

Feb. 20, 2023 - Club Meeting

Knowledge Center - Dave Millis

At the Monday, Feb. 20th meeting, which Cathy has called the knowledge corner, calcite was discussed. Our field trip to the Pitcairn blue calcite was the reason. This field trip is on the second Saturday in June. No other details are available at this time.

The K-Corner described calcite of many kinds, but the 15-20 minutes doesn't do it all, so only the basics were described.

First, the chemical formula was mentioned and how similar it is to the carbonic acid in soda. This is why calcite is found everywhere.

Then many colors of calcite were shown and the variety of locations.

Using a clear crystalline chunk of calcite, the cleaving properties were demonstrated with hammer and chisel.

Fluorescent properties were shown by UV light, ending with calcite from south Texas that fluoresces in two color and also phosfluoresces.

The last demo was specific to the calcite we will be collecting. One piece was acid-polished to a better color intensity.

(Dave Arcaro) The fossils that I brought to the last meeting were found by me in Tully. Most of the fossils were Horn corals and Favosite corals. There were also some trilobite, crinoid, brachiopods, bivalves, and Gastropods. I brought these to give to club members, as I was trying to encourage people to try their hand at fossil prepping with basic tools. All the fossils I had were still covered in matrix, to varying degrees.

February 20, 2023 Meeting: "Amber" Christopher Albrecht

Christopher began this meeting saying how, prior to hunting for amber, he does much geological research.



There is much amber in the Arizona Petrified Forest, but nothing may be taken from this park lawfully. He has searched in Wyoming in the Powder River Basin among others. Some sites are on private land requiring permission from the owners. The lignite sedimentary layer is the location to search for amber. Wind exposes rough amber not water. His collection is about 250,000 specimens!

Christopher brought several amber rough samples from the Dominican Republic. These were given to the club for members to clean using a wet lap and very slowly polishing using Zam. A small collection for the youth group was also given as a gift. We thank Christopher for these specimens. We will distribute them at a later date.

We learned that at the mines in the Dominican Republic, which are extremely tight and cramped working conditions, the rough amber coming out is then coated

with a sticky corn syrup like substance that allows one to see inclusions within. These can be leaves, small flowers, insects, animal hairs, etc. whatever was airborne and fell into the sticky sap. It is almost guaranteed that in our rough samples we will see inclusions. Christopher has expressed interest in coming back to our club on a Saturday to help us clean and polish our amber samples and identify what lies within.

At the conclusion of his talk many members brought amber samples for Christopher to identify. We found that even though some amber was bought in Eastern Europe it was still mined in the Dominican Republic. It has signature qualities that the expert can recognize.

Natural amber that is heat treated can exhibit fractures when cooling that are called "spangles." Blue and green amber fluoresces orange. If amber is all the same color, it could be synthetic, not natural.

This night we had a record attendance! We are so pleased Christopher could make it to our meeting. He spends summers as a park ranger in Olympic National Park in Washington State. - * Hardness: 2.5 -3.0 on Moh's hardness scale. (What type of jewelry is NOT recommended?)


Some Amber "Basics"















