#### Scent of a Woman (Profumo di donna)

By Dino Risi (1973) Comedy/drama, 1 hour and 46 minutes In Italian with English subtitles

Plot: An army cadet accompanies an irascible, blind captain on a week-long trip from Turin to Naples. The captain, Fausto, who wants no pity, brooks no disagreement, and charges into every situation, nicknames the youth Ciccio ("Babyfat"), and spends the next few days ordering him about and generally behaving badly in public. In Rome, Fausto summons a priest to ask for his blessing; in Naples, where Fausto joins a blind lieutenant for drinking and revelry, the two soldiers talk quietly and seriously about "going through with it." Also, in Naples, is Sara, in love with Fausto, but treated cruelly by him. What do the blind soldiers plan? Can Sara soften Fausto's hardened heart?

#### MAFIA, MEDIA, AND ITALIAN AMERICANS

The earliest presence of organized crime surfaces in Marion Heights, Pennsylvania in 1907, when 14 members of the Black Hand are arrested. A short time after, street gangs in major cities begin their transformation into structured crime syndicates and by the end of WWII and late 1950s Italian mafia groups dominate the underworld. By the 1960s and 1970s, Hollywood responded and contributed to this phenomenon by producing successful Italian mafia films over several decades. Italian Americans begin to romanticize and identify with "the life" of being Italian American or in some cases an Italian Gangster. These movies influenced second and third generation Italian Americans to learn, accept and reinforce the Hollywood "Italian gangster persona". The purpose of this presentation is to analyze how mafia films influence the behavioral patterns, commodification, and institutional perceptions of Italian Americans, as they transition from urban "Little Italy" to suburbia.

Rocco Mesiti is a professor of Italian Culture in the College of Arts and Science at Western New England University and also a professor of the university's summer program in Sorrento Italy at the Sant'Anna Institute. Dr. Mesiti is an alumnus of the University of Hartford where he earned a doctoral degree in Cultural Intelligence. Also, he is an Alumnus of the University of Massachusetts where he received a Master of Arts and a Bachelor of Arts in Italian Language and Culture. Currently, Dr. Mesiti also produces an Italian radio program, Dolce Vita Radio, on WTCC 90.7 FM, now in its 27th year. Dr. Mesiti broadcasts from Spring-field Technical Community College every Sunday from 11am to 1pm.

With great pleasure, the ICC presents an afternoon with columnist Barbara Bernard.

Among her many accomplishments, Barbara has been recognized for her work on behalf of senior citizens in Holyoke where she settled 60 years ago with her late husband, George, and raised their family. She founded the nation's first independent Golden Age Club there in 1950 with \$100 in winnings from the New York City radio quiz show, 'Strike It Rich'. The club attracted 100 members the first month, and 1,000 by the end of the first year. She was also the honorary chairman of funding for the modern Holyoke Senior Center.

In 2009, the Valley Press Club had voted unanimously to present its Lifetime Achievement Award to Barbara. She was the first female to receive the award.

Her journalism career spans six decades and four media, including radio, television, the Internet and print as a columnist for *The Republican*.

Barbara is a strong supporter of the Majestic Theater and annually sponsors a show there.

Among the honors conferred upon her were: the Citizenship awards from the Holyoke St. Patrick Parade Committee, the Holyoke Rotary Club and the Holyoke Italian Progressive Society.

Barbara also received the Pynchon Award, which is presented to individuals who have shown unusual dedication to improving the quality of life in Western Massachusetts. She is first Holyoke person to be so awarded.
