Santa surely must be a time lord and the Tardis his sleigh, alright.


How else can he deliver gifts to everyone, in one single night?

When Santa popped in, I asked: "Would you take me on a tour?"

"Get into the sleigh!" He said, "To the Carboniferous Lands... for the biggest dragonflies galore!"

We did a flyover of towering horsetails. We saw club



mosses as magnificent trees.
With all the crawling things in swamps as far as the eye can see.

In a speed-run through time, a rising and falling and regrowth of forest we observed.

Peatification is how forests partially decay and make peat. Just like those jiffy pellets you'd start with your seeds. But peat can go onto an even further role, so to speak.


And there it all begins back in Mother Nature's oven of old.

And jolly ole St. Nick let out a "Ho Ho Ho!" since he found himself flattered:




[Diagram of Peatification / Coalification. source: Kentucky Geological Survey. <u>ukv.edu/KGS/coal</u>]

"How about a recipe collection in the simplest way? Cookies ranked Lignite, Sub-Bituminous, Bituminous, and Anthracitic...

not to mention your favorite: Iridescent Anthracite on the holiday tray!

From earthy Lignite towards the surface to Anthracite in the deep,

Shows different ranks of coal formed through depths of buried peat."



Geologist Santa drew in a big breath,

then finished his story with what he liked best:

"Coalification begins after peat's formed by these forests, From the plants to the mighty club moss trees which once stood before us."

"If Rocks Could Talk"



For our October issue, I gave you all the dirt about what soil does in winter. But what about rocks? We might think they just sit there, doing nothing, like some of us in February. If I could interview a few rocks, I imagine they would have complaints. Some would be a little

pngtree.com complaints. Some would be a little stressed out or under a lot of pressure. These complaints would be legit, but life for a rock is even harder than

imagined. There is no "Silent Night" for rocks, even in winter.

In winter, rocks undergo freezing and thawing which can weaken their structure. When water gets in, tiny cracks grow, and large slabs of rocks can fall away in a process called exfoliation. It would take a lot of loofahs to do what rocks do in winter. Even granite isn't safe as quartz and feldspar contract at different rates and can cause a tug-of-war within the usually peaceful granite. If I were a rock whisperer (a girl can only dream...) I would tell them it's not their fault.

But since we can't really talk to rocks like we would like to, our only option is to admire them, take care of them, and continue to be puzzled by their ways. See if you can decode what rocks might say to water if they could talk to water. Fill in the blanks with the scrambled letters below.


