"The Games People Play"

From ruthless rulers with checkered pasts, to knights in shining armor, most people on earth have played board games. Playing board games is part of humanity's history. It boggles the mind to think about, but evidence of games can be found as far back as 11,000 years ago and evidence has been documented in the Roman Empire, Ancient Greece, and Ancient Egypt. One of the oldest games found was called Ludus latrunculorum, which might have taken most of the day just to pronounce. Thankfully, the name and the game had shorter versions like lantrucli or latrones, leaving less time to argue about pronunciation and more time for game-playing.

Most games were games of strategy or adventure. Sometimes the games were given as gifts, and sometimes the game pieces were precious stones. When the game pieces were made of emerald, I am guessing there was no shortage of volunteers when the time came to put the game away. In the US, archeologists have found that people played games in the 1800's with much less costly pieces as there was no shortage of gizzard stones. Today, we have mostly plastic or metal pieces, but back in the day, people used all kinds of materials they found in or on the ground. 

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
