

The GMSS Board meets the first Tuesday of the month at the clubhouse in Liverpool (Ponderosa Plaza) behind Heid's at 7:00 PM. GMSS members are welcome to attend.

Executive Board Meeting, 1-4-22 & Member Meeting, 1-17-22

The meetings were cancelled by President Dick Lyons.

Executive Board Meeting, 2-1-22

The meeting was called to order by President Dick Lyons. Sgt. at Arms John Sweeney, Webmaster Dana Schwartz, and Junior Rockhound leader Rick Moore were not in attendance.

Webmaster Dana Schwartz has requested photos and other input for including on the website. All officers are asked to check that they are receiving communications from our domain name.

Treasurer Mary Davis reported balances in our checking and savings accounts. She indicated 41 vendors are signed-up for our July show with 34 contracts having been returned to date. A breakdown of the vendor categories signed-up was enumerated. Mary shared her findings in following-up on the Audit Committee meeting recommendation that we pursue partnering with a different financial institution for our banking needs. Subsequently, a motion was made and approved by the Board to move our accounts to Empower. The annual rental fee for our off-site storage unit will be going up in July. Mary is in the process of completing and submitting our requested annual report to EFMLS for insurance purposes, to include our current office holders, and club membership information. The EFMLS request for this information was delayed by changes in EFMLS operation during 2021.

President Lyons indicated that Eastern Federation MLS member club insurance coverage has been secured with Brown & Brown Upstate

He'll be talking about *Microscopic Blue Sapphires from the Adirondacks*.

Marie Cole Workshop instructor Steve Shorey reported that:

The course instruction results in your learning lapidary processes, how to use the equipment and tools, the production of a finished cabochon, and the ability to use the *Marie Cole Workshop* facility, tools, and equipment after completing the 6-hour course.

Additional workshop *How-to Classes* are being planned for March. They will be advertised in the near future. A Board discussion ensued focused



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February 2022 And In the News...

Oldest Known Decorative Jewelry in Eurasia Found in Polish Cave

KRAKOW – A study by an international team of researchers has now reported the oldest known ivory pendant from Eurasia. The ornament was found at the Stainia Cave, southeast of Czestochowa, Poland, Radiocarbon dating revealed that it was 41,500 years old.

The Stajnia Cave is a natural shelter and the site has been studied since 2006. During the excavations, a series of Neanderthal remains - animal bones and other artifacts – have been discovered.

In 2010, excavators found two fragments of an ornate

ivory pendant and an awl fragment. The pendant has an oval shape with rounded margins. It also has two drilled holes and decorations on it with patterns of sequential punctures.

Mass spectrometry analysis revealed that the pendant was made from mammoth ivory and the awl from a horse bone.

'This piece of jewelry shows the great creativity and extratures, creating an irregular looping ordinary manual skill of members of the group of Homo sapiens that

occupied the site," said co-author Wioletta Nowaczewska of Wroclaw University.

Co-author Andrea Picin from the Max Planck Institute for Evolutionary Anthropology in Leipzig added that the ages of the ivory pendant and the bone awl finally demonstrate that the dispersal of Homo sapiens in Poland took place as early as in Central and Western Europe.

Spectacular Fossils Discovered from Prehistoric Rainforest Reveal Intimate Details from 11 Million Years Ago

Hundreds of immaculately preserved fossils recently found in Australia offer a view into the continent's early Miocene period as clearly as in a family photo album. Set in an iron oxide mineral known as goethite, there are leaves belonging to more than 50 species of plants, fossilized flowers, fish, insects, arachnids, even a fossilized feather. There are fossils so clear scientists were able to make out nematode worms, parasitic mussels, and the scale of a butterfly wing.

Before Australia was hot, scrubby, and dry, it was covered in rainforests between 13 million and 5.3 million years ago. Atmospheric CO2 concentrations were high, creating the perfect conditions for wet and humid forests and the critters that prefer to dwell within such places. Among the notable finds is evidence of several animal behavior models we see today. A fly was turned to goethite with 12 particles of pollen attached to his head.

'Billion-year-old' black diamond, blasted from outer space, could fetch \$6.8M

An out-of-this-world — literally — black diamond will go to the highest bidder at Sotheby's next month. The recordbreaking, 555.55-carat gemstone, dubbed "The Enigma," was ranked among the largest and toughest diamonds in the world, and it's thought to have dropped here millions of years ago from outer space, according to the iconic auction house's expert gemologists. Black diamonds like this one, also called carbonados, are formed



out of a meteoric impact to Earth, forged out of the blast from the asteroid itself. The 1-billion-year-old diamond is expected to fetch at least \$6.8 million when it hits the online block, where it will be up for bidding from Feb. 3 to Feb. 9.
