

EBC Members, I recently provided you with an overview of the 2022 Boat Fire Extinguisher law effective April 1 at the EBC General Meeting. There were questions regarding the disposal of old Fire Extinguishers and flares.

If you do not know where to dispose of your boat waste, contact your local county public works department, police, or fire department. You can also go to the Earth911.org web page for additional disposal information. The following will discuss the impacts of improper disposal of boat waste. I also attached the Fire Extinguisher law for your review.

Other Waste Disposal

Monofilament Line

When disposed of used monofilament can be hazardous to marine life, scuba divers, and even boat propellers. Even when put in the trash monofilament can end up harming wildlife at landfills. When possible, it is best to recycle used fishing lines.

Oil

Disposing of used oil can be a messy problem. Used oil is considered hazardous waste and if

not handled properly it can contaminate soil and waterways resulting in environmental damage and costly clean-up. Luckily, it can be easily and safely recycled. Recycling and re-refining used oil use between 50 to 85 percent less energy than refining virgin crude oil. Check with your marina to see if they offer a collection of used oil for recycling. If they do, be sure to follow their guidelines for handling the used oil. If your marina does not offer a used oil collection service, check with your local automobile repair shop or look on Earth911.org for a collection site near you.

Used Oil Filters

Oil filters are recyclable because they're made of steel, North America's number one recycled material. They can be recycled into new steel products, such as cans, cars, appliances, and construction materials. Recycling all the filters sold annually in the United States would result in the recovery of enough steel to make 160,000 new cars! For used oil filter recycling locations see Earth911.org.

Shrink Wrap

Shrinkwrap is a low-density polyethylene cocoon used to protect boats during the winter. Shrinkwrap is not biodegradable and can become a disposal problem at landfills. Many marinas have started offering bulk shrink wrap recycling programs. If your marina does not offer shrink wrap recycling on-site, there are companies that for a nominal fee will send you a postage-paid bag that can be filled with shrink warp and returned to the company for recycling. For more information see Dr. Shrink.

Flares

To date, flares cannot be recycled but special care should be taken with their disposal. Throwing flares in your household trash can cause a dangerous situation and setting off old flares can result in false distress reports. To dispose of expired flares, contact your local

county public works department, police, or fire department. Alternatively, check with a local boating education group. They often use old flares for educational purposes.

Lead-Acid Batteries

Batteries contain lead and sulfuric acid which are both toxic to the marine environment. Most states have battery recycling laws which have prompted most battery dealers to ask for your old battery upon the purchase of a new one. When a spent battery is collected, it is sent to a permitted recycler where, under strict environmental regulations, the lead and plastic are reclaimed and sent to a new battery manufacturer. As a result of these programs, the typical new lead-acid battery contains 60 to 80 percent recycled lead and plastic. For more information on where to recycle batteries see Earth911.org.

Antifreeze

While marine-rated propylene glycol antifreeze is less toxic than "regular" automobile-use ethylene glycol antifreeze, both products need to be handled carefully and disposed of properly. Used antifreeze often contains other substances including heavy metals that can be harmful to human and aquatic health. Antifreeze can be filtered and reconditioned for reuse by licensed professionals. For more information on where to find an antifreeze recycling location near you, see Earth911.org.

Hazardous Waste

 Read labels! If the label includes strong warning statements about personal health, the product can also have significant environmental implications if improperly disposed of (as well as significant personal health implications if improperly used).

- Before you buy a new product with strong warning labels ask yourself if you need to use a product that strong.
- Buy only the amount you'll need or share with a friend.
- Follow directions for use and safely store where the product container can't capsize!
- Try alternative products or methods of cleaning.
- Schedule major maintenance work on land away from the water's edge (maybe during winter storage?).
- Find your local "Household Hazardous Waste" collection days where you can safely dispose of these products. Check with your local public works department or check out <u>Earth911.org</u> to find possibilities in your town.

Local recycling and proper disposal options vary widely depending on where you live so always check with local authorities on how to properly dispose of these items.


Boat Fire Extinguisher Requirements, As Of April 2022

Beginning in April 2022, the U.S. Coast Guard issued new regulations for disposable fire extinguisher dates of manufacture and label classifications.

- Fire extinguishers must not be more than 12 years old according to the date of manufacture stamped on the bottle. Boaters can find the manufacture date stamped into the bottom of the bottle or near the UL label.
- Vessels model year 2018 or newer must carry fire extinguishers labeled as 5-B, 10-B, or 20-B. The old labels of B-1 or B-11 are no longer acceptable.

 Vessels model year 2017 or older may keep serviceable extinguishers labeled B-1 and B-11 if they are less than 12 years old. Remember, disposable fire extinguishers must be replaced no later than 12 years from the date of manufacture stamped on the bottle.



Coast Guard-approved fire extinguishers in an easy-to-reach location are required on the following boats:

- Inboard or stern-drive engines
- Closed compartments where portable fuel tanks may be stored
- Double-walled hulls that are not sealed or not filled with floatation material.
- Enclosed living spaces
- Closed stowage compartments in which combustible or flammable materials may be stored
- Permanently installed fuel tanks

Boat Operators should show all passengers where safety equipment is stored. Make sure your passengers know what to do in case of an emergency.

The following chart describes the required fire extinguisher type by boat size. It includes the newer UL-listed equivalents as 5-B, 10-B, and 20-B.

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Boat Fire Extinguisher Requirements

It's time to introduce the next important piece of safety equipment on your boat: the fire extinguisher.

You are required by law to have a fire extinguisher onboard if your boat has an engine and meets any of the following conditions:

- Your boat has closed compartments where portable fuel tanks may be stored.
- Your boat has a double bottom that is not sealed to the hull and that is not filled with flotation materials.
- Your boat has closed living spaces.
- Your boat has permanently installed fuel tanks.
- Or if your boat has an inboard engine.

It is not required by law to carry a fire extinguisher on other types of boats but it is still highly recommended. Fires can happen unexpectedly and it's always a smart idea to be prepared.

No matter the type of boat, to be prepared your fire extinguisher needs to be accessible.




So make sure that you mount your fire extinguisher in a location that is easy to reach in the event of an emergency. Ideally, it should be within arm's reach of you and your passengers.

Now, let's quickly review the number of and types of fire extinguishers you need on your boat.

- If your boat is less than 26 feet, you need one B1 fire extinguisher onboard.
- If your boat is between 26 and 40 feet, you need either two B1 or a single B2 fire extinguisher.
- And finally, if your boat is between 40 and 65 feet, you need either three B1 extinguishers or two B2 extinguishers.

If your boat is longer than 65 feet, check the federal regulations.





Fire Extinguisher Classification

Fires are classed depending on their fuel source: solid, liquid, or electrical. Each fire burns differently and requires a specific type of extinguisher. That's why every fire extinguisher is marked with a letter, like A, B, or C. The letter indicates both the class of fire extinguishers and the class of fire it is designed to put out.

Fire Types Are:




CLASS A: Combustible solids



CLASS B: Flammable liquids

CLASS C: Electrical fires

Class A fires have a solid combustible fuel source like wood or paper. You can use water, or a Class A fire extinguisher, to put out this type of fire.

Class B fires, on the other hand, have a flammable liquid fuel source, like gasoline. Do not use water to put out a Class B fire as it will just spread the fire. Instead, use a Class B fire extinguisher.

Finally, a **Class C** fire is an electrical fire. As a Class B fire, never use water on a Class C fire. Use a Class C fire extinguisher.

Because gasoline fires are the most common type of boat fire, marine-rated Class B fire extinguishers are the class required on most boats. The number after the B, for example, a B1 or B2 extinguisher, indicates the capacity of the extinguisher.

It's important to note that you can also get fire extinguishers that put out multiple types of fires. A Class ABC fire extinguisher, which can handle all fires, is, therefore, the most recommended class of extinguisher.

There are different types of fire extinguishers, with the most common being a dry chemical extinguisher.

Boat Fire Extinguisher Maintenance

A monthly inspection of your boat fire extinguisher should be a part of your regular boating maintenance. This will make sure your extinguisher is always ready to go in the case of an emergency.

Include the following steps in your monthly boat fire extinguisher inspection:

- First, check the gauge to make sure it is still fully charged.
- Next, look at the seals to make sure they have not been broken.
- Then inspect the hose to make sure it is not cracked or broken, and replace it if you find it's not in good condition.
- Last but not least, for dry chemical extinguishers, weigh your extinguisher to make sure it meets the minimum weight specified on the label.

Done! Your fire extinguisher is good to go for another month!

Eddie Jo Mack Past Commodore

The Mayor's Award is a special award that Mayor Hernandez presents to someone whom she believes has worked tirelessly on behalf of the Dublin community in the previous calendar year. The Mayor's Legacy Award is an award that the Mayor presents to a group or individual to recognize extraordinary, long-term dedication to the Dublin community. The award is based on the Dublin Integrity in Action Program's 10 Characteristics: Responsibility, Caring Respectfulness, Giving, Positive Attitude, Trustworthiness, Cooperation, Doing One's Best, Honesty, and Self-Discipline.

The winners were announced on Thursday, March 3, 2022, during an evening ceremony held at Shannon Community Center in Dublin. Dublin's Mayor Melissa Hernandez, recognized Eddie Jo Mack with the 2021 Mayor's Legacy Award. In recognition and appreciation of the outstanding contributions made to our community.

Eddie Jo began her volunteer service in 1981 when she joined the Dublin Municipal Advisory Committee (DUMAC), serving as Secretary. In 1982, Dublin became incorporated. Eddie Jo ran for a City Council position twice but was unsuccessful, learning about the inside of the political world. One of the Planning Commissioners resigned, moving out of town, and Eddie Jo was appointed by the current Mayor and Board to fill that position 1982-1990

During the ensuing years, she volunteered in various positions including the following:

- Alameda County Cancer Society, Tri-Valley unit, President, BSE, R2R, Bd of Dir., Jailathon, Human Race, and on ACS East Bay Regional Council 1991-1994
- Alameda County Worker, Dublin 1991-2002
- Founder and Organizer of Black History Programs in Dublin 1993-1999, 2011
- Received Dublin's Citizen of the Year 1995
- Dublin Hope Hospice Bereavement Team, Grief Coordinator 1995-1996
- President of the Tri-Valley American Diabetes Assn., 1996-1998
- Dublin San Ramon Women's Club, Pres 1996-2000
- Received Volunteer of the Year Award 1997
- Alameda County Library Advisory Comm. 1999-2001; Bay Area Library Info Systems 2001-2005
- Received Citizen of the Year 2005
- Volunteer at Dublin Senior Center 2010-2019
- Dublin Integrity In Action, Bd Officer 2010-2011
- Received many Certificates of Appreciation for various years of service
- Volunteered with many Community Outreach Programs in Dublin with her church, Valley Christian Center 1970-2022.

Eddie Jo completed her years of City volunteerism in 2019. She continues her service at her church, BRAVE, formerly Valley Christian Center after fifty-three years.

RECIPES FROM THE GALLEY



FRIED APPLES

With every Sunday breakfast, I usually have fried apples. It is something my mom made not just on Sunday but to stretch breakfast in the spring and summer when the fruit trees were full. We also had fried apples, biscuits, fried chicken, ham and fried pork belly for dinner or any other time she had to make a quick meal. The apples did not have to be ripe but firm.

Ingredients

3 cups of peeled firm apples sliced
1 cup or more sugar
1/2 cup or less brown sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
3 tablespoon butter

Instructions

If you are using fresh apples use granny smith or other firm apples. I prefer peeled but my mother did not peel the apples. Melt the butter in a heavy pan. I like to use my electric skillet or cast iron pan. Add the apples and sugars and cook until tender. Add spices. Adjust sugar and spices to taste. Enjoy with hot biscuits, toast, pancakes or waffles. SHORT RIB VEGETABLE SOUP

Ingredients

- 2 packages of short ribs (with or without the bones)
- 1 large onion, chopped 3 celery stalks, chopped
- 2 pkgs onion soup mix
- 2 leeks, chopped
- 2 24 oz beef broth
- half a bunch flat parsley
- salt and pepper to taste
- 3 carrots, peeled and chopped
- 1 bunch green onion, chopped
- 4 small potatoes, peeled and chopped
- Knorr's beef broth flavor to taste

Instructions

Put the short ribs in a large soup pot; add the parsley, onion, celery, bay leaves, leek, salt and pepper. Pour in the beef broth and onion soup mix and stir. Cover the pot and boil for 30 minutes or until flavors combine and meat is done, add water if needed. Add the potatoes, carrots and knorrs's powder beef broth for more flavor. When potatoes start to become fork tender your short ribs vegetable soup is ready to be served. Scatter chopped green onions over bowl of soup and serve with warm crusty bread. Helpful tips: My first time making this soup, I used the short ribs with bone and cut the meat from the bone and returned the meat to the pot. The soup was oily but the flavor was fantastic. The second time making the soup, I used the boneless short ribs and cut the meat into bite size portions and did the same with the carrots and potatoes. Each delicious spoon full of soup had a little bit of everything in it. Be creative, try adding kale, corn or green beans.




