Film Fest Synopsis

"What even is the Georgetown Film Festival?"

Well, thanks for asking! And thanks for peeking into these pages, even without knowing who we are and what we do.

GTX Film is a group of filmmakers and fans dedicated to bringing incredible film experiences to Georgetown. Our judges review hundreds of submissions every year to introduce viewers to films that enlighten, entice, and engage.

The Process

Step 1: Throughout the year, filmmakers submit their work to the Georgetown Film Festival. There is a submission fee, which filmmakers pay in hope of getting their film seen by a wider audience. There's always the hope of winning their category as well – prizes can help them shop their film around to even more outlets. GTX Film accepts feature-length and short films, and even has categories for young filmmakers. GTX Film accepted films in seven categories this year:

- Narrative Feature
- Documentary Feature

- Foreign Feature
- Narrative Short
- Foreign Short
- Student Short
- Youth Short

Step 2: GTX Film judges review submissions. In addition to deciding which films to screen for our festival audience, they also select a winner in each category. The winners are announced during the festival screenings.

Step 3: Festival time! GTX Film takes the selected films and creates a schedule for you to view and enjoy. This year's festival will be at the Doug Smith Performance Center, right next to the scenic San Gabriel River.

Step 4: Celebrate and decompress with film winners at the after-party!

Step 5: Start the cycle over again for next year.

The Categories

- Narrative Features are over 40 minutes in length. Filmmakers who reside in the United States or Canada are eligible to submit. Films must be created in North America and must be in English.
- **Documentary Features** are over 40

minutes in length.

- Foreign Features are over 40 minutes in length. Filmmakers who reside outside of the United States or Canada are eligible to submit. Films must be created outside of North America and must be dubbed or subtitled in English.
- **Narrative Shorts** are under 40 minutes in length. Filmmakers who reside in North America are eligible to submit. Films must be created in the United States or Canada and must be in English.
- **Foreign Shorts** are narrative films under 40 minutes in length. Filmmakers who reside outside of North America are eligible to submit. Films must be created outside of the United States or Canada and must be dubbed or subtitled in English.
- **Student Shorts** are student-made and under 40 minutes in length. Filmmakers must be age 25 or younger, and enrolled in grade school or college for the full 2021-22 academic year to be eligible to submit.
- Youth Shorts are youth-made and under 10 minutes in length. Filmmakers who are age 17 and under, and enrolled in grade school for the full 2021-22 academic year are eligible to submit.

Join us for a full day of films. Our panel of final judges have selected the very best of the best from the hundreds of submissions over the past year. From Youth Shorts to Full Length Features – there's something for everyone. Who do you think will win each category? Join us to find out. Film documents healing power of horses

Filmmaker Twila LaBar worked with ROCK to create the documentary *When Horses Heal the Soul.* Her film, currently in post-production, shares inspirational stories of the healing power of therapy horses.

The film highlights how the motion of riding and the connection to a horse are life changing. Veterans with combat-related injuries and PTSD who struggle to find their place and purpose are empowered to live up to their full potential after connecting with horses.



Part of the Georgetown Palace Theater and named after generous donor Doug Smith, the Center is a performance arts education school for children. It opened in June 2020.

Wang Architects designed the

14,500-square-foot, three-story performance center. It opened in June and offers a performance space with more than 200 seats. The center also features a dance studio, seven classrooms, rehearsal space, an outdoor terrace for events and special classes, wardrobe spaces, office spaces and teacher's lounge.

The center overlooks the South San Gabriel River at 206 W. Second Street.
