The Power of Memories Part 2

Summary

This sermon continues a series on the power of memories, focusing on how God uses memories to redirect our attention from circumstances to Him, enabling us to envision a brighter future. The pastor emphasizes that remembering God's past faithfulness inspires us to seek after God's kingdom and become vessels through which God's vision can be realized. While this path involves sacrifice, it leads to justice, grace, and mercy abounding in the world.

Intro Prayer

Ice Breaker

Share a meaningful object you keep that triggers important memories for you. What memories do it bring back and why do you hold onto it?

Questions

The pastor quotes, 'It is the power of memory that gives rise to the power of imagination.' How have your memories of God's faithfulness in the past helped you envision what He might do in your future?

What does it mean to you to 'seek after God's kingdom' in practical terms? How do you incorporate this into your daily life?

The sermon describes how seeking after God transforms us to 'see as God sees' and 'love as God loves.' Can you share an experience where your perspective changed as you grew closer to God?

The pastor describes Paul's attitude of being 'poured out as a drink offering.' What would it look like for your life to be 'an act of worship on behalf of those whom you serve'?

The sermon compares the church to an agitator in a washing machine. In what ways have you seen the church effectively 'agitate' society for positive change?

What areas of society do you believe need the church to function as an 'agitator' today? What makes these areas particularly important?

The pastor challenges us to 'dream big, vision big, and walk into where God has already chosen.' What dreams or visions do you believe God might have for our church community?

What sacrifices might be required of us individually and collectively if we truly commit to bringing about God's kingdom vision in our community?

Life Application

This week, take time to reflect on a specific memory of God's faithfulness in your life. Write it down in detail. Then, ask God to show you how this memory might inspire you to take one concrete action that helps bring His kingdom vision to reality. This could be advocating for someone marginalized, challenging an unjust situation, or serving others in a way that demonstrates God's love. Be prepared to share your experience with the group next time we meet.
