursday)

Total recovered: 60,505,759 (up from 60,197,581 Thursday)



President Biden has been putting lot of emphasis on controlling the spread and reviving the economy. The administration is credited for purchasing 200 million more doses of COVID -19 vaccines. Both leading vaccine pharma, Pfizer and Moderna are providing 100 million and it is believed that 300 million Americans will be vaccinated by the end of July.

The number of coronavirus cases reported from India stood at 1,08,98,743 at the time of writing this newsletter, with the death toll at 1,57,028. India seems to be getting better in controlling the spread of virus.

Wall Street reported that deaths are declining recently, however, variants of the CORONA 19 virus have happened and it is found in England, Brazil, and South Africa. The South African variant has been found in California, North Carolina, Illinois, and Washington, DC. The CDC endorses double-masking for maximum protection. However, their message also has some positive lining. It says that some variants can spread and become predominant while others subside. Recently, Eli Lilly's combination antibody therapy to fight COVID-19 has been granted emergency use authorization in the United States and Johnson and Johnson has also requested FDA approval for their vaccine for emergency use. Now there are therapeutics available and the future appears to be little brighter.

GOPIO ORGANIZES A BOOK DISCUSSION:

Dr. Thomas Abraham and Dr. Neerja Arun Gupta moderated the discussion of the book authored by Dr. Aravind Panagariya "New India – Reclaiming the past Glory." The talk was organized by GOPIO) on zoom application on Saturday, January 23, 2021.



Dr. Aravind Panagariya shared with the attendees from across the world on ways India can regain the lost glory." Taking the audience to the glorious days of India, the scholar said, India accounted for 38% of the total world economy in the first millennium and it continued to grow in the second millennium. In the 17th century, India accounted for 20% of world's total GDP, with India and China accounting for 50% of total world

economy. With the arrival of British rule, India began to lose its place in world with the Western nations growing at a faster pace while India's economy stayed stagnant. In 1947, when India got Independence from Britain, India's economy was mere 3% of the total world GDP, he pointed out.

"With a GDP that just reached \$2.6 trillion, India is poised to become the world's third largest economy in less than a decade," Aravind Panagariya told an audience consisting of people from around the world. Panagariya said, in his new book, he provided the roadmap for India on ways to go forward.

- 1. Externally, India needs to be more open. Modi govt has dome some changes. But on external trade, we need to be more open. 2. Labor reforms have been "almost done" both at the federal and state levels. Currently, the right to terminate workers has been delegated to the states, and now only those companies with over 300 laborers can use the hire and fire policy.
- 3. Land has largely remained untouched. Urban planning has remained static. Conversion of land from agriculture to industry is the need of the hour.
- 4. India's financial system needs to be fixed.
- 5. Privatization of several government sectors needs to be implemented for more efficiency.

CELEBRATION OF THE LIFE OF NETAJI SUBHASH CHANDDRA BOSE ON HIS 150TH BIRTH ANNIVERSARY – OBSERVED IN THE NATIONS CAPITAL:

The National Council of Asian Indian Associations (NCAIA) National group (Chicago) and the local affiliate organized virtually "Parakram Divas" on Saturday February 13, 2021. This was an opportunity to pay tribute to India's beloved son. Attending the event were family members of Neta ji's family, daughter by video, his grand-nephew, and associates as well as the community affairs minister from the Indian Embassy, Anurag Kumar along with officers of NCAIA and local leaders.
