


2022 in review...

2022 was a banner year for Paws Animal Welfare Society, Inc. We were able to take 110 cats into our shelter, Valley Cat Haven, and provide spay/neuter assistance to an additional 97 cats. As a result, 207 cats now have healthier and happier lives and we have prevented hundreds of kittens from being born.

Our success each year is due to the dedication and hard work of our volunteers and your support. Your support included a 29% increase in monetary donations in 2022 compared to 2021 and many donations of shelter supplies which kept our expenses for cat food and litter very low. Plus, the monthly raffle fundraiser that we began in 2020 continues to provide us with a steady income thanks to the many people who participate in the raffle and include additional donations.

We applied for and received two grants last year, one that will enable us to continue to fund the spay/neuter clinics for low income cat owners and the other to help us with spay/neuter and additional medical expenses for the cats at the shelter. We were able to upgrade our facility last year by purchasing new kennels for our isolation room, adding a ceiling fan to our isolation room and replacing our washer and dryer with commercial machines. Also, we replaced our aging sign with a more durable and attractive sign that can be seen from Frenchville Road.

Looking ahead to this year...

2023 is the year of our 15th anniversary! In February, 2008 a few people led by the late Priscilla Daigle joined forces to form and organization that would address the suffering and premature deaths of large numbers of homeless cats in the St. John Valley. The only assets we had were our passion and determination. We are extremely gratified by the results of our efforts and the support we have received from countless individuals and organizations from within and outside our communities. In spite of our success, the need to help unwanted cats and the people who help them will not go away so we must do everything possible to continue this vital work. We plan to celebrate our 15th anniversary this summer. We hope you will be able to join us! ~Jean Cobb



Rags to Riches

Jasper came to us in late September of 2021 from St. Francis. Her owner had left her outside because she was skiddish and he had a newborn in the house. He called us because he did not want to leave her outside when the weather got colder. She was about a year old at the time.

She made it quite clear that she was not fond of human affection and was far from ready to accept it. We took our time with her, respected her space and were very patient. We tried to associate human contact with comfort, food and fun whenever possible. Our main goal was to



tient. A person who would understand that it may take awhile for her to be trustworthy in a home of her own. Fast forward to Saturday, June 25, 2022 when a volunteer went in to socialize and noticed Jasper was hiding in an unusual corner. Her mouth was partially open and she had a tremendous amount of drool hanging from her lower jaw. When she did not accept a treat it was apparent that there was something seriously wrong. This is when the stars were

aligning for Jasper. Dr. Swanson already had a scheduled visit with a few cats the next day, so we added Jasper to the list to be evaluated.

Dr. Swanson made the quick call to suggest that Jasper be brought into emergency care that day. Calls were made and we were all very thankful that a vet in Presque Isle was able to see her on Sunday. Luckily another volunteer was available to drive her there to be evaluated. She was diagnosed with calicivirus, a highly contagious virus. Immediate quarantine of the cats took place. Luckily Jasper was in the smaller room roaming with only a few cats. They were all put in individual kennels and tarps were placed around each of them in hopes to prevent further transmission. It was decided that the shelter would dedicate only one person to care for her



and all the other possibly infected cats during this short time in order in try to prevent a complete outbreak. Due to the sores in her mouth Jasper was not eating on her own, so she had to be fed by a syringe for the time being. Between oral antibiotics, eye drops/nose drops, and syringe feeding, it was definitely a full time job. The biggest question asked was how she was going to accept all of this treatment knowing how little she liked being touched. Jasper must have known she needed help because she was extremely docile and very accepting of all this one on one care. It was a great day for all when she began to eat on her own. Once the quarantine period was over she remained in a kennel for close monitoring. After about a couple weeks Jasper then began to lose patches of fur all over her body. As alarming as this was to see, we were assured that this would get better as her body healed from this crazy virus. In time her fur slowly started to grow and so did her personality. We were thrilled to see her coming to us for some love as we approached her kennel. The constant feedings and necessary medical care forced her into realizing that humans were not so bad after all. Every cloud has a silver lining.

August of 2022 was the day that we had all been waiting for!! This was the day that Jasper was adopted and was given the adorable name Jasmine. She is now loving life in her new home and says she is very grateful to everyone at PAWS for helping her during this journey. As you can see in the pictures she is enjoying being spoiled. Jasmine has all the love she could ever want and of course all of the very best spots to sleep. We are so happy for her! ~ Vickie Gagnon
