

The History of Birthstones

The first century A.D. Jewish historian Josephus believed there was a connection between the 12 gemstones in the breastplate of Aaron, the first High Priest (Exodus 28:15 – 21) that represented the 12 tribes of Israel, the 12 months of the year and the 12 signs of the zodiac. There is also a & under list of 12 Foundation Stones of the New Jerusalem in Revelation 21:19 – 20.

Over the centuries, and in different cultures, the list of birthstones changes.

June: Pearl, Alexandrite & Moonstone

There are three birthstones for the month of June!

The word "pearl" is derived from the Latin word *perna* meaning "leg" for the ham or mutton leg-

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shaped bivalve. Natural pearls can be formed by any saltwater or freshwater mollusk (oyster or mussel). They form when an irritant or a parasite invades the shell, and the mollusk secretes layers of nacre (calcium carbonate/aragonite and conchiolin) around it. Natural pearls are hard to find and most on the market now are cultured ones.

Ancient people from the Middle East thought pearls were teardrops fallen from heaven; the Chinese believed they came from the brain of a dragon. Christopher Columbus and his contemporaries thought that mollusks formed them from dew drops. An ancient Sanskrit text said pearls were said to give long life and prosperity. In Asia, they were believed to help against indigestion and hemorrhages. Pearls have long been associated with purity, humility and innocence. Because high quality natural pearls are very hard to find, they have become a metaphor for something rare, valuable and admirable.

Pearl is a carbonate in the aragonite group. It has a hardness of 2.5 – 4.5 on the Mohs Hardness Scale. It occurs in various colors and can be dissolved in vinegar.

Pearls are one of the most popular gemstones, and are used in necklaces, bracelets and other forms of jewelry.








Alexandrite is a variety of chrysoberyl, and is notable for its color change, appearing green in daylight, changing to red under incandescent light. It was first discovered in the Ural Mountains of Russia in 1830, supposedly on the birthday of the future Russian czar, Alexander II. The Ural deposits were eventually mined out; now most alexandrite

comes from Brazil, India, Sri Lanka, Madagascar and Tanzania.

Chrysoberyl is an aluminate of beryllium. It's the third hardest frequently encountered natural gemstone, with an 8.5 on the Mohs Hardness Scale. Chrysoberyl is relatively rare and occurs in pegmatite dikes. For alexandrite to form, some chromium would need to be present in the pegmatite fluid.

In jewelry, alexandrite is used as rings and pendant centerpieces.

Moonstone is a feldspar mineral that creates a "pearly" luster when light enters it and is reflected by mineral layers within the gem. It is often white or gray in color with a white or silvery glow like that of the moon (hence its name).

This birthstone has been associated with both Roman and Greek lunar gods. Hindu mythology claims it is made of solidified moonbeams. Moonstone is often associated with love, passion and fertility. It is believed to bring great luck.

Moonstone is a sodium potassium aluminum silicate of the orthoclase and oligoclase feldspar group. It is 6 – 6.5 on the Mohs Hardness Scale. It can crack when exposed to high heat. Deposits occur in Armenia, Australia, the Austrian Alps, India, Mexico, Madagascar, Norway, Poland, Sri Lanka and the United States – especially New Mexico.

Moonstone is polished as cabochons and used as beads and pendants.
