#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR



Dear Parish Family,

This year, the Solemnity of All Saints falls on a Sunday, so we will be celebrating All Saints this year rather than the 31st Sunday of Ordinary Time. November in particular is an interesting month. For those who do not deny the existence of the mystical, November is known as a "liminal" time. It is a time of the year in the Northern Hemisphere during which the veil in the doorway between this world and the next seems very thin. The "limina" is the Latin word for the doorpost between two rooms. It seems at certain times of the year we feel close to that doorpost, and we can

hear and perceive more acutely the ones who are on the other side.

Many of the things we cherish the most are invisible and intangible. Our beloved Bishop Foley once told me: "Often the things that are invisible are more real than the things that are visible." Memories, dreams, and above all, love are things that are best savored and perceived in a world that opens out more broadly than simply for those things that we can see and touch.

I also perceive a great sense of rebellion in many people at this time of the year, as there are many who love to manifest and decorate around Halloween and who love to engage in the ghoulish and gruesome with great passion. I think it is natural for many to manifest rebellion in this way, as they are rebelling against a society that consistently tells them such things do not exist, are not real, and do not matter. It would be so much better, however, if that fascination was directed rather toward true and holy things, the radical lives of the Saints, as well as the proofs of God's love which are all around us in the Sacraments and in the Church.

Over the course of my short life, it seems that the more secularized, self-assured and dry the society becomes, there is a proportional increase in popularity regarding what many describe as "the spooky" or "scary." For years, I have said that the general poverty of understanding about the "sacred" has been made manifest in the popularity of being "scared." People love to feel a little scared because in some way it feeds that part of the human person that knows and perceives that the invisible exists as truly as the visible. Desperately hungry people will eat anything, and the hunger of the soul for the invisible realities of the universe is often satisfied not by wholesome, healthy fare, but rather the sickening fast food of what passes for pop culture.

The human person has an innate or natural desire for the divine. We are simply made that way. The human person is the only creature in this world that can know its Creator, and that fact has deep consequences for the human person. I'm reminded that Our Lord Jesus sat down among adults and took a child into his arms, instructing all that "No one can come into the kingdom of God unless he is like this child." That inner child can perceive and process many things, and the hope is that those skills are not assassinated by insensitive executioners, led by modern day Herods who propose that only the visible world is real.

#### African-American Saints-To-Be



To date, there are no African-American saints, but that is soon to change. Currently there are six people of color from the United States under consideration. One of those is PIERRE TOUSSAINT.

Born in Haiti, Pierre was brought to the United States as a slave. Pierre's grandmother taught him how to read and write. As a young man, he accompanied his master's son to New York City and became an apprentice to a hairdresser. He learned the trade quickly and worked in the homes of wealthy women.

After his master's death, he became a free man and married a woman whose freedom he purchased.

Within the Catholic community, Pierre was exceptionally devout and charitable. He opened his home to orphans, educating them and, along with his wife, cared for those suffering with yellow fever. When he was urged to retire and enjoy the wealth he had accumulated, he responded, "I have enough for myself, but if I stop working I have not enough for others."

His remains are entombed at St. Patrick's Cathedral, the only layperson buried there. In 1997, Pope John Paul II declared Pierre Toussaint, Venerable, thus placing him firmly on the road to becoming North America's first black saint.
