## 2025 SLA Leadership Update

After a cold and rainy spring, the summer of 2025 has finally arrived and we have a full summer of events planned to bring the Sunset Lake community together. As with past years, we will have morning paddles, monthly “light up the night” firepits with evening paddles during the warmer months, and monthly hikes throughout the year. We will also have our 4th annual “Sunset Lake in Lights” event and of course our annual meeting in July. This year, due to waning participation in our boat parade, we are going to try something new and instead we will have a musicfest & BBQ with live bands in early August. We hope to see you at one or more of these events!

Of course, we also stay vigilant in our core mission of keeping Sunset Lake healthy with regular water testing throughout the warmer months and invasive species monitoring and mitigation. After many years of mitigation, we are almost rid of shoreline invasives Common Reed (Phragmites) and Purple Loosestrife. This year, thanks to the additional donations from our Weed Watcher and Lake Leader members, we have contracted Pondweed Pursuits, LLC to perform our first professional aquatic plant survey since 2021. These surveys are especially important since the 2021 survey identified the presence of Common Reed on four locations of our shores. While our water testing continues to show that Sunset Lake is quite healthy, phosphorus levels are still a concern and NHDES reported the 1st ever cyanobacteria bloom on June 3rd of this year at the Hampstead Town Beach, which you can read more about in this issue. We hope that you will join us in proactively looking after the health of the lake and educating others in the importance of doing the same!

Thanks as always to our members and we look forward to seeing you out on and around the lake and at our annual meeting!

*Organic, Non-toxic Landscaping for a Better Environment*

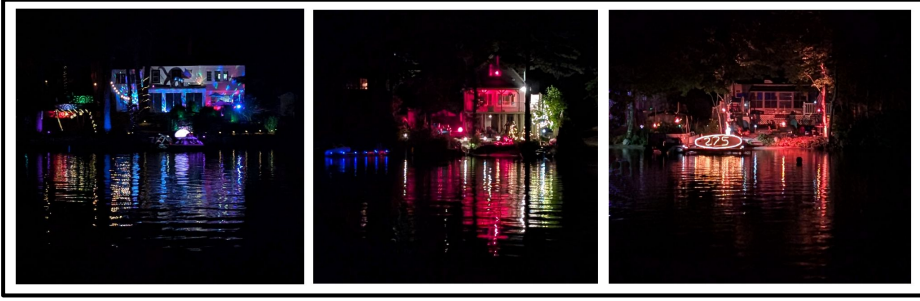

# Fireworks and New Hampshire's Lakes

The site and sound of fireworks is a sure sign of summer in the U.S.A., especially around the lakes of New Hampshire. While we almost all enjoy the beauty of fireworks, it is important to know the negative impact they can have on our lakes and groundwater and take appropriate precautions to minimize these impacts.

Fireworks are made with various chemicals and heavy metals that are directly deposited into our lake and can also contaminate our groundwater, causing concern for human health and aquatic life. One of these chemicals is Perchlorate which assists in the propulsion of fireworks. This chemical which has been found in drinking water wells can disrupt normal functioning of the thyroid glands in humans and wildlife. Fireworks can also contain nutrients (phosphorus and nitrogen compounds) that contribute to algal and plant growth in lakes.

If you still decide to launch fireworks near the lake, avoid launching them from bare soil or sand to minimize potential runoff into the lake. Launch them at a steep angle that promotes maximum height and complete ignition and combustion. Clean up any debris from the water and shore by hand and don't use tools to rake the shorefront as this can disturb the sediment and add nutrients into the water, potentially fueling harmful blue-green algae blooms. # 2025 Cyanobacteria Bloom on Sunset Lake

As the number of cyanobacteria blooms have increased in New Hampshire over the past few years, we have been quite lucky on Sunset Lake since we had never had a confirmed bloom on our lake. Unfortunately, that all changed on June 3, 2025 when NHDES tested for and confirmed the first bloom at the Hampstead Town Beach on Sunset Lake as shown in the image to the right.



The bloom has now passed (as of June 16th), but we received a lot of questions regarding the bloom so we felt it best to create this blog post to try to address many questions that people have had about blooms since we very likely will have more of them in the future.

We recommend watching this [6 1/2 minute NHDES Cyanobacteria Risk Assessment video](#) for a very good overview of cyanobacteria blooms.

## FAQs:

**Q:** When there is a cyanobacteria bloom, is the entire lake unsafe?

**A:** No. Cyanobacteria blooms are usually very localized and it is only unsafe to enter the water where the bloom is present. It is perfectly safe to go in the water wherever a bloom isn't present. Unfortunately, blooms can dissipate and re-form and also move around the lake due to wind, currents, and boat wakes. Therefore, all people entering the water should be familiar with what cyanobacteria blooms look like and should not enter the water if they see what might be a bloom..

**Q:** How long does a bloom last?

**A:** All blooms are different, so it is impossible to say. Most last a week or less but in severe cases, they can last an entire summer. You should always check the NHDES Healthy Swimming Mapper for the latest information about blooms.

**Q:** Does the Sunset Lake Association test for cyanobacteria blooms?

**A:** No, the SLA does not have this capability, only NHDES does. If you see something that you think may be a cyanobacteria bloom, please report it using the NHDES Cyanobacteria Bloom Report Form so that they can evaluate and possibly test the area to confirm whether or not it is a bloom.

**Q:** Are the green "clouds" of algae in the water cyanobacteria blooms?

**A:** Usually not. Those clouds are usually [filamentous algae](#) which are harmless to humans and animals. This year (2025), we have seen a lot more filamentous algae in the lake. This video from NHDES has a [good overview of what blooms can look like starting at time 0:36](#) and has a good overview of other [things that are not harmful and are mistaken for cyanobacteria blooms starting at time 3:34](#)

**Q:** What can I do to help reduce or eliminate cyanobacteria blooms?

**A:** Cyanobacteria is naturally occurring and is in all water bodies. However, cyanobacteria blooms are primarily caused by warm temperatures, sunlight, and excess nutrients in a lake, specifically phosphorus and nitrogen. While we cannot control the temperatures and sunlight, we can help to reduce the amount of nutrients in the lake. Specifically, we ask that all residents living near the lake follow our [recommendations for Healthy Lakeshore Living](#), use good [Lakeside Landscaping techniques](#), and take part in the [NH Lakes LakeSmart Lake-Friendly Living Program](#).

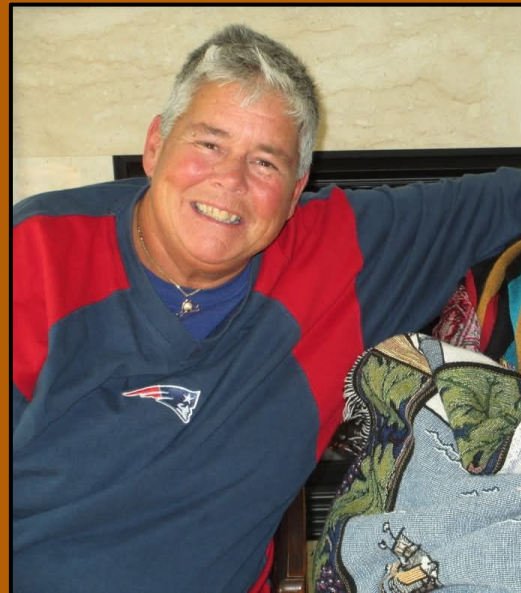
## SLA Leadership Corner

# Sunset Lake History - District 1 & Camp Tel Noar

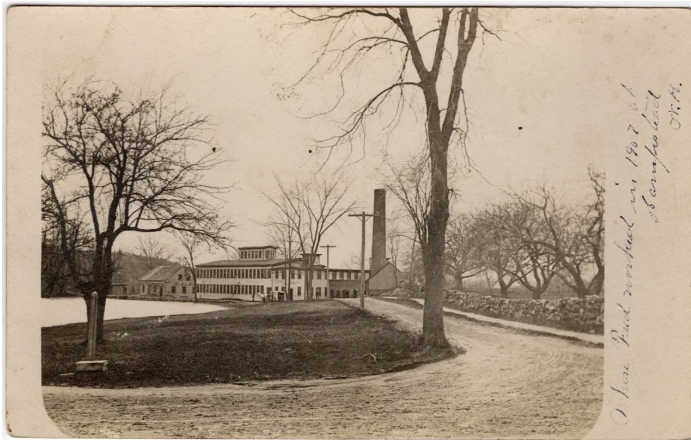
District 1 includes Camp Tel Noar and the Cecil and Sunset Avenue neighborhoods, but this area was originally a much larger farmstead containing 100 acres that spanned between Sunset Lake/Wash Pond and Island Pond. This location was one of the earliest settled in Hampstead due to the natural water flow between Wash Pond and Island Pond, with ownership of a water powered mill in the area of Mills Shore Drive exchanging hands as early as 1739.

Colonel Benjamin Emerson Jr., a Revolutionary War soldier and 3rd generation Hampstead resident born at the family home on Stage Road, bought the farmland with an existing house and barn in 1777. His family later built the pictured farmhouse in the mid-1800's. Unfortunately, the farmhouse burned down in 1959 when it was an administration building for Camp Tel Noar, but you can still see the same stone walls at the main entrance to Camp Tel Noar on Main Street. The Emerson family not only operated the mill on their property, but also boarded tourists who could view the lake from a glass cupola on the top of a barn and soak in the "medicinal mineral springs" on the 150' long rock juddy that is still present under the water.



Emerson's two sons Benjamin Dudley and Frederick were instrumental in education in Hampstead and the early U.S.A. writing early spelling and arithmetic books. Benjamin Dudley was the founder of Hampstead High School (today's Hampstead Town Hall) for which he specified complete details in his will.

Interestingly, the next owner of the farmstead Dr. Josiah C. Eastman, a surgeon in the Civil War, was instrumental in helping to build and set up the new high school. He was a prominent doctor and politician at the local, regional, and national level and was even one of only 3 representatives at the international congress in Philadelphia. In 1849, he was instrumental in introducing legislation that established the public library system in New Hampshire and in the same year, helped to establish the Hampstead Public Library, originally housed in a single room in the brick house at 48 Main Street.



While there were numerous different types of small mills on the stream on Mills Shore Drive over the years, in the late 1800's Dr. Eastman leased some of the land to William A. Emerson who built the 2 story shoe factory shown in this photo which was the largest employer of residents of Hampstead. The factory operated as a shoe factory until the late 1930's, then as a poultry factory into the 1940's and was vacant when it was owned by the town and mysteriously burned down in 1962.

The Mills family acquired the farm in 1916 and operated it as a dairy farm. From 1926-1941, they subdivided the land selling off parcels on Mills Shore Drive and the land that became the Sunset

And Cecil Avenue neighborhoods. They also sold land to Levi Duston who operated an ice house on the waterfront from 1938-1950.

In 1945, the remaining farmstead was sold to Eli & Bessie Cohen, founders of Cohen Camps originally for young adults, but later for teens and children. Camp Tel Noar has been an integral part of Hampstead ever since and is celebrating their 80th year this summer; congratulations!
