



Log cabins were the first structures built in Wyoming.
The Riddle farmhouse built in 1834 still sits at the end of Wyoming Ave.
Jane Evatt and her family lived in a log home that predated this house.
Settler's choice of building sites were either dense woods or swamp.

Edward Allen allowed a Civil War
Encampment of the 75th Regiment Ohio
Volunteer Infantry on his farm in 1861.
Camp McLean was named after
US Supreme Court Justice John McLean.




Archibald Burns, Isaac Riddle & Alexander Pendery
all became partners in the
Hamilton, Springfield & Carthage Turnpike Company,
which built sections of the Toll Road, now called Springfield Pike.




Alexander Pendery arrived in the Wyoming area in 1806 with his wife and six daughters. His father received this farmland as payment for his service in the Revolutionary War.

The L'Hemmedieu and Wilson farms sold land to the railroads to lay tracks and build a station.
