To represent the supernatural beings, but also to keep evil spirits away, people hollowed out turnips and other vegetables, carved them with scary faces and used them as lanterns.



History has recorded well its origin and how Irishimmigrant brought this tradition with them when they came to America in the 19th century. Since pumpkins were easier to find and better suited for carving, the immigrants started using pumpkins instead of turnips. Children want to be treated or they would trick you to doing something funny or bad. Mostly they get treated with sweets.

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Why are carved pumpkins called "Jack-o'-lantern"? The term "jack-o'-lantern" (Jack of the lantern) is derived from the old Irish legend of Stingy Jack. According to the legend, Stingy Jack was an Irish blacksmith who loved to drink and also to deceive people. One version of the legend says that Stingy Jack was supposed to die on All Hallows Eve. Satan came to take Jack's soul, but Jack asked him for a favor. Before dying, he wanted to eat an apple. The devil climbed up an apple tree. But Jack carved a cross in the bark and the devil got trapped. In order to be free again, Satan promised Jack not to take his soul. When Jack dies, he can't go to heaven because of his sins. But he can't go to hell either, because the devil promised not to take his soul. Therefore, Jack has to wander the Earth, searching for a resting place. The devil gives him a burning piece of coal to lighten his path. Jack keeps the coal in a hollowed-out turnip that he uses as a lamp. That is why these Halloween "lamps" are called "jack-o'-lantern". PRIME MINISTER OF INDIA ACCOMPLISHES HIS MISSION TO CONVINCE ITS ROLE IN WORLD ECONOMICS AND POLITICS ESPECIALLY IN INDO-PACIFIC REGION:

Prime Minister of India, Narendra Modi Ji, paid a short visit to the United States, to attend the Quad Summit, at the White House. This summit was hosted by the president of the United States, Joe Biden. Prime Minister Modi also met with the Vice-President Kamala Harris in another meeting and discussed some issues and challenges faced by India internally. Modi ji also traveled to New York and addressed the United Nations General Assembly before returning to India.



He had traveled to the States in 2014 first time, then second time in 2017, and during this time which is his third visit, he met with CEOs of multi-national companies with a goal of convincing and encouraging them to invest and increase their presence in India. The same goal permeated in his talks with his counterparts from Australia and Japan.

The press has called Prime Minister's visit as successful. He was also a recipient of 157 artifacts which he traveled with on his return to India. Out of these 157 artifacts, 71 were cited as of cultural nature, there were 60 figurines related to Hinduism, 16 to Buddhism, and 9 to Jainism, and included was also an 8.5 cm tall exquisite bronze Nataraja from the 12th century.



REMEMBERING INDER SINGH, A FAMILY MAN, A COMMUNITY WORKER, AND PAST PRESIDENT OF NFIA FROM 1988-1992 AND CHAIRMAN FROM1992-1996 ON HIS SECOND DEATH **ANNIVERSARY:**



Inder Singh lived in Los Angeles, CA for a long time. He is very fondly remembered by his family, friends, and fraternity of NFIA as well as by GOPIO, another association that he was Chairman President from 2004-2009. Upon retiring from the Los Angeles County, he devoted most of his time doing community work and writing about Indian diaspora.

Inder Singh was born on October 1, 1932 and died on September 27, 2019. His community involvement started when he worked for the Los Angeles County and developed good relations with the Member of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, Michael D. Antonovich. He would secure county grounds to celebrate India Independence Day.

To this event many important celebrities from politics, academia, and culture were invited and outdoor booths were constructed

for merchants to showcase their wares and for artists to show their talents in performing arts. This event became so popular that thousands of people would participate each year and it brought many merchants and performers together for this great celebration.

This started in 1981, when he became the founding president of the Federation of Indian American Associations (FIA) of Southern California and got another community leader, later president and chairman of NFIA, Dr. Rajen Anand established as the secretary of the association. Mr. Singh never stopped doing community work until it became difficult for him to drive distances due to health reasons and then he curtailed his activities but never stopped completely. Mr. Singh founded the Indian American Heritage Foundation (IAHF), a society that celebrates and honors academic excellence and achievements of children of Indian origin at a later date. He is remembered by those students who received awards each year.



Pfizer has filed emergency use of vaccine for children and the sad part of the pandemic is that there are over 1200 children who have lost their prime caretakers due to spread of this virus. Pfizer and BionNTech said on Thursday that they are seeking U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) emergency use authorization for their coronavirus vaccine for children ages 5 to 11, as it was reported by the CNN.

Due to holiday season upon us, travel, social gatherings, and festivals are ensuing this month. All healthcare agencies are suggesting precautions and use of masks for more time until such times when the numbers will get smaller.

Healthcare agencies and Internet blogging sites have been mentioning that Pediatric infections continue to be high. The number of new child COVID-19 cases remains exceptionally high. Latest figures from the American

Academy of Pediatrics show that as of September 30, nearly 5.9 million children have tested positive for COVID-19 since the onset of the pandemic. Over 173,000 cases were added the past week, with nearly 850,000 child cases added over the past four weeks. As has been the trend since late August, children accounted for just over a quarter of reported weekly COVID-19 cases. Kids, however, are seldom hospitalized and make up less than 1 percent of COVID-19 deaths.
