"The Ebony Boat Club is a leader in the community for providing fun and educational water related activities and scholarships for youth since their founding in 1987. The members are all great people and I am honored





Good Evening Ebony



Boating In The Winter



The Fall boating season is here, and it is freezing on the water. The following are a few tips to consider when boating in the Fall.

Consider Survival Wear

Wearing appropriate clothing and footwear is vital for winter boating. However, a float coat or survival suit is a good investment if venturing out often.

Have Two Pairs of Warm Gloves

When you are fishing, one pair will likely get wet, So save the second pair for the ride home.

Use Hand and Toe Warmers

Put hand warmers in your gloves or at least in your jacket pockets. Use toe warmers in your boots, electric socks, or boot-warming insoles.

Cover Your Face and Eyes

Use ski goggles to cover your eyes when the boat is running fast, especially if you're the operator. A warm balaclava should cover all exposed facial flesh.

Face the Stern; Go Low

If you're a passenger, put your back to the bow and face the stern when the boat is running. Get low if possible; some passengers sit on a bean bag on the floor.

Keep Your PFD On

The shock of sudden entry into cold water dictates cold-weather boating prudence. If something goes drastically wrong, you have a better chance of survival in chilly water if your PFD is already on, secure, and properly fitted.

Make Sure Your Boat/Motor Is in Top Shape

This is not the time for a crippling breakdown that strands you, especially when fewer people on the water come to your assistance. Only go out if you have 100% confidence in your vessel. Make sure you have completed the essential maintenance for your boat.

- Check the fuel line and bulb and replace them if needed.
- Change the oil.
- Replace the oil filter.
- Replace the water impeller; this should be done at least once a year.

- Flush the raw-water system, then fill it with fresh antifreeze rated for your winter climate.
- Freshwater cooling systems need to have their coolant level topped up.
- Replace plugs.
- Change transmission fluid, if applicable.
- Check the wires and rotor cap.
- Check the belts and adjust tension as needed.
- Check the hoses for cracks, bulges, or soft spots and replace them as needed.
- Check the hose clamps for corrosion or wear and replace them as needed.
- Check the shift/throttle cables and tension, then lubricate the cables and linkage.
- Check the prop(s) for nicks and dents and repair them if necessary.
- Grease the prop shaft and threads.
- Remove the battery top-up electrolyte level and recharge if necessary)

Don't Take Chances

You could run aground, hit an underwater obstruction, disable your motor, or run aground; this happened to me once). In each case, you could be in for a long and cold time until you can get out of the predicament. Be realistic about your abilities and the circumstances, especially considering the coldness of the weather and the water. Consider how you'd have to deal with an incident you might otherwise avoid by making a good decision rather than a risky one. 

Happy New Year EBC!

What are the basic types of meeting rules? **STANDING RULES** are administrative details that are not important enough to be put into the bylaws and that do not relate to the conduct of business at meetings. For example, there might be a rule that the name of guests should be entered on a special guest register like the one at the entry point of Ebony Boat Club. This sort of administrative detail is put into **Standing Rules** or EBC **Standing Operating Procedures.** Standing rules require only a majority vote to adopt.

Sometimes a group gets into the habit of doing something in the same way over and over again until it becomes an established **custom**. No matter how long established a custom is, however, it can never conflict with a written rule- and if the conflict is pointed out, the written rule must be followed unless it is amended to incorporate the custom. Even if there is no such conflict the group itself may, by a vote decide in any particular case not to follow a custom that has not been included in an organization's written rules.

It is a good policy for every member to become familiar with the **Corporate Charter**, **Bylaws** and **Standard Operating Procedures** in order to fully participate in our Ebony Boat Club organization. "Robert's Rules of Order- In Brief-3rd Edition"

All About Fuel and Your Boat

How much fuel you need to carry depends on the design of your boat and the intended use. In a sailing vessel, for instance, a 50 gallon tank of diesel feeding a 25 hp auxiliary engine cursing at 80 percent of top speed could propel a 33 foot sailboat 300 miles at 7 knots in calm weather. That same amount of fuel would take a twin engine 40 foot sportfisher only about 33 miles at 40 knots. This boat would need 450 gallons to cover 300 miles at that speed. Planing hulls need much more power than displacement hulls and use more fuel per mile. However their ability to carry fuel is limited because their planing ability is affected by weight.

Many naval architects build in as little tankage as possible taking into consideration the design of the boat, reasonable usage and the distance between refueling stops in and around its normal area of operation. How much does it weigh?

Gasoline weighs about 6.1 pounds per gallon. Diesel weights about 7.1 pounds per gallon. Both gasoline and diesel engines use about 0.6 pound of fuel per horsepower per hour. On average, diesel fuel contains about 140,000 BTUs per gallon or 10 percent more energy than the same volume of gasoline.

Where does it go when it is consumed?

Your engine uses the fuel you purchase in several ways.

- 35 percent is given up to the atmosphere in heat
- 25 percent is given up in heat and vibration absorbed

- by surrounding water
- 10 percent is given up to overcome wave resistance
- 6 percent to overcome wave formation and prop wash against the hull
- 7 percent to overcome skin friction
- 2 percent is wasted in friction at the propeller shaft
- 1 percent to overcome air resistance

This leaves about 13-14 percent of the original energy to turn the propeller.

How much do gasoline and diesel engines consume?

Diesel engines consume about 1 gallon per hour for every 18 hp used. You can estimate the number of gallons consumed per hour by multiplying horsepower used by 0.055.

Note: An engine at cruising speed usually uses only about two-thirds of its maximum available horsepower. Most marine engines are designed to run continuously at between 60 and 75 percent of maximum speed. Diesels tend to be more toward the top of the range.

Gasoline four stroke inboard engines need about 1 gallon per hour for every 10 hp used. The number of gallons consumed per hour can be estimated by multiplying horsepower used by 0.100. (see note above)

Outboards might use considerably more since two stroke motors seem to have a greater thirst than four stroke motors.

What about fuel economy?

Any attempt to force a displacement hull beyond its maximum theoretical hull speed brings exponentially higher fuel consumption for minimal gain in speed. On the other hand, slowing down a little almost always is rewarded by gains in economy, and thus range. This same principle applies to high-speed planing hulls as well but only up to the point at which they start to come off plane. Once off plane they tend to lose efficiency.

How about fuel reserves?

Use the old rule of thumb; Use one-third of the fuel in your tank to get there, one-third to get back and save the last third as an emergency backup.

On, Kerry and Fabian in Miss Pankie D, And Glen and Dolores in Danielle! All smiling with glee



TowBoatUS Long Beach earns Tower of the Year honors

LONG BEACH, Calif., Jan. 20, 2023 – <u>TowBoatUS</u> <u>Long Bech</u>, a towing and assistance company much like an on-water auto club that helps boat owners get home after a boat breakdown, was awarded Tower of the Year at the annual gathering of the TowBoatUS fleet in New Orleans yesterday. Owned by captains Mike Del Grande and Ken Walker, TowBoatUS Long Beach was chosen from more than 130 independently owned TowBoatUS towing companies across the nation.

The coveted Tower of the Year award recognizes professionalism in providing recreational boaters with 24/7 on-water towing and assistance services. This includes a near-perfect 24-hour towing dispatch operation, high customer satisfaction surveys and onwater towing case management.

Also figuring into the company's commendation is the captains' willingness to help other new TowBoatUS companies learn the ropes of providing routine on-water assistance to recreational boaters 24/7 under all types of weather conditions.

"TowBoatUS Long Beach goes above and beyond to help mentor others who can benefit from their experience and operations," said BoatUS towing services vice president John Condon. "If someone has a question, captains Del Grande and Walker are always willing to help. They are role models who increase the professionalism and esprit de corp of the fleet."

The company also supported October's Breast Cancer Awareness month activities, including changing a red towboat to pink to help grow community awareness of the insidious disease.

Providing towing, soft ungrounding service, battery jumps and fuel drop-offs, the company is part of a nationwide network of more than 600 red TowBoatUS towboats at 300-plus locations – 10 in Southern California alone – that responds to more than 90,000 requests annually for routine on-water assistance.



Unfortunately, these days, selling your boat may be rife with attempts from "buyers" trying to fleece you! Here are the red flags for fraud and what to do about it.

For a boat owner who's ready to move on to his or her next great love, there's only one thing worse than being unable to sell the old boat: being hoodwinked out of it! Unfortunately, <u>boat sales are rife with fraud</u>, and it's difficult to sell a boat in this day and age without someone, somewhere, trying to trick you at least once, twice, or a dozen times as you endeavor to complete the boat-selling process.

Here's a case in point. I was selling my own boat last winter and, on five different occasions, some nefarious alleged boaters contacted me. All of the communications came via email and were virtually the same, beginning with what seemed like a reasonable inquiry such as the one copy-cut-pasted below:

"Hello Lenny. Are you the original owner? What is present condition and How long have you had the boat for? What is your best price for it. I will be able to make the payment by cashiers check and my mover will pick up after the check is cashed. Let me know if that works for you."

Red Flags Flying

- Red flag No. 1: Obvious poor punctuation and grammar. These scammers crank out a million and one of their "inquiries" every day and many of them have a poor grasp of the English language.
- Red flag No. 2: Everything the alleged buyer asked about was thoroughly detailed in the listing the fact that I'd owned the boat for 14 years (and obviously wasn't the original owner as the boat was more than 20 years old), and the condition of the boat.
- Red flag No. 3: Enlisting a third party to pick up the boat without the buyer ever having inspected it, much less having a survey done.

• Red flag No. 4: The offer to pay by cashier's check and pick up the boat after it had been cashed. This seems like a reasonable show of good faith, but scammers have become very good at printing fake checks so realistic that banks initially accept them. It isn't until days or even weeks later that the scam becomes apparent, and then the bank can pull those funds right back out of your account. Check with your bank to confirm its policy regarding final acceptance of funds.

With so much flag-waving going on, one would hope that I was suspicious of these emails, and I certainly was. So, I replied by asking, "May I have your full name and address so I can vet your authenticity?"In all but one of the cases, that ended the communication. In one, however, the "buyer" responded, "I'm not here for any game. My name is Crane Lance and my mover will come for the inspection and the pick up after the check is cashed. Let me have your contact number name and address." However, he still failed to provide his address or any way to verify who he was. At this point I was sure fraud was being attempted but decided to give it one more chance and asked again for his address. He did not provide it, though a day later he emailed again saying, "I'm waiting to hear from you."

At this point, as I sat looking at the computer screen with the multi-email trail between us displayed, I noticed that each of his communications had come via a different email address — yet another red flag. With enough of those flags to sew a sail now waving, I forwarded the entire communication to the authorities and reported possible fraud.

Warning Signs

In my own experience, several notable red flags popped right up from the start, but there are some other warning signs, in addition to the ones already mentioned, that should have boat sellers on watch. When you're selling a boat, you should immediately become concerned when any of these indications of fraud become apparent:

A Buffet Of Bogus Buyers

According to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), criminals have come to rely on their victim's sense of security provided by a cashier's check and official bank checks, while advanced graphics and printing technologies allow scammers to easily create fraudulent and hard-todetect counterfeit checks in a matter of minutes. Fake checks may also come in many forms and aren't necessarily cashier's checks. Personal or business checks, money orders, and even checks delivered electronically can all turn out to be fraudulent. There are various intricacies and definitions here, and one might find it beneficial to seek advice from a reputable attorney and/or a bank representative if there is any question. And using a licensed yacht broker may provide some protection.

In all of these cases, who do you think gets left holding the bag? FDIC says that if it's determined that the check is counterfeit days or even weeks after being deposited, you will likely be held personally responsible for the funds.

Telly Lehman, senior public affairs manager for the National Insurance Crime Bureau, confirms that scams involving cashier's checks are among the most common. "In one example the 'buyer' sends a cashier's check for an amount over the sale price," she says. "In some cases, the seller notices the discrepancy and offers to wire the overage back to the 'buyer.' Once the wire is done and the transfer of the boat is made, the 'buyer' is gone with both. Meanwhile, seven to 10 days later, the cashier's check is identified as fraudulent, leaving the seller without the boat and out the money wired for the supposed overage." Lehman says another scam to be aware of, one in which the seller is the fraudster, deals with fraudulent escrow accounts. "In this case, someone is selling a boat and a potential buyer is located in a different part of the country," she explains. "In these cases, due to the remote locations of both parties, the seller suggests they use an escrow account. The buyer, feeling comfortable that things seem secure, deposits the money into the escrow account. Unfortunately, the escrow account is phony. As a result, the 'seller' gets the money and the buyer is out the cash."

We often use the term "escrow account" without understanding what it means. An escrow account set up by the seller may be called that but may not be safe because it's under the sole control of the seller. Typically, an escrow account should be an actual bank account set up by a third-party attorney and/or broker and subject to the regulatory requirements of a state or industry (such as the brokerage industry) and professional licensing sanctions.

With Respiratory Viruses Circulating, 12 Bay Area Health Officials Recommend Actions To Stay Healthy for the Holidays

This holiday season, another surge in COVID infections, along with high levels of influenza (flu) and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), are straining healthcare systems and impacting families.

The good news is that there are easy actions everyone can take to stay healthy this season. Twelve Bay Area health officers recommend the following steps:

Get Vaccinated Against Flu and COVID.

- The updated Omicron COVID booster, also known as the bivalent booster, targets the Omicron variant, as well as the original 2020 virus. The Omicron boosters are available for ages six months and older. These improved vaccines are the best protection against severe symptoms of COVID and hospitalization.
- Earlier in the pandemic, COVID vaccination rates in the Bay Area were high, shielding some communities from the worst outcomes.

This vaccine protection has decreased over time, but an Omicron COVID booster can rebuild it. In most parts of the Bay Area, less than half of eligible people have received the updated Omicron COVID booster.

- More people in the Bay Area are getting the flu this year than earlier in the pandemic. Flu is not the same as the common cold and can lead to sudden, severe illness in the very young, seniors, and those with underlying medical conditions.
- Now is the time to get your flu shot. Your doctor can give you the flu shot and the Omicron COVID booster in the same visit. COVID shots are free and other recommended immunizations are widely available at low or no cost.
- There is no vaccine for RSV, but simple measures like regular hand washing and covering coughs can help.

Stay Home if You Are Sick.

- No matter which virus you have, if you are feeling sick the best way to keep from spreading it to others is to stay home until you have recovered. If you think it might be COVID, get tested.
- People who need urgent or emergency medical care, including testing or treatment for influenza or COVID, should seek it.

Wear a Mask in Indoor Public Places.

- Masks can prevent transmission of COVID, flu, RSV, and other respiratory viruses all at once.
- Wearing a high-quality mask, such as a KN94, KN95 or N95, can prevent you from getting sick and missing out on life, work, school, and holiday parties. Masking is strongly recommended indoors in public settings to prevent the spread of viruses and reduce the risk of illness.
- Masks also lower the likelihood that you pass on an infection if you are already sick, even if your symptoms are mild. This helps protect people around you, especially those at higher risk of serious illness.
- Improve ventilation indoors by turning on HVAC systems, filtering the air with a portable HEPA filter, pointing fans out open windows, or opening doors and windows when possible. These can all help viruses from spreading indoors.
 - Reduce the chances of infecting someone else with COVID by finding out if you have the virus before gathering with others. Remember, COVID symptoms may be mild or absent. Make sure to stock up on home test kits.

Get Treatment, if Needed.

- Free treatments are available if you test positive for COVID. Free medication prevents hospitalization and is available to most adults and some teens with even mild symptoms.
- Talk to your doctor about treatment options or visit covid19.ca.gov/treatment or find a test to treat location near you: aspr.hhs.gov/ TestToTreat. Treatments work best when started right after symptoms begin, and within 5 days of symptoms starting.
- Health Officers from the counties of Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Monterey, Napa, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Francisco, San Mateo, Solano, Sonoma, and the city of Berkeley encourage the public to take these easy steps to protect themselves and others from missing holiday moments and to ease the burden on local health systems. Across the Bay Area, respiratory viruses impact the most vulnerable, including young children, the immunocompromised, people living in crowded housing or congregate living facilities, and seniors, especially at skilled nursing facilities.

RECIPES FROM THE GALLEY

SPINACH AND FETA BROWNIES



Well as you might have guessed there is no chocolate in this recipe. It is a savory type of bar that is one of the most delicious and easy things I've made. Yes, that good. It's got major spanakopita vibes. My family devoured them in less than 15 minutes. I guess we need to double the batch next time.

The spinach, feta and mozzarella are the key players in this recipe. I roughly chopped the baby spinach, diced the scallions and chopped the dill. These are also the main characters in spanakopita. And let's not forget the feta. But here it shares the stage with mozzarella.

The flour can be substituted with oat flour, although I would add a little more oat flour than a cup. Next time I will make them with olive oil instead of butter just to try out the variance in taste and texture. Should be fine, in my opinion, to substitute it in for the butter. The crusty brown top is one of the best parts of this bar. Make sure you sprinkle on that grated Parmesan cheese.

Ingredients

- 2 tsp olive oil
- 4 scallions, diced
- 10 oz baby spinach, rough chop
- 2 tbs dill, chopped
- 1 cup all purpose flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 cup milk
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 4 oz shredded mozzarella
- 4 oz feta cheese, crumbled
- 2 tbs grated parmesan cheese

Preheat your oven to 375°F. Lightly spray a medium size baking dish with olive oil. Mine was 10.5 x 7.5 inches.

Instructions

- In a large, deep pan, heat 1 tsp oil on medium. Cook your scallions until they soften: 1 or 2 minutes. Add half the spinach and sauté until mostly wilted, season with salt and pepper to taste. Remove to a colander to drain and pat dry with paper towels to remove excess liquids. Add the remaining oil to your pan and repeat the process with the remaining spinach.
- In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt. Add the milk, eggs, butter and mix. Lastly fold in the spinach mixture, dill, mozzarella and feta until just combined. Transfer to your baking dish and spread out evenly. Sprinkle top with grated Parmesan and bake for 40-45 minutes or until top turns golden brown. Remove from oven and allow to cool for 15 minutes prior to slicing.
