### Pastor's Perspective



As we experience another surge in Covid-19, because of the Delta variant, Reformation has once again suspended in-person gatherings within the church, including worship. As your pastor, this was not easy to support. My heart grieves deeply to have to make this decision, along with the Transition Team and your Church Council. We have gone back to online-only for our 10:00 service and returned to our 11:30 parking lot service. It was a decision that was very hard to make, but I believe it was a

decision we had to make. With new cases spiking between 2,000 and 6,000 per day over the last couple weeks; with hospitals filling up once again, especially pediatric wings, and a few families within our congregation testing positive with the variant, we had to think about the safety of all.

I've heard pastors use the "faith over fear" phrase to justify keeping in-person worships going even in the face of these dangerous facts. Defining such a phrase as they have faith that God will protect them from the virus no matter what science says, so they don't fear. Or they have faith that even if they die, they will go to heaven because of their faith in God, so they don't fear. Interesting. I believe in faith over fear too, but my faith is slightly different. I have faith that God has blessed us with a common sense to listen to the medical field (which I also see as a gift from God) as they learn more and more about this virus, and follow their recommendations to mitigate this pandemic for the sake of my neighbor, so I don't fear following what they prescribe. For me, it's a Luther thing.

I shall ask God mercifully to protect us. Then I will fumigate, purify the air, administer medicine, and take medicine. I shall avoid places and persons where my presence is not needed in order to not become contaminated and thus perchance inflict and pollute others and so cause their death as a result of my negligence. If God should wish to take me, he will surely find me. But, I have done what he has expected of me, and so I am not responsible for either my own death or the death of others. If my neighbor needs me, however, I shall not avoid place or person, but will go freely. This is a God-fearing faith because it is neither brash or foolhardy, and does not tempt God.~ Dr. Martin Luther during the plague of 1527

Luther had a great faith in God — you know that whole *justification by grace through* faith thing — but that faith was rooted in a practicality that God blessed us with minds to think rationally and apply medical discoveries to mitigate plagues and illnesses for the good of all. For Luther, doing so never was a sign of a weak faith, but in fact it was a sign of a strong faith in the gifts God has given us.

But I do have some fear... in how this pandemic — even more than before — has divided the world, this country, even the church. What do we believe in, science, politics, faith? This pandemic, or should I say the ideologies that surround it are creating divides that run deep, and are creating fissures that may be very difficult to bridge. This is not a unvaccinated or vaccinated virus! It is not a conservative or liberal virus! It is not a Republican or Democrat virus! It is not an Asian virus! It is a pandemic! It is a global

virus! And we need to act that way! This virus doesn't give a "rat's tuchus" about what side of the ideological argument we side with, this variant infects indiscriminately. We cannot let this virus divide us worse than before! If anything, we need to unite against this virus! When we do that we mitigate it, we defeat it!

Stepping back from in-person worship is our attempt to participate in defeating this viral terror. It's not easy and these decisions are very risky for Reformation, emotionally, spiritually, and certainly financially. That's why I hope emotionally, we stay in touch with each other, whether through porch visits, phone calls, texting or emails, and spiritually by praying for each other as well as the church. Financially, even though we are not gathering in the sanctuary, please support the ministries we are offering in various ways to join together; virtually via livestream, and with our parking lot services; and also as we look into ways to keep Safe Space Dinners moving forward. All of these variations of being the church, through these inventive ways, need your support, so please give generously so we can grow these ministries, even in these perilous times.

#### **In-Person Worship Service Update**

On Sunday, August 22, the Reformation Lutheran Church Council held a zoom Council meeting. The conversation was about recommendations made by our Transition Team, who met the previous Sunday with concerns about the recent Covid surge in South Carolina, and across the whole of the nation. With the Delta variant surge hospitals are filling up once again, breakthrough cases are mounting even within the vaccinated, and there is a higher infection rate among children. With that, the Transition Team recommended to council the stoppage of all in-person gatherings, including worship.

After much deliberation, the council agreed to take a step back until we see a steady continued decline in cases, which had reached over a 5,000 infection rate on Friday, August 20th. When we take those facts into consideration along with the infection of two families of Reformation — not from our service but from outside activities — we do not want to take a risk of putting

others in danger. So it is with a heavy heart that I must inform you Reformation's in-person worship will be suspended as of August 29th until at least the end of October. We will continue our Facebook online Sunday services at 10:00 am, with an upload unto YouTube later the same day, and return to our parking lot service at 11:30 am, transmitted on 99.9 FM.

These certainly were not easy decisions to reach, but with deep discussions, and weighing our options, they were decisions we felt had to be made. We appreciate your prayers for Reformation, South Carolina, our nation, and the world, as we struggle through this virus. We hope you will continue to support Reformation as we seek to make decisions for the safety of all.

For those watching online, I'm attaching a simple recipe for communion bread, if you are interested in baking at home. Also, if you do not wish to bake, we will have communion kits available at the church office (four weeks of kits at a time). Just stop by and pick it up. We will have both wine and grape juice available.

## Recipe for communion bread



2T. margarine, not low fat ½ cup water ½ cup honey 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour ¾ cup whole wheat flour 1 tsp. salt ¾ tsp. baking soda

Melt together the margarine, water and honey. In separate bowl, mix together regular and whole wheat flour, salt and baking soda. Mix honey mixture with flour. Pat into four very flat circles. Place on a baking sheet. Score top with a cross. Bake at 350° for 10-15 minutes.

## Movie Night Discussion

On Wednesday evening, August 25, we held a ZOOM meeting to discuss the documentary, Meltdown in Dixie. There were about a dozen people who joined the discussion. The documentary covered a situation regarding a small business owner in Orangeburg, SC who opened an ice cream shop adjacent to a very small parcel of property owned by the Sons of the Confederacy organization. The group has erected a monument and flag pole on the parcel and flies a large confederate flag on the flag pole. The movie covers both sides of this story, i.e., those that want the flag removed and those that want it to stay.

Our small group discussed several relevant issues, e.g., racism, white supremacy, and social justice. The general consensus was the discussion went well, and we agreed we need to keep the dialogue going. As such, it was suggested we select another source or example of this topic, presented in books or movie form, and continue our discussions.
