



"SPORT FISH RESTORATION, RECREATIONAL BOATING SAFETY, AND WILDLIFE RESTORATION ACT OF 2021,"

BoatUS: Signing of Infrastructure BillIs Good for Recreational Boaters, Anglers

SPRINGFIELD. VA. Nov. 15, 2021 - With President Biden's signing today of the \$1.2 trillion bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), you may have mistakenly thought that only road, bridge, rail, power and water infrastructure, public transit, drinking and wastewater, high speed internet, environmental. and clean energy interests may benefit. The nation's

largest advocacy, services, and safety group, Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS), says recreational boaters also made some significant gains on the bill touted as a "once-in-a-generation investment in our infrastructure."

The biggest payoff for boaters with the IIJA comes the reauthorization of the "Sport Fish Restoration, Recreational Boating Safety, and Wildlife Restoration Act of 2021," which provides funding for state-based conservation programs, boating safety, aquatic resources education, pump-out, derelict vessel, fisheries management and restoration.

'Sport Fish' also funds recreational boat access, such as local launch ramps, as well as the highly popular Boating Infrastructure Grant (BIG) program that grows the availability of safe and protected harborage for overnight, transient boaters. A "user pay – public benefit" funding mechanism, Sport Fish's nearly \$650 million trust fund budget comes from boat fuel taxes and excise

taxes paid by boaters and anglers purchasing fishing and boating equipment.

"The reauthorization of Sport Fish is the cornerstone of so much of what recreational boaters and anglers connect to while on the water," said BoatUS Manager of Government Affairs David Kennedy. He adds, "BoatUS greatly thanks Sport Fish reauthorization bill sponsors, Senators Maria Cantwell (D-WA) and Roger Wicker (R-MS), and Representatives Debbie Dingell (D-MI) and Garett Graves (R-LA). Their bipartisanship is a big plus for boaters and anglers."

Sport Fish reauthorization will also pay for a comprehensive study on the growing number of non-motorized paddle-craft, resultant user conflicts, and potential for increased accidents. Kennedy notes that while paddle-craft operators utilize launch ramps and other recreational boating facilities, "they do not currently pay into the trust fund, and we need to look at how to equitably fund waterway access points."

IIJA also provides funds to US Army Corps of Engineers and other water-resource projects, including inland waterways construction, flood control, resiliency, watershed rehabilitation, aquatic ecosystem restoration, invasive species control, marine debris removal, and inland and coastal navigation projects — all good things to any boater's or angler's ear.





A Message From : SAFETY & TRAINING OFFICER





As the holidays rapidly approach I would like to wish everyone a very safe and happy holiday. Training information for this month comes to us from BoatUS sharing with us the power of using a checklist. After all Santa checks his list twice! Just couldn't resist that one!

It's important to have everything in order, prior to taking off and returning from a boat trip. A checklist is a good way to remember the things you need, and the necessary steps that must be done. It's best to make a checklist as you prepare for your next boating trip, vacation or even a local store run. Simplify your life by preparing a checklist and see how much more organized you'll feel.

The Power Of Checklists



Our memories may be fallible — checklists are not.

We've all been there. We leave the boat, then halfway home wonder if we remembered to close the seacocks or connect shore power or some other potentially worrisome chore. We either turn around and go all the way back to check, or have a few sleepless nights until we return to the boat. But there's a simple, old-school way to avoid this: checklists. You almost certainly already use them anyway (even a recipe is a kind of checklist), so why not use one of the most powerful tools you already have? You'll not only sleep better, you might even save your boat.

Why You Should Use A Checklist

- Checklists verify that you've done what you need to.
- They save time when you have repetitive tasks.
- Checklists free up mental memory for other things.

☑ They provide concrete evidence that you didn't forget anything.

When you do something that involves multiple steps, it's easy to forget one or two of them, and sometimes missing even a simple thing can have major implications. Checklists counteract our forgetfulness. Many professionals, such as airline pilots, use checklists several times each flight. Airline pilot Brian Koda, who also flies military aircraft as a Naval Reservist, says there are no fewer than six checklists that pilots use just to get the airplane from the gate to the runway. Some checklists, he said, are "written in blood," which means they were developed after a catastrophe to prevent it from happening again. Surgeons also use checklists to make sure they don't forget something critical in the operating room. Checklists for boaters can include mundane pre-departure routines to those that help you in an emergency, such as what to do if your boat is sinking.

To make them more useful, checklists should be more than just a few things jotted on a scrap of paper. You'll want to first focus on the essential stuff that is frequently overlooked or skipped that may potentially sink your boat or endanger your crew. Next, what can damage your engine or electrical system? Finally, include a couple of small things that tend to slip through the cracks (see samples below). Checklists should ideally have no more than 10 items and should be able to accomplish in 1 to 2 minutes or they may start to feel like a distraction, which is when people often start "shortcutting," thus reducing their effectiveness. As the pilot told us, you can't spell out every single detail; a checklist cannot fly a plane. If you need more items, just make a separate checklist. For example, if your "leaving the boat" checklist is too long, make one for

"locking up the boat" and another for "returning to the dock."

Tip: To make a reusable checklist, laminate the page and use a dry-erase marker to check off each task when completed.

You'll want to use your checklist, test it, and refine it a few times as needed. If something changes on your boat, like you add a washdown pump that you want to remember to switch off at the panel, add it, though you may need to combine it with other similar tasks so the list doesn't get too long. In this case, you can add turning off the wash-down pump to, say, turn off the cabin lights. For most uses, checklists should be a simple, one-page document printed in an easy-to-read font and a place to clearly check off each item.

Digital Checklists

If you prefer not to use a physical checklist, there are websites and apps that can make the job easy. Google Tasks might be the easiest as it integrates with your Google account if you have one so you can access your checklists on any connected device.

There are many apps for making checklists on your smartphone or tablet, and most are free. Many of them sync to all your devices, allowing you to use any connected device onboard.

For iPhone users, the built-in Notes app also has the ability to easily make checklists, and your iCloud account can make them instantly available on your tablet.

COOKIE CAKE

Muffin-Tin Key Lime Pies

Key lime pie is great, but these adorable cocktail party-sized Key lime pies are out of this world!

Ingredients

1 cup graham cracker crumbs (about 8 squares)
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
4 tablespoons butter, melted
1 can (14 oz) sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated)
4 egg yolks
1/2 cup fresh lime juice
1 tablespoon grated lime peel
3/4 cup heavy whipping cream
tablespoon powdered sugar

Heat oven to 350°F. Place foil muffin liner in each of 12 regular-size muffin cups. Spray liners with cooking spray. In medium bowl, mix graham cracker crumbs, granulated sugar and melted butter. Divide mixture evenly among cups; press into cups using bottom of glass. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until firm; remove. Cool 5 minutes. Meanwhile, in large bowl, beat condensed milk and yolks with whisk. Stir in lime juice and 1 teaspoon of the lime peel. Divide mixture evenly among cups. Bake 9 to 11 minutes or until set. Cool completely in muffin pan on rack, then cover and refrigerate at least 2 hours but no longer than 12 hours. Just before serving, beat whipping cream in medium bowl with electric mixture 45 to 90 seconds or until it just holds soft peaks. Add powdered sugar and remaining 2 teaspoons lime peel; beat to stiff peaks, 30 to 60 seconds. Top pies with whipped cream mixture.

Here's a Quick Way to Check if Your Spices Are out of Date

If you have spices that are made in this location, they could be upwards of 25 years old. By **Zee Krstic**



We all know too well that one of the most overlooked areas of our kitchens is the spice cabinet — which ich shouldn't be the case, given that some cleaning and regular maintenance could save you

from horrifying bug infestations.

It can be hard to tell when spices go out of date, since there's usually no telltale odor or outward signs when they're past their prime. But, over time, your spices can lose their signature flavor or potential health benefits, so it's important to keep your spice pantry updated. Thankfully, one of the nation's leading spice manufacturers is making it easy for you to get a jumpstart on your spring cleaning with a handy tip.

On Friday, McCormick shared some information on its Facebook page that might save you from eating really old, expired spices lurking in your kitchen cabinet. The post has been shared over 2,000 times—and, if you're anything like us, you'll be rifling through your spices soon after learning this tidbit of information.

"When's the last time you took a peek into your spice cabinet? You should see 'Hunt Valley, MD' on McCormick labels," the brand wrote. "If you see 'Baltimore, MD,' the spice is at least 25 years old."

On the now-viral post, a few home cooks shared their surprise when they discovered their spices had been in their kitchens for more than a quarter of a century. <u>TODAY reports</u> that McCormick, a Maryland-based company that moved to Hunt Valley from Baltimore, also says to throw out any of their spices found in metal tins. Besides their black pepper, the popular spice brand hasn't used tins since the early 1990s.

Representatives from McCormick told The Daily Meal that they've seen many cases where customers have kept spices way past their expiration date. You can tell if your spices are too old if they aren't aromatic, or if they fail to provide a flavor boost to food.

"Check the freshness date on the bottom or side of the bottle to help keep track of when it's past its prime. Or, check the spices for color and aroma look for vibrant color and strong aroma."

The Daily Meal also reached out to the Food and Drug Administration to ask the question on everyone's minds: What exactly happens when you



eat expired spices? FDA spokesman Peter Cassell says that spices can last up to two years if you store them properly, but there's a small chance you can avoid getting sick by actually cooking with them.

"In many cuisines, spices are added during cooking rather than at the table, and this heat treatment can reduce pathogen contamination depending on the length of cooking and temperature. It's also important to follow basic food handling practices—cook, chill, clean, and separate."

At any rate, we're betting it's high time your spice rack saw some action. Here's a guide to all the essentials you'll need when you finally get around to cleaning that under-the-radar spot in your kitchen.


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

Why You Should Save Your Garlic Skins

It is mystifying to me that there was a time in America when people didn't eat copious amounts of garlic. Garlic is delicious. Garlic is an essential part of so many dishes. I often have too much garlic in the fridge because the prospect of not having any is so terrifying to me. I usually double the amount suggested in a recipe. I mean, it makes food taste good! But as long as I've been cooking, I've been discarding garlic's paper-like skin as soon as I'm done peeling or smashing the clove. Turns out, that's a mistake.

Garlic skin isn't trash—it's something you can cook with and get a lot of flavor out of. Keeping it not only cuts down on food waste, but can impart a whole new level of garlic into your dishes. If you're making a sauce that you're going to strain anyway, you can just smash the garlic clove and keep the skin on. If

you're mincing or slicing the garlic, just throw the garlic skin in a zip-top bag and freeze it. The next time you make stock, throw it in with your vegetables and bones. You can even just include it in a bouquet garni in a soup, as long as you make sure to wrap everything up in a nice cheesecloth packet before-hands there's nothing more annoying than trying to fish out loose ingredients from a pot of soup.

Garlic skin has health benefits, too. There's a lot of vitamin A and C in there, as well as anti-inflammatory phenylpropanoid antioxidants. Some cooks also use a mortar and pestle to break up garlic skin and add it to bread dough to impart a mild garlic flavor and get those good nutrients in your next loaf. Garlic skin is a big help too when you're roasting garlic—you can keep the head intact and just squeeze out the cloves as needed.

So go ahead and keep that garlic skin rather than putting it into the trash or the compost. After all, garlic is as good as ten mothers.




