
"The Amazing and Unique World of Trilobites"





A trilobite casting.



Trilobites were one of the most diverse type of marine invertebrates that lived during the Paleozoic Era. Their extremely important, archetypal fossils are symbolic of an archaic world that once dominated the ancient seas. They persisted for close

to 300 million years – almost twice as long as the dinosaurs. The sea is now gone, and New York State has become a goldmine for Devonian Trilobite hunters.







5 Places in NY to go fossil hunting for Trilobites...

- 1. Schoharie: An hour west of Albany in Schoharie is a Devonian trilobites site. Rt. 30 passes through village. Turn east on Prospect St. Drive half a mile uphill where road veers to the left and becomes Rickard Hill Rd (County Rt. 1B). Continue up around the bend.
- **2. Pompey-Tully Area**: land behind the Best Western hotel off the Tully exit on Rt 81. Known for the most bountiful in the country for marine fossils.

- **3. Hudson Valley Catskill Region**: Covering a wide area from here west to Lake Erie, south of the Thruway down to the Pennsylvania border is a playground for Devonian fossils.
- 4. 18 Mile Creek and Penn Dixie
 Paleontological Area: This facility is owned and operated by the Hamburg Natural History Society and Includes fossil related activities. Located at intersection of Bristol Rd and Big Tree Rd. Blasdell.
- **5: Paleontological Research Institution**: This facility has bins of shale to sift through and is located near Portland Point near the tip of Cayuga Lake. Located at 1259 Trumansburg Rd., Ithaca.




