

This reduces the return rate significantly, by ensuring cats and adopters were thoughtfully paired based on lifestyle compatibility and specific needs. 2024 was a pawesome year for PAWS Animal Welfare Society, which makes it especially heartwarming for us.

At PAWS our commitment extends beyond Fort Kent. We are proud to be a resource for stray, abandoned and surrendered cats from our many surrounding communities including Madawaska, Grand Isle, Van Buren, St. Agatha, Cross Lake, St. John, St. Francis, Allagash, Eagle Lake and Frenchville.

In 2024 we partnered with the Animal Refuge League of Greater Portland in Westbrook. The endeavor ensures our cats have a wider reach of adoptions through their website, social media and adoption events in more populated areas. As evidenced by one of our alumni, Felix. He did not present well as a potential adoptable cat and was continually overlooked for adoption. Within a very short time after being transported to ARLGP, Felix found a forever home. We want to shine a spotlight on the vital role fundraising plays in ensuring the well being of the cats in our care. Every purr, head nuzzle and playful pounce you see is made possible by the generous support of our community. We rely on your kindness and generosity to provide food, shelter, medical attention and ultimately loving forever homes for those deserving cats. Now, a glimpse into ongoing and upcoming fundraiser efforts that make our mission possible. **Monthly Giving Program** - A recurring donation program where your consistent monthly contribution provides a stable foundation of support for our cats. It also allows us to budget effectively for essentials like food, litter and routine veterinary care.

Chewy or Amazon Wishlist Purr-fect Presents for Our Residents - It's an online list of specific items our cats need. This program directly provides the resources needed to keep our cats comfortable, healthy and happy while they await their forever homes.

"Paws for Thought" donation boxes - Collection boxes placed at various local businesses in our area. In 2024 we collected \$1504 for this program which offers a convenient way for community members to contribute spare change while supporting our cause.

From Empty to Essential - Our bottle redemption might seem like a small effort, but the collective impact of your donated empties is truly significant for our cats. We want to take a moment to show exactly how those nickels and dimes are being transformed into vital resources for the cats in our care. In 2024 we collected \$1093 in bottle redemptions which was impactful for kitten and cat food, litter supplies, cat toys, blankets and medical care.

In 2024 your participation in our monthly raffle collectively raised an astounding \$10,281. The success of this raffle has been truly inspiring. It fuels our commitment to continue this vital fundraising effort in the year to come. Pisces' story began in 2017 when a kind woman who loved cats, and who rescued and fed

many in her neighborhood, trapped him as a feral kitten on her porch. He was adopted shortly after, but he hid all the time and would not let the owner pet him. In December of 2023, the owner decided they wanted a friendlier cat, so we at PAWS agreed to take him in. When

Pisces first arrived at the shelter his eyes darted nervously and he spent much of his time hiding under his bed. Every time a volunteer would try to approach, he would shrink back in fear.



As time went on, we could see he was very curious and also food driven. With lots of time, and the patience of our wonderful volunteers, he began to come close enough to take treats, but petting was off limits, he would allow a little pat, but he would swat and quickly put up his walls


again. As time went on, we continued to see his softer side begin to poke through his walls, he began coming closer and actually began letting us know he wanted his food with a quiet little meow. One day, a new volunteer came by, not knowing his story, she sat on the floor and began petting him and he allowed it! This was such a breakthrough for him. We felt it was time to advertise him with full disclosure in hopes of finding the perfect family, and that's what exactly

happened. In October of 2024, a wonderful family from Massachusetts



reached out to see if they could come meet him, they had experience with difficult cats and felt

they could give him a good home. They understood that he wasn't just a 'cat to adopt' but a soul who needed care, compassion, and time to trust again. They put in an application and were immediately approved, they set out on their journey to Fort Kent to meet Pisces. They fell in love with him and they were ready to take him home. The amazing thing was Pisces was ready to be loved, he has been blossoming since he has been in his new home and actually seeks out their attention and love! Pisces story is proof that sometimes the most timid, scared animals have the capacity for love



Barn Cat Boogie

December 2024 ended with an unusual but highly successful project due to a woman named Amanda. Amanda owns a farm in Madawaska that includes a large and well-kept barn. When she moved there a few years ago there were only a few barn cats and now she had 9 cats. She wanted to get the cats spay/neutered (s/n) and perhaps re-home some of them. None of them were feral and they were all under a year old.

Our first attempt was to get them into our s/n clinics but the number of cats and their ability to come and go into the barn made it difficult to get them done one by one. We needed to finish the project before spring arrived which is kitten season. Nine intact cats living together would be a recipe for disaster.

We were able to get appointments locally for three males fairly readily, one was neutered in December and the other two done in mid-February. This gave us time for Amanda to trap the cats one by one and bring them to our shelter.

Fortunately, Amanda was able to trap all six of the cats by the date of our appointment. On that momentous day in February we transported all six cats to a veterinary hospital in Canada; an

effort that started at 5 am and ended at 6 pm. Three males and two females were returned to the barn and two males and two females were surrendered to PAWS. All had been examined by a veterinarian, given vaccinations and spayed or neutered which means they will all be healthier and happier cats plus they will not be bringing more cats into a world that has more cats than good homes to care for them.
