



Sunday's Reflection

"[God] put all things beneath [Christ's] feet and gave him as head over all things to the church, which is his body, the fullness of the one who fills all things . . ." This is how today's Second Reading summarizes the meaning of this feast of the Ascension.

Theologians explain this scripture in various but similar ways: The Ascension means the final victory of Christ, the completion of his work, his becoming Lord and king over all people, his final exaltation and glorification. Their point is that even after the resurrection from the dead, Christ is not formally the victorious Savior of all, he is not yet glorified as their Messiah. Peter, the apostle, expresses all this quite simply: "God has made him both Lord and Messiah, this Jesus whom you crucified" (Acts 2:36). To express this another way: We Christians are all Jesus people; on this day he becomes formally our Lord; on this day we rejoice in his victory, the victory of our only Savior and Lord.

To say this in a more personal way for us . . . The victory of Christ that we celebrate today is what makes our Christian faith *unique* among all religions. All other religions, no matter how valid their starting point and their value as a true means of opening hearts to God, must enable believers to ultimately pass through the zero point of death. That is, if any faith does not lead to a hope beyond death, it is not worth spending one's whole life on. But it is Jesus alone, who accomplished such a successful transition to life with God and so gave evidence of our hope. So our Christian faith is unique among all faiths because of Christ's victory over death that we celebrate today.

In today's Gospel, Luke gives us Jesus' final words to his disciples: ". . . I am sending the promise of my Father upon you; but stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high." What did Jesus mean by "the promise of my Father"? In Luke's second book, the Acts of the Apostles, he explains in Jesus' words, ". . . wait for 'the promise of the Father about which you have heard me speak . . . you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.'" Then Luke recounts the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. What Luke wants us to learn from all this is that the era of Jesus ends with the Ascension; the historical presence of Jesus on earth and his redeeming death establishes our faith as real and historical. But now as Jesus departs, God knows that Christians of all time need more than a memory, more than some ancient history. So God begins the new era by sending the Holy Spirit on all believers. This new era, which had been historically founded on the real history of Jesus our Savior, now has the Spirit of Jesus alive in each one of us individually until the end of time. Next Sunday we will celebrate the Feast of Pentecost, the coming of the Spirit of Jesus. This Holy Spirit continues the work of Jesus taught us and by being with us always to make us true disciples of Jesus.

Dios puso todas las cosas bajo los pies de Cristo y lo entregó como cabeza sobre todas las cosas a la Iglesia, que es su cuerpo, la plenitud de Aquel que llena todas las cosas . . ." Así resume la segunda lectura de hoy el significado de la fiesta de la Ascensión.

Los teólogos explican esta escritura de maneras diversas pero similares: La Ascensión significa la victoria final de Cristo, la culminación de su obra, su conversión en Señor y Rey de todos los hombres, su exaltación y glorificación definitivas. Su punto es que incluso después de la resurrección de entre los muertos, Cristo no es formalmente el victorioso Salvador de todos, aún no está glorificado como su Mesías. Pedro, el apóstol, expresa todo esto con bastante sencillez: «Dios le ha hecho Señor y Mesías, a este Jesús a quien vosotros crucificasteis» (Hechos 2:36). Para expresarlo de otra manera: Todos los cristianos somos personas de Jesús; en este día se convierte formalmente en nuestro Señor; en este día nos alegramos de su victoria, la victoria de nuestro único Salvador y Señor.

Para decirlo de un modo más personal para nosotros. . . La victoria de Cristo que celebramos hoy es lo que hace que nuestra fe cristiana sea única entre todas las religiones. Todas las demás religiones, por muy válido que sea su punto de partida y su valor como verdadero medio para abrir los corazones a Dios, deben permitir a los creyentes atravesar en última instancia el punto cero de la muerte. Es decir, si alguna fe no conduce a una esperanza más allá

Pero es Jesús el único que logró una transición tan exitosa a la vida con Dios y así dio testimonio de nuestra esperanza. Así pues, nuestra fe cristiana es única entre todas las creencias por la victoria de Cristo sobre la muerte que celebramos hoy.

En el Evangelio de hoy, Lucas nos ofrece las últimas palabras de Jesús a sus discípulos: ". . . Yo envío sobre vosotros la promesa de mi Padre; pero quedaos en la ciudad hasta que seáis revestidos de poder desde lo alto." ¿Qué quería decir Jesús con «la promesa de mi Padre»? En el segundo libro de Lucas, los Hechos de los Apóstoles, se explica con las palabras de Jesús: «

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


In today's first reading, we learn that Jesus "gave instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen."

Throughout the Gospels, we have been given instructions about how to be good stewards of God's gifts. Do you continue to seek Christ's guidance every day on how to be a good steward?


