# A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR



Dear Parish Family,

In a time of difficulty and confusion, it is important never to lose sight of the power of God at work in our midst. Reading in the 13th chapter of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus is trying to teach us what His kingdom is like. He tells us that the Kingdom is like weeds growing among wheat.

Weeds are a constant battle for the gardener. Weeds seem to grow with greater strength than the good plants around them. and they seems to rob nutrients and water, tak-

ing, taking, taking, and never bearing fruits of any kind. Weeds can also seem to overshadow the good plants. But what makes a weed a weed and not a desirable plant is the simple fact that the weed takes but does not give. In any society, even communities of believers, there are people who take from others but who do not return value or strength to the community. Jesus points out to us that the weeds grow alongside the wheat but that jerking them out suddenly can even hurt the plants that bear fruit

What is interesting in this parable is that Jesus does not worry about the health of the good plants, he knows that even in the midst of weeds they will bear fruit, and that it will be so much easier to separate the weeds when it comes time to harvest. The weeds will be evident because there is no fruit on the stem, nothing given, added, multiplied, or offered. The weeds will be there with naked stems and bare leaves, easy to be separated when the moment of truth comes.

This meditation then leads us to consider our own role as one called to bear fruit in a community of believers. The fruits produced by good plants speak for themselves. There is no need to explain why a large harvest of wheat is good, as the abundant harvest gives nutrition, stability, security, and peace to the people who need to eat to live. Stability, security, and peace are things that seem in scarce supply in our world in these days.

Because we are Roman Catholic Christians and have been given strength and grace from Our Lord to do His will, we can work together to provide fruit that will last, working together for the kingdom and building up the peace, security and stability that our beloved community needs.
