

Let's Get Technical

C1 Valve Covers for the V8 by Jim Cianciolo

I am currently restoring two 1958 fuel injected Corvettes. One belongs to my brother John and the other belongs to me. While prepping John's engine I realized that his valve covers looked different than mine. So off I went to the NCRS Corvette Technical Information Manual and Judging Guide for some clarification. As with many things Corvette, Chevrolet made numerous changes in valve cover design throughout production of the C1.

In 1955 Chevrolet introduced the small block V8. Most 1955 Corvettes had the V8 which came with chrome plated stamped steel valve covers. In 1956 through 1962 all base engines (the lowest horse power) had stamped steel valve covers. They contained "Chevrolet" embossed across the top and were painted engine orange. The 1962 stamped steel cover is a different design to accommodate the new 327 ci engine. All optional horse power engines were equipped with die-cast aluminum valve covers with "Corvette" cast across the top. All valve covers had a water slide decal denoting the horse power rating. This decal is positioned on the out board side of the right cover.



Another big distinction between valve covers is the alignment of the bolt holes that attach the cover to the cylinder head. Early cars have staggered bolt holes but in late 1959 production, Chevrolet aligned the holes to straight across. Thus these covers are often referred to as <u>staggered</u> or <u>straight aligned</u> valve covers.

The stamped steel covers were painted while on the engine. They were bolted in place with four Philips head machine screws with special oval shaped washers. The covers used on Corvettes have steep vertical ends. Passenger car valve covers have sloped ends and are incorrect for Corvettes. There are two small steel clips spot welded on the inboard side of the left valve cover for holding thetemperature sender wire from the sender to the temp gauge on the instrument panel.



The first cast aluminum covers were introduced in 1956 and used through the 1957 model year. The raw aluminum casting has a somewhat dull finish and may show some spots of discoloration or minor casting flaws. They have nine longitudinal ribs.

The center ribs do not run continuously across the cover to allow for the **"Corvette"** script in the center. The script is only about 1/32" tall, thus they are often referred as <u>nine fin low script</u>.

In 1958 the aluminum valve cover was redesigned with seven fins. It is assumed that this was to provide more clearance for the new Rochester fuel injection system. The inside edge of each cover was notched in two places to allow a relief for the intake manifold port clearance. The **"Corvette"** script remained at 1/32". Therefore this cover is referred to as the seven fin low script.

The 1959 valve cover was changed again. It still had the seven fins but the **Corvette** script was made taller to about 1/8" to make the script stand out and is referred to as the <u>seven fin high script</u>. This is the valve covers my brother had for his car. I had the seven fin low script and that's when I referred to my TIMJG manual. I was able to purchase a nice set of correct 1958 low script covers for his car at a local swap meet.



But Chevy wasn't done yet. In late June of 1959, they changed to the straight aligned bolt hole heads and valve covers. This valve cover became the standard cover from 1960 through 1967.

Let's Get Technical Continued



Sometime in 1966, the die-casting mold was damaged and repaired. The repair would leave a casting flaw mark across the cover running through the letter "o" in the "Corvette" script. This valve cover should be considered as not factory correct for a C1 Corvette. Correct valve covers should be the right configuration for the car. They should not be polished or coated or painted.

I presented this information at our February chapter meeting. I hope you found this information helpful. This article is not all encopassing. There is always more information both known and still unknown. If you're restor ing or judging a car always refer to the NCRS Corvette Technical Information Manual and Judging Guide for the most accurate information.


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
