




The EBC Club house has been closed now since the end of March. All scheduled events had been canceled and club meetings are being conducted via ZOOM. This is now our new norm!

The effort of Dockwalkers is to increase boater awareness about clean and safe boating in California, thus improving the recreation experience of boaters while helping preserve the precious wildlife habitat and water quality of this state.

The virus forced EBC to cancel all scheduled calendar events until further notice. All meetings were now being conducted via ZOOM, because the COVID-19 cases were on the rise again!

JULY - In addition to dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic, we now must also deal with the evacuations of residences due to the unusual hot weather and fires caused by lighting strikes. The COVID-19 pandemic has forced scores of yacht clubs all over northern California to postpone or

cancel some of their biggest and long anticipated events. Ebony Boat Club is no exception, both our sacred Annual Jazz & Wine Festival and our fabulous White Party are not taking place because of the havoc the virus is dispatching out this year. The PICYA Executive Board and Wheelchair Regatta Committee under much consideration reluctantly had to cancel the Margot Brown Wheelchair Regatta that was scheduled for September 26th due to safety protocols pertaining to the COVID-19 pandemic.

California Department of Health: Effective July 13, 2020, ALL counties must close indoor operations in these sectors: Dine-in restaurants, wineries and tasting rooms, movie theaters, family entertainment centers (for example: bowling alleys, miniature golf, batting cages and arcades) zoos and museums, cardrooms, bars, brewpubs, breweries, and pubs must close all operations both indoor and outdoor statewide. Counties that have remained on the County Monitoring List for 3 consecutive days will be required to shut down the following industries unless they can be modified to operate outside or by pick- up. Fitness centers, Worship services, protests. For non-essential sectors: Personal care services, like nail salons, body waxing, tattoo parlors, hair salons, barbershops and Malls.

AUGUST - Herbicide treatment of invasive submersed aquatic vegetation continues in various areas of the Sacramento, San Joaquin and Delta waterways.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, this year the annual Coastal Cleanup Day (CCD) event is going to have a different approach: Instead of a one-day statewide event, we will be encouraging volunteers to clean their neighborhoods, local parks, local creeks, or other natural areas, either alone or with only the people with whom they have been sheltering-in-place with. Instead of just one day, we will be asking people to volunteer each Saturday during the month of September, between 9am to noon.

EBC members start to work on the 2021 Calendar of Events with the hope of things being back to some new sort of Normal for next year. All events are on contingent on the status of the COVID-19 virus starting in the new year.

EBC clubhouse continues to be shut down and all monthly meeting are being held via ZOOM. It's really the only time we get the opportunity to see one another. Members have been asked to periodically reach out to one another by phone to make sure everyone is safe and doing alright.

As many states prepare for the possible reopening of schools, lets all continue to pray for the safety of our kids as they return to the many campuses nation wide. Newsom Imposes New Restrictions To Curb COVID-19



California is experiencing the fastest increase in cases we have seen yet – faster than what we experienced at the outset of the pandemic or even this summer. The spread of COVID-19, if unchecked, could quickly overwhelm our health care system and lead to catastrophic outcomes. New imposed restrictions on businesses across most of the state, masks would now be required outside homes with limited exceptions. California was the first in the U.S. to issue a statewide stay-at-home order back in March

COVID-19 has affected our lives for much of this year. As the holidays approach, we're all hoping for some normal activities - to be with family and friends, travel and eat out, continue traditions. These are normal feelings, but we should remain cautious. Many people are wondering if it's safe to travel or gather with family and friends. Currently, COVID-19 infections are on the rise in many parts of the country, including Northern California. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) advises that traveling increases your chance of getting and spreading the virus. Staying home and avoiding gatherings with those outside your household is the best way to protect yourself and others from COVID-19. (Your Care Team at Kaiser Permanente)

DECEMBER - With ZOOM being the glue holding the communication side of the club together, the 31st Annual Inauguration and Installation of the 2021 Officers was held on Saturday, December 12th. We have a long way to go, but we will stay determined, persistent and vigilant in securing the path forward by continuing to sustain the history of the Ebony Bout Club.

As we look forward to the new year, let's hope we can continue to "Rise Above All Waves.



KNOTS AND HOW TO TIE THEM

Rope vs Line?

You buy **rope** at a marine or hardware store. ... It is all rope you buy for the boat for a variety of uses, once it gets on the boat it becomes "Line". That is the only difference. The end of the line tied to something on the boat or dock is called the "standing end" and the free end of the line is called the "bitter end".

The Bowline:

- The Bowline creates a loop at the end of a rope that cannot shrink or expand.
- This knot is often taught and illustrated with a poem of a rabbit coming out of the hole, hopping in front of a tree, going behind the tree, and back down his original hole.

How to Tie a Bowline:

Form a loop on top of the long end of the line. Pass the working end of the line up through the loop and around behind the line. Then pass the working end down through the original loop, all



while maintaining the shape of the second loop you create, which becomes your bowline loop. Once the "rabbit" is back down its hole, pull the "tree" up to tighten the bowline.

My greatest mentor once told me, "When you get to the end of your rope, tie a bowline and hang on!"

The Figure Eight:

- The Figure Eight used in climbing and sailing
- A handy single-strand "stopper" knot that prevents rope from sliding through something like a grommet.
- The figure eight knot creates a stopper wherever you need one on a rope
- The steps are also steps you take to create several other knots

How to Tie the Figure Eight:

To tie a figure eight, also known as a Flemish bend, simply pass the free end of a line over itself to form a loop. Continue under and around the line, and finish the knot by passing the working end down through the original loop.



The Sheet Bend:

- Connect a fat rope to a skinny one.
- Connect a rope to the corner of a tarp that lacks a grommet
- Connects one rope to another.
- Joins together lines or materials that normally couldn't be joined together because of differences in diameter.

How to Tie the Sheet Bend:

To create a sheet bend, bend the thicker or more slippery rope into a "J" shape (like a fish hook). Then pass the other rope through the hook shape from behind, wrap it around



the entire fishhook once and then tuck the smaller line between itself and the other rope.

If the ropes are the same diameter and texture, the sheet bend actually resembles a square knot. To tie a sheet bend with fabric or a tarp, collect, squeeze, and shape the material into a "J" shape, and then run your rope through and around the "J."

America's Boating Course



This course is offered in a classroom setting in March and September each year and as an individual study course at any time. The course covers information of interest to new boaters and boaters who just want to refresh their boating knowledge. Successful completion of this NASBLA approved course meets the requirements for the California Boater's Card and will also qualify for insurance discounts with most carriers. Subjects covered include basic terminology and types of boats, environmental considerations, use of a marine radio, trailering, anchoring, knots, weather considerations, basic operations, federal and state regulations, and rules of the road. (\$35 fee)

Partner in Command

This is a one-day training course designed for spouses, partners, older children, and friends of the boat owner and concentrates on teaching the individual how to handle the boat in the event the owner becomes unable to command the vessel. The program is similar to Jump Start however, it assumes that the skipper will perform any follow-up training with the student. This training is performed at the SJDPS Training Facility Island located on the Delta and includes a light dinner following the training. Participants are welcome to come out to the island on Friday and may stay over Saturday evening if they desire. (\$60 fee)

Jump Start Program

The Jump Start Program is designed for the new boater or a boater who has moved to a different type of vessel and feels the need for one-on-one instruction to help him become comfortable with his new boat. Training includes a review of a current Vessel Safety Check, environmental considerations, discussion of information given in the ABC Course, and hands-on, on-the-water instruction of the particular vessel. This training can be tailored to the specific desires of the boat owner. The program is provided free of charge, however, the following criteria must be met: the instructor must be invited by the boat owner, the boat must have current insurance and Vessel Safety Check, life jackets must be worn at all times, the weather must be suitable, and the instructor must be competent on the particular type vessel.

U.S. Coast Guard Survey Offers Heaps of Data on Recreational Boating National Boating Safety Survey shapes local, national safety policy

An all-encompassing report on recreational boating activity in the U.S. is giving the <u>U.S. Coast Guard</u>, policymakers and the boating community the ability to shape smart boating safety policy into the future. Issued last week by the Coast Guard, The <u>National Recreational Boating Safety Survey</u> (NRBSS) looks at boating participation demographics, trends, boat use, at-risk boating populations, boating safety and more. The survey data, captured in 2018, includes all types of onwater activity from canoes, kayaks, rafts and rowboats to sailboats, skulls, airboats, motorized boats and personal watercraft.

"While a number of factors have made recreational boating safer over the years, such as stronger laws, regulations, boating safety education, better enforcement, and improved manufacturing standards, it all relies on having the best data possible," said BoatUS Manager of Government Affairs David Kennedy. "This information is going to help guide and develop policies that matter to boaters."

Some notable findings:

- Ownership: It is estimated that approximately 25.2 million boats were owned by 14.5 million households in 2018. Evidence suggests that joint/shared ownership is an increasingly popular way to secure access to boats. While the vast majority (94.5% or 23.83 million) of boats in the country were owned exclusively by someone residing in the household, nearly 1.4 million boats were in some manner of joint/shared ownership.
- **Registered/nonregistered boats:** There were 11.82 million boats registered in the 50 states

and the District of Columbia in 2018. Almost 13.4 million boats were owned in 2018 in the

- United States that were not required to be registered by the state where they were kept and operated. Open powerboats continue to be owned by more households than any other types of boat, while approximately 4.24 million households owned one or more kayaks and about 2.14 million households were owners of canoes.
- The survey summary notes: "The proportion of all boats that are unregistered is creating a number of financial and management issues and difficulties for boating safety and law enforcement agencies as well as agencies that provide and manage boat access and infrastructure facilities. Foremost, owners of unregistered boats do not pay registration fees, and because most are human-powered boats. they do not purchase fuel for these boats and therefore do not pay fuel taxes, which support the development and maintenance of boating access and infrastructure as well as boating safety education and enforcement." A number of states are currently considering expanding registration requirements to include various types and sizes of human-powered craft.
- **Boat use:** Boats that were operated in 2018 were taken out on the water a total of 471.8 million days. Across all owned boats, the average number of days a vessel is used is 19 days 29 days for motorized boats and 12 days for human-powered boats. Outings, meaning different occasions that boats were operated out on the water, lasted an average of 3.8 hours. On average, boats that went out on the water in 2018 had 2.3 persons aboard.
- Operator use: A total of 10.2 billion person hours of boating took place in 2018, with person hours aboard motorized boats representing 84.1% (8.6 billion) of the total. Over 1.3 billion hours were spent boating on human-powered boats. Five states Florida, Michigan, Texas, South Carolina, and New York represented about 31% of all person boat hours that year. The

- state of Florida represented about 10.7% (1.089 billion hours) of all person hours nationwide, followed by Michigan (603.7 million) and Texas (522.3 million).
- Regional boat use: Contrary to what has sometimes been assumed, boats in southern states are not, in general, operated more days, on average, than boats in northern states. In fact, motorized boats in the Midwest (56 days) and Northeast (55 days) census regions were operated more days, on average, than in the South (52 days) and West (52 days) census regions. About 647,000 boats in coastal and Great Lakes states were operated at least once more than 3 miles from shore in 2018.
- Safety: About one-third (33.7% or 220,000) of all boats and 32.8% of motorized boats that operated over 3 nautical miles from shore were equipped with EPIRBs while 83.2% of the motorized boats that were operated at least once were equipped with an emergency engine cutoff switch. Just 13.9% had VHF-DSC radios. About two-thirds (65.6%) of the persons that operated a boat in 2018 had not taken a boating safety course.
- Trailered boats: About 6 million boats that were operated in 2018 were either trailered or transported (i.e., on top of a car, in a truck) at least once for the purpose of launching them on the water, representing almost two-thirds (65.3%) of the boats that were operated during 2018. Boats were trailered/transported for the purpose of launching them 167.3 million times in 2018.
- **Boater socioeconomics:** In 2018, an estimated 84.54 million recreational boaters of different ages, races, and ethnicities in the United States participated in boating, or 26.5% of the U.S. population. Boat-owning households were predominately all-white households. All Black/African American households represented less than 1% of boat-owning households. The survey summary notes, "This may be a significant factor in limiting participation of more minority persons in boating given that the NRBSS

- Participation Survey found that not knowing anyone who owns a boat was a significant reason why more persons did not boat in 2018." Other and mixed-race households constituted 16.3% of all boat-owning households.
- Survey findings showed that the greatest percentage of boating participants do not, as is sometimes assumed, have high household incomes. Almost a quarter (23.1%) of boatowning households in 2018 had household incomes of less than \$50,000, and 41.8% earned less than \$75,000. Households with household incomes between \$75,000 and \$149,999 represents 37.5% of boat-owning households.
- Fatalities/accidents: The risk of boating fatalities is six per 100 million person hours for all types of boats nationwide and five per 100 million person hours for motorized boating. This low rate is attributable to practicing safer boating behaviors due to boater education, regulations and inspections as well as safer boats and safeboating technologies. However, the risk for fatalities nationwide was twice as high on human-powered boats: 13 per 100 million person hours.

7 Myths About Cronavirus Vaccines

Separating fact from fiction when it comes to getting vaccinated against COVID-19 by Rachel Nania, **AARP**, Updated December 14, 2020

The first vaccine to fight COVID-19 has been authorized for emergency use by the federal government — a move that could slow the spread of coronavirus and help bring an end to the pandemic — and another candidate is right behind it in the process. By the end of the year, millions of high-risk Americans will likely be vaccinated against a virus that has so far killed nearly 300,000 people in the U.S. But the unprecedented speed of vaccine development has generated a number of misconceptions that have fueled skepticism among some Americans. Here are some prevalent coronavirus vaccine myths and the truth behind the medicines designed to combat COVID-19.

Myth #1: If you've had COVID-19 already, you don't need to get vaccinated.

The verdict is still out when it comes to how long you are protected from COVID-19 after a previous infection — what's referred to as natural immunity. In fact, "early evidence suggests natural immunity from COVID-19 may not last very long," the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) explains. Because of this, "people may be advised to get a COVID-19 vaccine even if they have been

sick with COVID-19 before," the agency states. Health officials will keep the public informed with any developments and recommendations as more is learned about the duration of natural immunity.

Myth #2: Once you receive the coronavirus vaccine, you're immune for life.

It's also unknown how long immunity from a coronavirus vaccine will last and whether it will need to be administered more than once, or even on a regular basis, like the flu shot. For now, "we should think about this as maybe in the same zone as a tetanus shot, where you might need a booster" every few years, National Institutes of Health (NIH) Director Francis Collins, M.D., said in a recent AARP teletown hall on the subject. "If we're lucky, it would be like measles, where once you're immune, you're immune for life, but that would be really lucky," he added.

Myth #3: You can ditch your mask after you get vaccinated.

The vaccine is one tool that can help slow the spread of the coronavirus, but others will be needed to bring the pandemic to an end — these include mask wearing, social distancing, frequent hand washing and testing. One reason: It will likely take several months to get the majority of Americans who want a coronavirus vaccine vaccinated, health officials predict. And until a substantial portion of the population develops resistance to COVID-19 and so-called herd immunity is reached, the virus will continue to spread and sicken people. Another: Protection isn't instantaneous. "It typically takes a few weeks" for the body to develop memory cells for the virus after vaccination, which means "it is possible that a person could be infected" with the coronavirus just after receiving the vaccine and then get sick with COVID-19 "because the vaccine did not have enough time to provide protection," the CDC explains. In this case, face masks, social distancing and other recommended efforts can help prevent an infection while the body builds up immunity. Finally: While the leading vaccines have proven effective at preventing COVID-19, it's not yet clear whether they can block virus transmission. Masks, however, have demonstrated their effectiveness at stopping virus particles from infecting others. "We have to do everything in our power to figure out how to stop this virus today and set ourselves up for the best success so that as the vaccine continues to be rolled out, we can really give it its best chance to additionally stop spread," said Michael Mina, M.D., assistant professor of epidemiology at Harvard's T.H. Chan School of Public Health.

Myth #4: The vaccines use a live version of the coronavirus.

None of the vaccines in late-stage development in the U.S. use the live virus that causes COVID-19, the CDC confirms. Instead, the leading vaccine candidates use scientific techniques to train the human body to recognize and fight the coronavirus by either introducing a harmless piece of the virus (not the entire germ) to the body or by giving the body instructions to make its own coronavirus-like protein. The body then recognizes these proteins shouldn't be there and produces antibodies to fight them off. Then, the immune system establishes memory to protect against future infections. While the coronavirus vaccines will not make you sick with COVID-19, like other vaccines, including the flu shot and the vaccine that protects against shingles, they can cause side effects in some people. A small share of participants enrolled in the Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna/NIH clinical trials reported temporary side effects after their shots. Symptoms included injection site pain, fatigue, headaches, chills and muscle aches. Researchers have so far not identified any major safety concerns with these

two vaccines, but participants and early vaccine recipients will be monitored for long-term adverse events.

Myth #5: mRNA vaccines can alter your DNA.

Two of the four vaccine candidates in late-stage U.S. trials (the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine, which was authorized by the federal government on Dec. 11, and the Moderna/NIH vaccine) utilize a new type of technology called messenger RNA, or mRNA for short. Think of mRNA as an instruction manual: It directs the body to build an immune response to a specific infection. Currently, there are no licensed mRNA vaccines in the U.S., and the newness of them has generated suspicion among some. One widely circulated myth on social media claims that mRNA vaccines can alter human DNA. This, however, is not the case, according to experts at the CDC. For starters, the mRNA from the vaccine "never enter the nucleus of the cell, which is where our DNA are kept. This means the mRNA does not affect or interact with our DNA in any way," the CDC states. What's more, after the cells use the instructions the mRNA delivers — in the case of the COVID-19 vaccines, the instructions are to build the coronavirus' signature spike protein so the body can develop an immune response should it ever encounter the real deal down the road — they destroy the mRNA. Though new, the CDC stresses that mRNA vaccines will be held to the same safety and effectiveness standards as other vaccines that are approved or authorized in the U.S.

Myth #6: You don't need both doses of the two-dose vaccines.

All but one of the vaccines in late-stage development require two doses that are given a few weeks apart. And because health experts are not sure whether one dose will be effective enough to prevent COVID-19 or a severe case of the illness, skipping the second shot is not a good idea. As the CDC explains: The first shot starts building protection; the second shot boosts that protection and "is needed to get the most protection the vaccine has to offer." A peer-reviewed analysis from Pfizer/BioNTech's phase 3 clinical trial found that its vaccine had an efficacy of about 52 percent after the first shot. After the second dose, the efficacy jumped to 95 percent. Efficacy data for the other two-dose vaccines is still pending. "We don't know what happens after a single dose," William Moss, M.D., executive director of the International Vaccine Access Center at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, told AARP in a previous interview. "Certainly, we can't expect [that one dose will confer] the high degree of protection" that both doses demonstrated in phase 3 clinical trials, he added.

Myth #7: If you got the flu shot this year, you don't need a coronavirus vaccine.

While the flu and COVID-19 share a similar list of symptoms, they are two different illnesses, caused by two different viruses. So when it comes to the vaccines, "it's not one or the other," Anthony Fauci, M.D., director of the National Institutes of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), explained in a recent AARP tele-town hall event. "You want to be doubly protected from the flu and from coronavirus," Fauci said — especially since it's possible to get infected by both viruses at the same time, or one right after another, which can be taxing on the lungs and other organs.


