While Ebony Boat Club finalized its preparations for their Annual Jazz & Wine Festival event on the weekend of July 31, 2021; Friday morning, July 30, 2021, Otis and Marilyn Brock loaded all the meats and a case of corn on "Enchantment" their 45 foot boat and prepared for the two and a half hour trip to the clubhouse in the Stockton Marina. As Otis prepared the boat Marilyn piloted towards the San Joaquin River. While traveling, Marilyn saw a frantic family on a small boat waving and yelling. Marilyn then proceeded to approach the castaway's vessel as close as she could. Marilyn knew something was wrong and immediately called Otis as she slowed down to take a better look.


The Stranded family had gotten their attention, they were out of gas and did not have a radio onboard. In the stranded vessel were two children and three adults, all of whom had on PFDs. They were too close to the rocks for Marilyn to take "Enchantment" to them. Otis called for the Sheriff, and they waited with the stranded vessel until help arrived. (So much for a two-and-a-half-hour run.) When the Sheriff arrived, he was able to help the family but did not have extra gas for them. Fortunately, Otis and Marylin had an extra gallon of gas. It was great that Otis and Marylin remained with the stranded vessel and family instead of calling the Sheriff and leaving. They gave up their gas and left the Sheriff to finish with the assistance needed.

After a while, Otis and Marilyn were on their way again. About a mile from Windmill Cove, they encountered some cigarette vessels from Discovery Bay, they were flat-out rolling. One passed, then another, the third vessel hit a wake and was airborne and flipped over. The boat capsized, ejecting the two occupants out into the water. Again Marilyn slows down, stops, and proceeds to turn around and goes back. This is an example of why boating knowledge is so important. Marilyn then handed the helm over to Otis. She goes to the bow of the boat, yells to Otis that she does not see anyone. She finally hears someone calling for help and identifies the troubled person. She yells to Otis that she sees someone. Otis is giving the Coast Guard directions to their location. Keeping in mind, if he gets too close, he could suck the person in the water into his props. Otis then turns off the engines as he slowly approaches the person. (It's praying time!). Marilyn is on the swim platform, and with all the strength she had, she grabs onto the man's hand. Otis rushed to the swim platform. By the grace of God, Marilyn was able to get his chest up to the swim platform. Otis took over and was able to get the person out of the water and onto the swim platform. The man then yelled for help to Marilyn that his girlfriend was still in the water. Marilyn searched for her from the helm. Otis was also now at the helm while Marilyn returned to tend to the wounded man and began the emergency assessment. The man was in shock, scared, and in pain. Marilyn covered him with a blanket and placed a pillow under his head. Seeing that he had a broken leg and possibly fractured ribs, Marilyn tried to keep him as calm as possible. The man's name is Steven. Steven had been aboard his vessel with Nancy, his girlfriend, of whom he grew worried about. Marilyn assured Steven that they were looking for her. Meanwhile, Otis continued to look for Nancy. He could not leave the helm, since Marilyn was busy and there was no one else on board to control "Enchantment". Otis called the Coast Guard again, but this time he also called 911 this was not a vessel assist call. The two other vessels missed the third boat and returned so they were able to assist with Steven and for the continued search for Nancy. They all worked together and visually searched for Nancy until the Coast Guard arrived. Steven was air-lifted by helicopter to the hospital.

Otis and Marilyn were asked to stay until the Coast Guard finished their accident report. Finally, "Enchantment" and the Brocks were relieved of their first responder duties, and were underway again. They eventually arrived at the clubhouse about five hours later. What a relief for us who were waiting and anticipating their arrival three hours earlier. We had no idea what they had been through since they did not have the time to call. We were just glad they had finally arrived and were safe.

That Sunday, August 1, 2021, San Joaquin County Sheriff Deputies located the body of a woman submerged in 45 feet of water, 24 hours after a boating accident near Mandeville Island in San Joaquin County. The Medical Examiner's office confirmed the victim as 30-year-old Nancy Cahue of Oxnard, the woman sadly died as a result of the incident. The driver of the boat was listed as being in stable condition. Nevertheless, we would like to thank Otis and Marilyn Brock for being such good examples of responsible responders on the water.

My First 'Best Day'

I dreamed of owning a boat since I was 3 feet tall. But it wasn't until my 61st birthday before I realized that dream - a used Key West 19-foot center-console. We had recently purchased a week-end home near Colonial Beach, on the Virginia side of the Potomac River. From our front deck we could see Cobb Island, 7 miles across the river in Maryland.

The first few weeks I took the boat out several times but stayed close to shore, maybe going as far as halfway across the river. One Saturday morning, I was talking with my neighbor, Keith, about how I wanted to venture over to Cobb Island but didn't yet feel comfortable. He offered to go with me as he'd made the trip several times. We agreed to meet the next morning.

The water was choppier than I would have liked, but Keith assured me the boat could handle it. He taught me that once we got past the buoys marking the creek we lived on to steer toward the radio tower across the river, and that would bring us right to the channel markers to the western inlet of Neale Sound, behind Cobb Island. I soon got comfortable in the waves, which, in hindsight, weren't really that big. I couldn't help but grin when we passed the marker at the entrance to Cobb Island. Crossing the Potomac and rounding Cobb for the first time was my first best day of the water.

Since Then, I've visited dozens of nearby gunk holes, hideaways, and restaurants, and just love exploring new places by boat.

BoatUS: Signing of Infrastructure Bills Good for Recreational Boaters, Anglers

SPRINGFIELD, VA, Nov. 15, 2021 – With President Biden's signing today of the \$1.2 trillion bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), you may have mistakenly thought that only road, bridge, rail, power and water infrastructure, public transit, drinking and wastewater, high speed internet, environmental, and clean energy interests may benefit. The nation's largest advocacy, services, and safety group, Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS), says recreational boaters also made some significant gains on the bill touted as a "once-in-a-generation investment in our infrastructure."

The biggest payoff for boaters with the IIJA comes the reauthorization of the "Sport Fish Restoration, Recreational Boating Safety, and Wildlife Restoration Act of 2021," which

provides funding for state-based conservation programs, boating safety, aquatic resources education, pump-out, derelict vessel, fisheries management and restoration.

'Sport Fish' also funds recreational boat access, such as local launch ramps, as well as the highly popular <u>Boating Infrastructure</u> <u>Grant</u> (BIG) program that grows the availability of safe and protected harborage for overnight, transient boaters. A "user pay – public benefit" funding mechanism, Sport Fish's nearly \$650 million trust fund budget comes from boat fuel taxes and excise taxes paid by boaters and anglers purchasing fishing and boating equipment.

"The reauthorization of Sport Fish is the cornerstone of so much of what recreational boaters and anglers connect to while on the water," said BoatUS Manager of Government Affairs David Kennedy. He adds, "BoatUS greatly thanks Sport Fish reauthorization bill sponsors, Senators Maria Cantwell (D-WA) and Roger Wicker (R-MS), and Representatives Debbie Dingell (D-MI) and Garett Graves (R-LA). Their bipartisanship is a big plus for boaters and anglers."

Sport Fish reauthorization will also pay for a comprehensive study on the growing number of non-motorized paddle-craft, resultant user conflicts, and potential for increased accidents. Kennedy notes that while paddle-craft operators utilize launch ramps and other recreational boating facilities, "they do not currently pay into the trust fund, and we need to look at how to equitably fund waterway access points."

IIJA also provides funds to US Army Corps of Engineers and other water-resource projects, including inland waterways construction, flood control, resiliency, watershed rehabilitation, aquatic ecosystem restoration, invasive species control, marine debris removal, and inland and coastal navigation projects — all good things to any boater's or angler's ear.


Greetings EBC,



Congressional Action Needed: Keeping Health Coverage Affordable for Many 50- to 64- Year-Olds

Affordability of health insurance is a major issue for adults ages 50 to 64. And thanks to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021, individual health coverage has become much more affordable for older adults. Among other provisions, the law increased financial assistance to help people afford Marketplace health coverage available under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). Coupled with an extended special enrollment period available earlier this year, the expanded financial assistance made available by ARPA has already led to millions more Americans newly enrolling in affordable health coverage. The Marketplace also became more racially and ethnically diverse, with a greater share of enrollees identifying as Hispanic or Black compared to prior years.

But these coverage gains may be only temporary. The law only authorized this expanded financial assistance for two years – until December 31, 2022. This means that starting in 2023, many older adults will once again face higher premiums – or be forced to drop their coverage – unless the ARPA tax credit changes are extended.

Because of the significant potential impact on health security, AARP commissioned a study to estimate the impact of the current ARPA tax credit expansions on adults ages 50 to 64, as well as what would happen if these provisions expired. The study underlines the importance of the new tax credit expansion to keeping health coverage affordable, lowering uninsured rates, and closing racial and ethnic coverage disparities.

The study shows extending the ARPA tax credit expansions would mean:


- 50- to 64-year-olds would continue to save as much as \$4,700 in annual health insurance premiums. Under ARPA, older Marketplace enrollees at all income levels saw premium savings, including those eligible for premium subsidies before the law. Average premiums for enrollees ages 50 to 64 decreased 16 percent, or \$954 per year. In total, older enrollees saved nearly \$4.8 billion in premiums this year. If the ARPA tax credit changes are not extended, adults ages 50 to 64 would face higher premiums starting in 2023.
- Those with incomes between 400 and 500 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) \$51,520 to \$64,400 for a one-person household in most states saw the largest savings under ARPA, as this group was ineligible for any financial assistance pre-ARPA. These savings are especially important for older adults who pay higher premiums because of "age rating," where insurers can charge older adults up to three times higher premiums than younger adults.

- 2.1 million more older adults would enroll in Marketplace coverage by 2030. Avalere estimates that 5.9 million adults ages 50 to 64 would be enrolled in Marketplace coverage by 2030, compared to only 3.8 million if the provisions are allowed to sunset. The increased racial and ethnic diversity among 2021 Marketplace enrollees also indicates that further enrollment increases could lead to a narrowing in coverage disparities.
- Nearly 1 million fewer older adults would be uninsured by 2030. By the end of the two years that the ARPA provisions were authorized (2021-2022),
- an estimated 400,000 fewer 50- to 64- yearolds are estimated to be uninsured than would have been without tax credit enhancements. An ARPA tax credit extension would mean the trend would continue, with the number approaching nearly one million fewer older adults uninsured by 2030.

Extending ARPA's tax credit expansions would help ensure continued access to affordable health coverage for millions of older adults ages 50 to 64 including early retirees not yet eligible for Medicare, workers without access to job-based coverage, and self-employed adults. Without this assistance, older adults ages 50 to 64 could once again face higher premiums, resulting in higher uninsured rates and potentially worsening racial and ethnic coverage disparities.

Delta's summertime surge is finally abating. New cases of COVID-19 caused by the highly contagious coronavirus variant are nearly half of what they were at their peak in early September. And hospitalizations and deaths are also dwindling. But that doesn't mean delta's power is fading. It still accounts for more than 99 percent of COVID cases in the U.S., according to data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). What's more, it's giving rise to new versions of the virus, including one, called delta-plus (or AY.4.2), that's captured the attention of experts.

Here's what we know so far about delta's descendant

1. It's an offshoot of delta

Viruses change and evolve as they replicate — that's expected — and when one or more of these changes sticks, a variant is born. What makes delta-plus

different from the long list of other variants that have popped up since the start of the coronavirus pandemic, however, is that it's not a variation of the original virus strain. Rather, it's derived from delta, the dominant variant circulating throughout the globe. "You had the original strain, and anytime a new variant came up all it had to do was outcompete that original strain. And then you had several variants all circulating more or less at the same time," explains Richard Kennedy, professor of medicine and co-director of the Mayo Clinic Vaccine Research Group. "Nowadays, almost all of the cases, at least in the U.S. and in the U.K., are delta. So 99 percent of the variants that we're going to see now are going to be variants of delta, not variants of the original strain." Because of this, the CDC refers to delta-plus as a sub-lineage. Other variants, including alpha and gamma, also have sub-lineages that are being tracked.

2. It may turn out to be more contagious than delta

Experts still aren't sure what to make of delta-plus. What we do know is that the delta variant is highly contagious, and some data suggests it can cause more severe illness than other variants, especially in not fully vaccinated individuals, who account for about 40 percent of the U.S. population. Delta can also evade some of the immune response that's generated after vaccination, although the vaccines are still highly effective at preventing hospitalization and death. "So that means any new variants, if they come from delta, they already have that background," Kennedy says, which "makes it more likely that they're going to be a bigger problem than a variant that shows up that was a variant from the original strain." Preliminary research shows that delta-plus is about 10 to 15 percent more

transmissible than delta, says Ashish Jha, M.D., dean of the Brown University School of Public Health.

3. Spread of delta-plus has been slow so far

Delta-plus isn't causing too much concern yet, and its slightly higher transmissibility rate isn't alarming in itself, says Jha. By comparison, the delta variant is twice as contagious as other variants, including alpha, which was the previous dominant variant in the U.S. And information out of the U.K., where delta-plus's presence has been slowly increasing since July, suggests that the vaccines "are holding up just fine" against it, Jha adds, though research is ongoing. Another reassuring trait: Delta-plus shares a few mutations with other variants "that didn't really go anywhere," Kennedy says. "And so the general consensus is that these mutations may not provide much of an advantage to the virus."

Virus strains that are "a little heartier" than their peers — maybe their mutations allow them to replicate faster upon infection, or pack more of a punch when confronted with antibodies — take over and spread. But delta-plus "does not seem to be spreading very quickly," Kennedy points out. In October, delta-plus accounted for about 6 percent of all cases in the U.K.; tracking sites show that number may be around 14 percent now. Only a few cases have been spotted in the U.S. That said, delta-plus is still managing to spread, even with delta in the mix, meaning it likely has an edge on delta. But "it's too early to tell if it's a lot better or not," Kennedy says.

CDC Director Rochelle Walensky, M.D., has said the CDC is "continuing to track lineages and sublineages of delta and all other variants," as well as their potential impact on COVID treatments and vaccines. But for now, there is "no evidence" of an immediate threat. "I think of this as a variant of a little bit of concern, but certainly not anything that I

think represents a game changer in terms of our strategy and approach," Jha adds.

4. Vaccines are key to forestalling new variants

The vaccines are crucial to keeping the COVID curve trending in the right direction and to avoid giving rise to new and potentially more destructive variants and lineages, experts say.

The reason? "The only time the virus can create variants is when it's inside a human being, inside a cell creating new viruses," Kennedy says. Though the COVID vaccines are not 100 percent effective at preventing a coronavirus infection, studies show that fully vaccinated people are significantly less likely to be infected. "If we can reduce the number of cases significantly, we've reduced the chance of having a delta-plus-plus or whatever we decide to name the granddaughter of delta," Kennedy says. Other precautions can also help stymie the emergence of new variants: Wear a mask when you are in crowded, indoor settings; wash your hands often; and if you're due for a booster, get it. "What you have to do is put multiple layers of protection in place," Kennedy adds.

If you haven't had the COVID vaccine, you can take many steps to reduce your risk of infection.

Wear a mask properly.

Wash you hands frequently.

Maintain social distancing.

Get a flu shot, if you haven't done so already.

Clean and disinfect surfaces.

ANSWERS FOR THE VETERANS DAY QUIZ

1. Armistice Day

Veterans Day was originally known as Armistice Day and was meant to honor the nation's World War I veterans. Armistice Day officially received its name in 1926 through a congressional resolution and became a national holiday in 1938.

2. None of the above

World War I, which was known at the time as "The Great War," officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside Versailles, France. Fighting had actually ended seven months earlier, however, when an armistice between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. For that reason, Nov. 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

3. Alvin J. King

In 1953, Alvin J. King of Emporia, Kan., proposed that Armistice Day be changed to Veterans Day to recognize and honor American veterans of all wars and conflicts. King came up with the idea after his nephew, John Cooper, was killed in action during World War II.

4. 1954

In 1954, at the urging of veterans service organizations, Congress amended the 1938 law that created Armistice Day by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With President Dwight D. Eisenhower's signature, the legislation became Public Law 380 on June 1, 1954.

5. Poppy

The story begins with the famous poem, "In Flanders Fields," written by John McCrae in 1915 ("In Flanders fields the poppies blow / Between the crosses, row on row"). In 1918 Moina Belle Michael, on reading McCrae's poem, pledged to always wear a red poppy as a sign of remembrance. Her idea spread, and in 1924 the Veterans of Foreign Wars launched its "Buddy Poppy" program to help disabled and needy veterans.

6. Abraham Lincoln

The line is from the final paragraph of Abraham Lincoln's second inaugural address, which he delivered on March 4, 1865, as the nation braced itself for the final throes of the Civil War.

7. "God Bless America," by Irving Berlin

In 1938, with the rise of Hitler, Irving Berlin dug out a song he'd written in 1918 for an army camp show, changed a few lyrics, and renamed it "God Bless America." On Nov. 10, Kate Smith sang it as the closing number on an Armistice Day edition of her immensely popular CBS Radio show. In short order it become the "peace anthem" that Berlin had wanted it to be — and Kate Smith's signature song.

8. Flags fly at half-staff on Veterans Day

Veterans Day is a time set aside to celebrate and honor those who have served in the armed services and therefore is not a day to fly flags at half-staff, a symbol of mourning.

APPLESAUCE CAKE

½ cup butter

½ tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp cloves

1 egg

½ tsp nutmeg

2 cups flour

1 cup chopped nuts (I prefer pecan but walnuts will work)

2 tsp baking soda

1 cup raisins

½ tsp salt


1 cup finely chopped dates

1 ½ cups thick, unsweetened applesauce

1 1/2tsp vanilla

1 tsp lemon extract

Beat butter and sugar until creamy. Add egg. Combine flour, soda, spices, and salt. Add dry alternating with applesauce to creamed butter and sugar. 1 cup at a time mix well between each addition. When all combined mix in nuts raisins and dates. Bake in a 13x9 pan at 350 degrees for 45 min or until done. Check with skewer after 45 min. I grease my pan or use parchment paper. Enjoy. You can shift powder sugar over the cake if you wish.






