Wearing sweats and flip-flops, her hair down and a little on the messy side, Eva Longoria is dressed more like a real-life housewife than the perpetually high-heeled one she plays on TV. Another quality that sets her apart from her *Desperate Housewives* character Gabrielle Solis: her cheerful friendliness—she comes across as the kind of chick who would have your back, not stab you in it. Backstabbing (and other forms of gossip-inspiring behavior) is, of course, what makes *Desperate House-wives* so hugely popular (it draws an average of 23 million TV viewers each week).

Starring on a show that successful would be a coup for any actor, but it's perhaps more so for this beauty pageant veteran who was until recently best known for a two-year stint on *The Young and the Restless*. And now the Texas-born Mexican American stunner has finished filming a new movie, *The Sentinel*, which comes out in April and costars Michael Douglas and Kiefer Sutherland. 
Cosmo Your character in The Sentinel isn't glamorous. Was it hard not to be able to lean on your looks?

Eva This character actually downplays her sexuality, and I love it. I've lost a lot of jobs because I was too pretty. And everybody's like "Oh, poor you." But seriously, you don't get the good roles when you're beautiful.

■ Kiefer recently said in an interview that you're a good shot. What's that all about?

E Hunting is a family thing for me, and it's a Texas thing. We have a lot of land in Texas that's been in our family for 12 generations. We don't hunt for sport—we actually eat what we kill. At Christmas, we kill wild pigs for tamales. So I did beat all of my Sentinel costars at the shooting range. They had bets about





who was going to win, and everybody thought Kiefer would come in first. But I did. Michael [Douglas] was mad. He was like "Why am I third?"

A marriage is a partnership, and I was very selfish at the time. I was like "I have things to do! I have places to go!"

E What I like about it is that she doesn't want to be. Gabrielle was fine not having children, and this will give the writers a

lot of opportunities for comedy. It will be hilarious to see her deal with diapers and bottles and baby showers. And bribing her kids—"Don't tell Dad!"

There have been so many rumors about catfights happening on the set. What's the real deal with you guys?

It's made me angry because Marcia Cross is one of the kindest, warmest people I've ever met. She was the one who was targeted [for being difficult], and she's nothing like that. Felicity is a solid chick. The most important thing to her is her girls and her marriage. Teri is like Martha Stewart. She sews, she cooks-she always bakes us things to eat, like banana bread from scratch. And Nicollette is the light of the set...funny and loud and fun to be around. We hang out all the time. Nicollette, Marcia, and I just went to Tod's in Beverly Hills to go purse shopping and then ate lunch at Barneys. We were like "Of course no one's around to photograph this, because we're getting along!"

How did you meet your boyfriend, Tony?

The first time Tony saw me was in a magazine. I was wearing a Spurs hat at a celebrity softball game. A week later, I went to a Spurs game, and afterward, I took my dad to the locker room to meet the players. My dad is a huge fan, and so Tony invited him to dinner—and I tagged along! Do you believe in love at first sight?



What's the best sex advice you give your girlfriends?


E Get a Brazilian wax. It makes sex better, orgasmwise. It's like the difference between this [she pats her arm lightly] and this [rubs her arm].
