



### A Message From : SAFETY & TRAINING OFFICER

#### Preseason preparation

- Current registration/documentation papers (including boat trailer) and numbers/decals affixed as required. If you fish, fishing license and fishing gear aboard?
- Review federal, state, and local boating laws and navigation rules
- Take your state's boating safety course, if required. BoatU.S.
   Foundation's free online course meets requirements in 36 states (BoatUS.org/Free)
- Join or renew your BoatU.S. towing membership (BoatUS. com/Towing)
- Download the free BoatU.S. App to check local weather and tides, and for fastest way to call a tow (BoatUS.com/App)
- Maintain boat and systems per manufacturer recommendations and your visual inspection
- Check expiration dates and condition of fire extinguishers and pyrotechnic flares
- Program your VHF/DSC radio (Request a free MMSI number at BoatUS.com/MMSI)
- Take a course to brush up boat-handling skills (BoatUS.org/On-Water)
- Schedule a courtesy vessel safety check (cgaux.org/vsc)

#### Before departure

- Check weather forecasts, tides, currents
- File a float plan with a trusted contact ashore
- Follow safe fueling practices; make sure blower fans are in working order
- Check operation of bilge pump, auto switch, alarms
- Ensure you have appropriate-size life jackets in good repair, and that children wear them. Need a child-sized life jacket? Find a loaner site at BoatUS.org/Life-Jacket-Loaner
- Brief crew on locations and operation of safety equipment including: life jackets, life sling, or throwable flotation; sound-producing device; flares/visual distress signals; fire extinguishers; and a spare engine cutoff lanyard, if equipped.

- Turn on VHF radio. Show passengers how to select Ch. 16, how to use mic, and when/how to transmit a Mayday. Brief on how/when to use and not use the DSC feature if you have it; ensure the MMSI is programmed in
- Check operation of navigation/ running lights
- Ensure that one anchor and rode is ready for immediate use
- Before starting a gasoline inboard engine, run blower for at least 4 minutes



Visit BoatUS. com/Float-Plan to fill out and print a float plan for your next onboard excursion.

Attach engine shutoff switch lanyard or device, if fitted

#### On the water

- Departing the harbor, store a "go home" waypoint on the GPS, if equipped
- Know the waters you're navigating. Refer to local charts, stay within marked channels, be aware of tides, currents, and areas such as inlets with challenging seas
- Avoid distracted driving, scan the horizon continually for other boats' movements
- Be weather-aware (watch for wind/cloud changes, monitor weather channels)
- While underway, no passengers on the bow, gunwales, or transom
- Monitor fuel consumption and remaining range. Use the "Three-Thirds" rule: one-third outbound, one-third inbound, one-third reserve
- Designate a lookout if engaging in watersports activities
- Engines OFF if people are swimming
   Be aware of dangerous CO gasses
- from engines and/or generators
- Drink plenty of water; wear sunscreen; don't boat under the influence Å

# A Call to Actions Why is California proposing an Increase of 300% On the Boating Community

RBOC is very concerned that a two-year boating community stakeholder process has resulted in Governor Newsom's May Revise proposal for the next state budget fiscal year that begins on July 1. It increases vessel registration fees by even more than originally proposed, for a 300% increase, without returning any more value to boaters, and ignoring the substantial \$107 million per year contribution boaters already pay via the state fuel tax.

The average boat owner in California has an income of less than \$70,000 per year, among those who are least able to afford the significant 300% increases in their registration fees. It will essentially make boating an activity that the average Californian family cannot afford.

The number of registered vessels in California has already been decreasing. Several years ago, California ranked third in the number of registered boats by state, today the state is fifth. Local assessors have been drastically increasing the assessed value of vessels for local property tax purposes, regardless of their age. New marina developments are reducing the number of slips available for small boats. Boaters are being required to spend more money on less effective hull paints.

# increases vessel registration fees by even more than originally proposed, for a 300% increase,

The hardship of quadrupling fees coupled with severely increased fuel costs will also decrease tax revenue from boaters that fuel boats and the vehicles that tow them off the water, impact on the water or walkable restaurants accessed by boats, shopping by boaters who buy boating and camping equipment, and pay for repairs. Our communities will pay less fees for fishing and hunting, and fewer launches will decrease launch fees collected and place more hardships on marina owners.

In addition, *the boating community is frustrated that a collaborative stakeholder-driven process is being announced and rushed through*, in part, with little notification to the boating community that engaged in good faith in this process, with little to no time to review, react, or discuss the elements of the proposal the Governor is putting forth and those that he is leaving off the table.

*The increase also does not address the inappropriate uses of registration fees.* This includes the DMV cost of administering and collecting the fees, as well as the depletion of the fund by re-direction of significant vessel registration fees to the California Air Resources Board that is set to sunset on January 1 of next year.

The cumulative impact of the May Revise is that 750,000 boaters throughout California are being made to pay more for less.

RBOC is urging recreational boaters to contact their State Senators and Assembly Members ASAP and request that their elected representatives reject Governor Newsom's proposal that we pay a 300% increase in boat registration fees for less state boating programs and services.

## **Apple Stuffed Pork Chops**

A healthy, savory apple-y stuffing. You can make a delicious gravy from the pan drippings, too, if desired!

#### Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon chopped onion
- 1/4 cup butter
- 3 cups fresh bread crumbs
- 2 cups chopped apples
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup chopped celery
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh parsley
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 6 (1 1/4 inch) thick pork chops
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil

#### Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- In a large skillet saute onion in butter or margarine until tender. Remove from heat. Add the bread crumbs, apples, celery, parsley and salt. Mix all together. Cut a large pocket in the side of each pork chop; season inside and out with salt and pepper to taste. Spoon apple mixture loosely into pockets.
- In skillet, heat oil to medium high and brown chops on both sides. Place browned chops in an ungreased 9x13 inch baking dish. Cover with aluminum foil and bake in the preheated oven for 30 minutes. Remove cover and bake for 30 minutes longer or until juices run clear.



## **Classic Peach Cobbler**

This easy fruit cobbler is made with all-purpose flour and fresh or canned peaches. If using canned peaches, use juice from the can instead of water. Delicious served with vanilla ice cream!

#### Ingredients

- ½ cup white sugar
- ¼ cup butter, softened
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup milk
- 2 cups fresh peaches, pitted and sliced
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 ½ cups water

#### Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C). Lightly butter a 9x9-inch glass baking dish.
- 2. In a large bowl, cream 1/2 cup sugar and butter until light and fluffy.
- In a separate bowl, mix together flour, baking powder, and salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Spread mixture evenly into the prepared baking dish.
- 4. Spoon sliced peaches over batter. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup sugar and cinnamon. Pour water over the top.
- 5. Bake in the preheated oven until liquid sinks to the bottom and batter puffs and turns golden brown, 45 to 55 minutes.

# Virginia's historic Black watermen communities are endangered

Remnants remain of the once-thriving culture of Black water workers of the Chesapeake Bay, as state agencies and descendants honor their history and communities.

Most days, James Douglas would be on the water by 5:30 in the morning, on the hunt for oysters.

He'd push off in his small boat from his family's wharf on the Yeocomico River in Westmoreland County, the birthplace of the nation's first president, George Washington, and, since 1824, of Douglas' family, the Wilsons.

Douglas' family has owned their waterfront property in Virginia's Northern Neck since 1877. This is an astounding feat, considering few Black people were able to purchase land back then, and those that did were sometimes bullied by whites to give up their property or sell it for a pittance.

"Mitchell Wilson number one, he got a white fellow to buy it for him, and he split it up between all of his children and descendants," said Douglas, sweeping his hand toward a ring of homes perched near the riverbank. "Those descendants, my family, are still here now." Douglas is one of Virginia's last living Black watermen, a culture and profession that was the backbone of the Chesapeake Bay's seafood industry as early as colonial times. These African American men, some enslaved, some free, fished for menhaden, dug for clams, harvested oysters and caught crabs that they sold to white-owned processing facilities, which sold and shipped the brackish water delicacies to restaurants and homes in Maryland, Washington, D.C., Philadelphia, New York and beyond.

But this tradition has over the past few decades been disappearing. The Black watermen culture is fading, Douglas said, largely due to the seafood industry itself shrinking and watermen leaving their smalltown birthplaces seeking better economic opportunities in cities like Washington, D.C., Philadelphia and Richmond. In early May, Preservation Virginia named "African American Watermen Sites of the Chesapeake Bay" one of the state's most endangered historic spaces.

"The renowned seafood industry of the Chesapeake Bay would not have been possible without the contributions of generations of African Americans," the Virginia Department of Historic Resources wrote in its announcement of the agency's African American Watermen Project in 2021. That effort to

survey, study and preserve sites of significance to Black watermen culture spans three states – Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania – under the purview of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, National Park Service Chesapeake Bay and Chesapeake Conservation Partnership. Norfolk-based Commonwealth Preservation Group is leading the Virginia arm of the project and has identified about 80 sites where Black watermen lived, worked and contributed to the cultural fabric of the commonwealth.

"Women were predominantly in the crab picking and oyster shucking houses, while men were on the water," said Kayla Halberg, manager of the project, who co-authored its Multiple Property Documentation form that her group submitted to the National Park Service for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places.

"These are real people and real communities; we [were able] to go out to their homes and see where they live and talk to them," Halberg said. "What we want to preserve about these communities is their culture — the songs, the tools, the expertise, the lifestyle of the watermen communities. It was a thriving, rich culture that is unfortunately fading away; that's why it's essential to preserve what remains." Douglas' wife Daisy, a gifted storyteller and retired educator who used to drive an hour and a half each way each day to teach in Richmond City Public Schools, recalled the dangers and the joys of her husband's long career.

"James and those watermen before him, they were extremely strong, with powerful legs that they stood

up on all day in the boats while they were hunting oysters. A lot of them ended up on disability because their arms gave out, after they spent years lifting those heavy tongs in and out of the water all day, catching up oysters. Some of them drowned; sometimes they would get lost in a storm. You remember the snowstorm, Jim?" she asked her husband, before describing the time he had come home with a "completely frozen" beard and eyelashes after braving a surprise bout of wintry weather. He didn't leave the water when other oystermen did, he recalled with a sheepish grin, because he had a strong feeling that he was about to find a big oyster bed; he was right.

"It was not an easy profession at all, but they took great pride in it, great pride, because they had a certain level of independence working on the water," Daisy continued.

It is heartening to see the significance of African American water workers recognized. Not only did these people embody Black self-determination, collaboration and entrepreneurship, even when some of them were in bondage, but the Chesapeake Bay's maritime and seafood industries could not have developed or been sustained without these skilled tradesmen and women.

These are the stories that Virginia schoolchildren and citizens should learn. Some might label them "divisive concepts," but actually, they are factual accounts of local African Americans who worked tirelessly to overcome systemic, structural racism that plagued every facet of their lives for the better part of the state's existence. The Black history of these communities is Virginia history and American history that might be lost to time if not for efforts like Halberg's project and the Douglases' determination to keep their stories alive.

"It was good while it lasted, but it's just about over with now," James Douglas said, looking out over the river to Northumberland County on the other shore.

He has lived the entirety of his 85 years here; the water is in his blood, he said. "It's up to us now to tell people about it, to teach it to young people, to keep it going.






