Stripping Paint from an old Corvette.

Preparing a C1 Corvette for a complete paint job is a daunting undertaking. It is not for the faint of heart. But to achieve a show quality finish there are no real shortcuts. At the assembly plant the body was painted before it was installed onto the chassis. Therefore, it's best to separate the body from the frame for a total restoration.

This is the point that I am at on my current restoration project, a 1958 Fuelie. I will be lifting the body from the chassis in the near future. This is how I got here.

First, the car must be completely disassembled. Remove the power train. Remove the interior. Remove the folding top. Remove the chassis components that enter the cockpit, e.g. wiring harness, brake cables, fuel tank, mechanical linkages, windshield, bumpers and trim. Photograph, label and bag EVERTHING. Then when you think you're done, remove some more!

And finally, remove the paint from the body. There are several methods for paint removal, sanding, abrasive blasting or chemical stripping. All are dirty and time consuming. I chose to chemically strip my car.

To chemically strip an old Corvette the stripper MUST be formulated for fiberglass. Do not use furniture stripper. It will affect the resin and ruin the fiberglass. I used Klean-Strip Aircraft Stripper for Fiberglass. It contains Methylene Chloride. It is toxic and the fumes are dangerous. But it does work well. The EPA has removed this type of stripper from the market. Klean-Strip offers a replacement product but I have not tried it.

Work outdoors. Wear protective gloves and safety glasses. Work small areas of approximately 2 square feet at a time. Apply stripper to the body with a cheap paint brush. Allow time for the stripper to work. In about fifteen minutes the paint will soften and rise and crinkle. Using a plastic Bondo spreader, scrape the paint from the car. Wipe the residue from the scrapper with old newspaper. The residue will dry out on the newspaper in a few hours. Then dispose of it properly. Wash the area with clear water which will neutralize the stripper.

My car had at least two coats of paint and primer. It required several applications to remove all the paint and primer down to the fiberglass. The factory primer was the most difficult to remove. I used Scotch-Brite scouring pads (synthetic steel wool) to scrub off the last layers of stripper and primer. I rinsed off the residue with water and then I deep cleaned the bare fiberglass with lacquer thinner on a clean rag. This is the most important step because all traces of the paint stripper must be removed to prevent contamination under the new paint.

.Not only must the outside of the car be stripped clean but also the interior, engine bay, trunk and the convertible top compartment must be cleaned. It's not a one weekend job.

Bare fiberglass reveals any flaws or previous repairs that must be corrected. My car required repairs on both front fenders at the wheel openings which is a fragile area on all C1 Corvettes. I repaired every crack and flaw I could find. Fortunately my car body is in exceptionally good shape. Hinges, latches and mounting brackets that were installed at the factory before painting are reinstalled so that they will get the proper overspray just like from the factory. The next step is to dry fit the doors and the hood and trunk and the trim to check the fit and the gaps.

When all is satisfactory, the body will be lifted from the chassis and set on the same body dolly that was used on my brother's 1958. Then it will be off for primer and paint. And simultaneously the chassis will be disassembled and restored. The running gear will be installed and the interior and various systems will be repaired for installation.


When the body is finished it will be dropped (how I hate that term) on the chassis.






