AZALEA PARK shows a spectacular spring display of azalea blossoms by the path entrance in spring.

DEERHEAD HAMMOCK MEMORIAL PARK is a place for quiet contemplation sometimes used for weddings and commemorative services.

ERNA NIXON HAMMOCK is the gem of our parklands. It was named for early resident Erna Nixon, who led tours and educated visitors about the nature and ecology of this Florida hardwood hammock.

FICK FOREST is a pinewood hammock, a good place to see nesting woodpeckers and native ferns.

JEAN HENDERSON TWIN OAKS PARK and DON WILLIS PARKS are two parks that were named in honor of the AHF members who made significant contributions to the community

LAKE ARTHUR TIPPIE PARK features a man-made lake and stream. Look for orchids in the pinewoods.

MARTIN WOODS is an area of open hardwood forest and pinewoods and is a good place for birding. Tarflowers bloom in the pinelands in summer.

MEL MANTHEY PARK adjoins the AHF Village Hall and is known for the early spring azalea blooms.

MEMORY GARDEN is a tranquil garden filled with a wide variety of plantings (purchased from monetary donations) memorializing former AHF members.

OLD HALL PARK Leads from Hall Road to Savannah Drive and joins the path through Fick Forest.

NUTTING-WOOD GREEN is a meadow where spring wildflowers bloom. Located nearby are a basketball court, ball field, playground and community garden.

SABAL PARK is named for our state tree, the sabal palm, also called the cabbage palm. This park is one place where a gopher tortoise makes his burrow.

WARD PARK is a good place to see the growth of a native pinewood in all its stages, from seedling to mature pine tree.

WILDFLOWER MEADOW was filled with Catesby's lily and other wildflowers when this park was named.

History of the AHF

Melbourne Village was founded in 1946 by three women who moved here from Ohio with the intention of creating a self-sufficient community of homesteaders. They formed a not-for-profit corporation called the American Homesteading Foundation (AHF), purchased the land, and divided it into large lots, winding roads, and parkland. The AHF continues to be managed entirely by a Board of Trustees, Melbourne Village resident volunteers, and a small staff. It is not an HOA and places no restrictions on homeowners.
