

VOLUNTEER CORNER

Trail Care—Fall Work Day

As mentioned in the October issue of The Pinchot Eagle, the Friends hosted the third and final Trail Care Work Day of 2024 on October 5th. Nine volunteers contributed approximately thirty-five service hours of work, including the prestaging of work material. The work focused on adding stone for trail build-up, establishing appropriate drainage slopes, and creating "mattresses" and crossover dips for drainage. The repairs will help

to move the flow of water off the trail. These long-term improvements should result in less erosion, helping to stabilize wet areas. In addition, volunteers trimmed back two species of invasive plants that grow heavily in this area: Autumn Olive and Asian Bittersweet.


Vernal Pool Monitoring

Pinchot Park is a wet place in the spring, as anyone who walks the trails knows very well. A benefit to all the wet clay soils in the park is that they support the formation of little wetlands known as **vernal pools**. Vernal pools are unique because they dry up partly or completely each year in mid to late summer and refill over the winter with snowmelt and rain. The pools reach their maximum size in spring, and for a few months, they are packed full of life until the dry phase comes around again.


Small HOBO light-temperature sensors were installed in the 16 vernal pool basins in the park.






The Friends of Pinchot have been working with partners to monitor the health of these vernal pools. One of the most important qualities of a vernal pool is its hydroperiod, which includes the depth of the pool basin, and the timing and duration of its dry phase. Getting consistent information on hydroperiods can be challenging and time consuming, but technology can help. In 2022, the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy (WPC) obtained a Healing the Planet grant from Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful and the Giant Company. WPC used funds from this and matching grants to purchase the supplies needed to set up eight photo and water depth monitoring stations where park visitors can document seasonal changes and water depths of the pools. Water tem-

perature and light sensors were also installed in all 16 vernal pool basins in the park, in order to obtain frequent and consistent hydrological information. These sensors were installed in October of 2023 and have been recording data for nearly a year. In 2020, WPC tested a similar sensor (recording water temperature only) in four vernal pools, providing an additional four years of temperature data for those four pools. This past summer and fall, as the pool levels approached their lowest levels, volunteers visited the pools to document the start of the dry phase and to retrieve the sensor data. Sensor data has been retrieved from 6 of the 16 pool basins so far. Below are some results from this exciting new phase of WPC's monitoring!





Vernal Pools—continued

GRAPH INTERPRETATION...

Graph 1 shows temperature data for Toilet Bowl Pool, which was so named because of a collection of porcelain toilets that had been dumped there decades ago. These toilets were dug out and removed in 2016, but the name 'Toilet Bowl' stuck to this otherwise lovely vernal pool. This pool has one of the temperature-only sensors, which has been taking temperature readings every

four hours for the past four years. The overall undulating shape of graph shows the gradual rise and fall of temperature with the seasons. The jaggedness of the line reflects what is happening with the water levels. A fully flooded pool has small changes in the water temperature between night and day and the graph line makes small jumps. A pool with very little water

will warm and cool quickly during the day, creating bigger bumps in the line. The temperature in a dry basin fluctuates the most, because measurements basically reflect the *air* temperature, which has the biggest change between day and night. A period of low/no water for this pool from mid-June through mid-December of 2023 is circled in red.



Graph 2 shows the water depth data collected for Gray Treefrog Pool over the past year. This pool was named for the abundance of gray treefrogs that call there in the spring and summer. People who have attended vernal pool walks at Pinchot are familiar with this wetland located along Lakeside Trail near the campground. It has a wooden platform along the edge that allows visitors to view the pool without disturbing it. Gray Treefrog is one of eight vernal pools in the park that are easily accessible by trails—and have photo and water depth stations. These stations allow trained volunteers and park visitors to collect photos and water depth readings and submit them to websites where they are made publicly available.

Using the data citizen scientists have collected, we can map out important moments in the life of the pool, such as when it dries and when it refills. Graph 2 has six important dates highlighted in yellow, showing when the pool filled around the new year, then dried up by the

end of June, then refilled around August 9 with the heavy rains of Hurricane Debby, then dried down again one month later.

Overall, the water temperature and light measurements produce a uniform and consistent set of data, because we get readings every 4 hours of every day. The sensor data is working well for identifying periods of low/no water in the pool basins, based on

the jaggedness of the line forming the graph. The Chronolog photos and CrowdHydrology data collected by citizen scientists correlates nicely with the sensor data and helps confirm and clarify the readings we are getting from the sensors.

Pinchotween






