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DAMAGE IN SAN LUIS KEY.

The River Cuts Through Improved Tracts—Tamecula Canyon.

Supervisor Rainbow, who left Wednesday afternoon by the train, expecting to get home to Vallecitas, by driving up the San Luis Rey from Oceanside, returned to the city yesterday. He says he got to Mount Fairview, within twelve miles of home, and then gave it up for a bad job. He says from what he saw and was told, he is convinced that the flood was the greatest in the San Luis Rey valley since 1882, if not the greatest in the history of the country. All the bridges are gone, and the river has made new channels right through improved tracts, doing incalculable damage. One man, who had just bought and paid for an unimproved tract of forty acres, has but two or three acres of it left, a fractional part of which lies on each side of the San Luis Rey river, which, before the flood flowed several hundred yards away.

The Tamecula canyon route, Mr. Rainbow says, is entirely destroyed from Fallbrook to De Luz, and there is very little of the road left between De Luz and the ocean. Above Fallbrook nothing is known of the condition of the road, as it is all under water and no one can get up the canyon.
