Crest Hill Hosts Membership Meeting

embers of the Lockport Area Genealogical and Historical Society met in the Crest Hill City Building early on a beautiful Saturday morning July 26.

Mayor Donald Randich presented the history of the city and some current pending projects. Starting September all city water will be treated with iron removal putting an end to rusty white shirts and orange toilet tanks. There are presently nine shallow wells with a capacity to pump four million gallons a day. Current usage is one million gallons. No radium is present in the system. Since there is no shortage of water, citizens may water lawns, fill pools, and wash cars to their hearts' content with no watering bans in sight. The water is metered and the mayor pointed out that the water rate is the lowest rate in Will County. Every single street in the city has been refinished with new curbs and gutters. There was no assessment to property owners for this project. The city tax rate is 52 cents which is less than half of some neighboring cities. That rate has come down from \$1.05 in 1981. The city of Crest Hill has 16,000 in residence with a projection of 25 - 30thousand built out by 2010. Also, the population of Stateville prison contributes to the city coffers for each

segment of the population. Crest Hill was incorporated in January 1960. It was started when rumors of a Joliet annexation began circulating. A few neighbors gathered in a Lidice living room and discussed forming a

separate city. From there it progressed, but not without controversy. The biggest issue was the revenue from Hillcrest Shopping Center - the first shopping center of its kind in the area. A court case decided by the Illinois Supreme Court determined that the new city was legal and that sales tax money should be directed to Crest Hill. Originally the city was to be named Hillcrest but upon research, a Hillcrest was already existing in Illinois so city fathers turned it around to Crest Hill. So far, only four have been Mayor, each one building on the foundation of the others. Over the years a fine working relationship has been established with our adjacent city of Joliet. Both sets of city fathers seek to cooperate where possible.

An international claim to fame in the city happened during World War II. As Adolph Hitler took over Czechoslovakia an incident happened that ordered every man and boy in the city of Lidice, Czechoslovakia to be killed and the city leveled. The world heard about it with such horror that it was determined a new Lidice would rise in the USA. A subdivision was being established near Theodore Street

and Raynor Avenue at the time and the president, Franklin D. Roosevelt named it to be the new Lidice, USA. Each June, a memorial ceremony is held at the Lidice monument. The Czechoslovak National Council sends a couple busloads of people to participate. The Crest Hill Library has a collection of historical items on display from the original dedication. Crest Hill residents Kay Thomas and Jeanne Juricic were present to add comments. Kay was a part of the original committee to incorporate and attended Quo Warranto hearings in Morris, Illinois. She was a former president of the Crest Hill Women's Civic League. Jeanne's first love is libraries and she was on the original

At the meetings end a justifiably proud Mayor invited attendees to stroll around the Veterans' and Police Memorial Garden. Fifteen hundred plus names of Crest Hill veterans are inscribed on granite markers as a tribute to their service. The memorial is an ongoing project with new names submitted from time to time. Two Crest Hill police officers were killed in the line of duty and a memorial has been placed to honor them as well. A Memorial Day Service is held each year in commemoration. All work in the garden is done by a wonderfully dedicated team of volunteers.


Annual House in the Park and Dellwood Park Tour

ANCESTRY PLUS

The Ancestry Plus computer program is now available in the research area of the Coal City Library. This program includes not only United States Census Records and primary source documents, but also *Gale's Passenger and Immigration List Index* which lists 2.8 million passengers who came to the U.S. from the 17th to the 19th centuries and *Biography and Genealogy Matter Index*, a database of more than 13 million indexed biographical sketches. You can find land records, court records, military records, immigration records, and much more. The program is user friendly and so are the wonderful librarians at the Coal City Library.



August 1995 events rekindle stories of fire August 10, 1895

The Phoenix newspaper (above and right) is from a reproduction of the There Were no Lives Lost; There original of August 13, 1895, printed by Main Street Lockport, Inc. to commemorate the fire's centennial. The organization produced a video that featured interviews with shop owners and historians who researched the effects of the fire on downtown buildings. Store owners painted flames on their storefront windows. A parade and other events enlightened the public about the remarkable day in our downtown history.

Fire department celebrates 100 years

The Lockport Township Fire & Ambulance District celebrated August 13; the fire prompted the establishment of the fire district just three days after the fire. A newsletter announced events and used the occasion to educated the public about fire prevention, programs, and services.

Lamb tells us: ...It was a hot, dry summer and the flames quickly spread, pushed by a

strong south wind, and engulfed the east side of State Street. The fire moved faster than a man could run, moving east on Ninth Street and continuing half a block to engulf and destroy the stone school on Central Square.... Many feared that the conflagration would spread north of Ninth Street and destroy the residential area because the town lacked a pumper or a water supply to fight the flames. A telegram to Chicago and an express train, however, prompted the delivery of a pumper. This steam-driven device pumped water from the canal [I & M Canal] to save the city.


