## Asiago: a city for all seasons

siago! A city in Italy that my mother talked about ever since I was a child. Little did I think that my first view of this mountain city would be through the rain-spattered window of a bus trudging its way up 3000 ft. into the Dolomite Mountains from Vicenza, the capital of the province in the Po Valley.

The word Asiago was always spoken with reverence in our home because it was the birthplace of most of the American-Italians living in Lockport. It was THE place to visit if you got to Italy.

My grandfather, Giovanni (John) Rodeghiero and his three brothers, Anthony, Christian, and Andrew left their family and settled in the New World, circa 1884. In 1886 my g.grandfather, Giuseppe (Joseph) Rigoni, his wife Maria, and their 16 year-old daughter Antonia (my grandmother) came to the U.S. also. Bad economic conditions were reasons enough for looking for a better life. On November 17, 1888 John and Antonia (Lena), who had been neighbors in Asiago, were the first Italian couple to be married at St. Dennis Church by Dr. James McGovern.

The dream of visiting the city of my Italian ancestors came to fruition in August of 1984, shortly after the disastrous fire at Union Oil. After having spent a few days in Rome and Venice, we left the gondolas and cathedrals behind us, boarded a train, and left for

Vincenza and then Asiago. Since neither of my friends had any interest in Italian genealogy, I was left on my own to find what genealogy I could in only one day. The first thing Friday morning I was off in the rain to the court house only to be told to come back after lunch. I thought that I was getting the run-around, but it turned out that they really were busy issuing passports, etc.

Because I had the morning free, I walked to the Rigoni and Rodeghiero communes. These are new since World War II. Someone approached me as I sloshed through the wet street in the Rigoni commune. I said one word, "Rigoni," and pointed to myself, and I

was immediately invited into their home. They spoke no English; I spoke no Italian; and my college French didn't work. So I said "Chicago," and they began to put up their hands in a machine gun position. I laughed, said "No," and they laughed, also.

I needed to get back to the court house so I tramped down the hill in a downpour. When a nice young man in a little car offered to pick me up, I didn't hesitate. After all who could possibly be interested in an old lady wearing a raincoat, scarf, and sensible shoes. It turned out that his name was Pesavento. A long-lost cousin? I'll never know.

After lunch when I arrived at the court house, I again tried to speak French, but the young clerk shook his head no. Then I pulled out my family pedigree chart, and he took one look at the Rigoni section, and said, "Soot." It wasn't until many years later that I found out the meaning of the word. It appears that our family was made up of charcoal makers. The fuel was then shipped to factories to fire the furnaces in big cities.


I had to write all the genealogy data from ancient books by hand because they had no copy machine. Then I pointed to my Rodeghiero line and he shook his head. I realize that the whole town was bombed level in WWII, but I can't fathom why they would have

Because of the heat in the valley, hundreds of Lowland Italians were vacationing in Asiago, and in the evening even in the rain the tourists were trooping up and down the main street window shopping. I did manage to flash our charge cards a few times and had a short visit to St. Mateo Church.

My only full day in Asiago was spent mainly dodging

raindrops and tracing ancestors. That was the main reason that I made a huge detour from Venice to Asiago and then to Germany. The War Memorial, churches, relatives, and war museums would have to wait for another trip.

Early the next morning we set sail in a limo from Asiago down through the Brenner Pass, into Germany and to Oberramagau for our observation of the Passion Play. All the actors spoke German! Not to worry; we unfortunately knew the sorrowful outcome.


