

Erna Nixon Hammock

We are moving along with our QR codes to identify the plants and information about the Erna Nixon Hammock. Erna, who the park is named after, was a prolific tour guide in the park when she was alive. We feel it's very important to keep that tradition going, so with the self-guided QR codes, we're following somewhat in her footsteps. The codes will link you back to the AHF website which will have a page for Erna Nixon Hammock with our plant list.

We have purchased a new weed whacker to keep the ferns at bay! Some of our paths are narrow and a mower can't access them. We also added some crushed concrete to the driveway at the entrance on N. Wildwood to fill in potholes. A special thank you to TMV's Public Works Department who assisted with this!

We continue to remove invasive and nonnative plants from the hammock. This is time consuming and hard work but must to be done. We are getting quotes to have the vines that are covering large areas on the S. Wildwood path commercially removed. The vines have gotten so bad that they pulled down a small oak tree due to all the rain we have had. Unfortunately, we don't have the manpower to tackle this project. We have six committee members and right now two of our members are on sick leave. As a reminder, our committee is self-funded through a special investment supported by donations, and we take no money from the AHF's annual budget.

Erna Nixon, In Her Own Words

Excerpted from several articles stored in the History Room

There is great wisdom in preserving some of the wilderness' beauty for future generations," says **Erna Nixon**, a public school Biology teacher from Chicago. This is why when Erna semiretired and moved to Melbourne Village, she adhered to her program of

prodding, promoting, and preserving the Melbourne Village Hammock Preserve (later named Erna Nixon Hammock).

Erna, even she is still awed by the hammock, even though she knows its trails and moods and character as well as any human can. "There is still a puzzle all around," she says, "there are still so many unanswered questions... so many mysteries."

Erna's world is certainly not a silent one, though no one talks out loud. Her eyes and fingers touch everything as she walks the trails that spread like a spider web across the woods, and the hammock touches her in return, telling her what has happened in her absence. This talking, "It's easy," says Erna, "you just have to know the language."

Nothing is removed— and nothing is allowed to be brought into this world of Erna's. It would be a day of mourning if someone threw a beer can into it. The hammock is left just the way nature intended it to be— alone. If a tree falls across a trail, the trail is moved, certainly not the tree.

The only concession that Erna has made with her world is to share it. To give to the people a glimpse of her wooded shangri-la. "I want people to see how things are when they are left by themselves. There are no books that will answer the questions you find here. You have to get out and observe and feel and be part of it."

Erna feels that the world would be perfect if people would stop by occasionally to see her hammock, to watch things being born and growing and prospering and dying and being born again. "It grows on you, this world. It grows and becomes something new every day."

It has been a long day, this day, and Erna Nixon has shown many people her hammock. She is tired, but it is a good tired. She is asked if she is jealous of the time she must spend in the hammock. Her answer is quick, and has a touch of indignation about it. "For goodness sakes, no. My time is the hammock's time."

A hammock stand is based on calcium, magnesium, and water. Yet to those who are *not* scientists, a hammock is an island of peace in a bustling world of tensions and frustrations. Mrs. Nixon walks the paths of this last refuge of man in the hope of retaining a small part of a moving world as it was when man and the earth were both very young.


Swimming Pool Update & Polar Bear Swim

The Community Garden Celebrates 10 Years!





Zen Wind Curtains


We all know the heartache of finding a beautiful bird lying underneath a window, dead or stunned. Or hearing that telltale thud and seeing the evidence of feathers. Even if the bird flies away, its internal injuries are often fatal. In fact, window strikes are the leading cause of bird mortality. There's an elegant solution: Zen Wind Curtains, a.k.a. BirdsSavers.

A bird's brain and eyes function differently than a human's. The reflection on a window confuses them so they think they're flying into an opening. BirdSavers are a simple exterior "curtain" of cords spaced at specific widths to break up the reflection. Not only are the curtains effective, they look really cool as they gently sway in the breeze, hence the name "Zen Wind Curtains."

Using the DIY instructions on the BirdSavers website, my husband **Kent Constable** and I made several beautiful wind curtains for our house on Blue Jay Lane. On Saturday January 10 at 10:30am in the AHF Hall, we will show you how to make Zen Wind Curtains for your own home.

To get the most out of the workshop, you'll need to purchase supplies and prepare them in advance. Stop in or call Rebecca in the AHF Office or email ahfmvadmin@ahfmv.com to RSVP and get the supply list and prep info. (If you don't have the supplies at the time of the workshop, you can still attend and get some tips. Bring the dimensions of the glass on the windows you want to target and we can help you calculate the supplies you'll need.)

Preserving the Past

I wish I'd taken a "before" photo of the History Room the first time I opened the door. Boxes were stacked to the ceiling, papers were sliding off of every surface onto the floor, and there was no room to step inside. Over the years, the items stored had outgrown the space and it was truly bulging at the seams.

Across a span of more than two years, a small company of AHF members calling themselves "The History Club" rolled up their sleeves and went to work. Items were sorted, some discarded, and few things were recently sold at the AHF Flea Market. Any files containing personal information such as social security numbers and all financial information older than seven years were shredded. What remains is a collection of files ranging from Annual Meeting minutes to correspondence as well as an array of photos, often undated and unlabeled, yet still holding historic value. This is all organized and stored by committee or category.

In the future, financial and business records will be kept digitally in the AHF Office. Regular day-to-day documents, committee reports, warranties, legal contracts, etc. will continue to be filed in the main office, as they are being actively managed. Items that might be of interest to future generations may be added to the archives by submitting proposed additions to the Information Committee for consideration.

I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to the everyone who helped sort and organize the History Room. Thanks to **Bridget Foster** for initiating the project and together with **Gretchen Tüten** and **Mary Murphy**, completing the major first round of sorting and organizing. Their work cleared out nearly 50 boxes of paper and over 25 large bags of garbage from the space. They then categorized what remained and began to sort it by date. Additional thanks go to **Kevin Foster**, **Norton Muzzone**, **Paul Crumley**, **Will McIvaine**, **Ken Muck**, **Leslie Fay**, **Rebecca Carter**, and **Virginia Fraser** for their work relocating materials to a holding room, repairing and cleaning the space, and returning items to the AHF archives.

The Information Committee manages the flow and preservation of community information via the Villager newsletter, the AHF website, and the AHF side of the Dayton bulletin board, all of which are forms of historical record-keeping in progress. Now, responsibility for and supervision of the History Room & Archives has been assigned to the Information Committee. This change provides a dedicated funding source, a clear point of contact, and accountability for all information and archive-related matters. It also establishes a process that will ensure continuity and stability over time and transitions. We believe this integration will support the ongoing care and preservation of our community's treasured past.

Parks & Paths Committee Update
