
Political Participation Game

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- Can I have two volunteers to be our political candidates for the grape and apple party?
- Step 1: Each candidate gives a 30 second pitch for why their fruit is better
- Step 2: Check the chat or my instructions to see if you have been told that you are allowed to vote
- Step 3: Raise your hand for which fruit you would vote for (based on whether you were told if you can vote)
- Step 4: We will repeat this process 3 times to see the result difference as the voter turnout level changes



Voting is one of the most influential civic activities we can engage in as Americans. That's why we've long provided our employees with resources to help them get registered.

This year, we're taking our support a step further as the official airline of the Commission on Presidential Debates (CPD), flying the crew that will produce each of the debates.

While the COVID-19 pandemic has changed air travel, we've learned that with some planning and extra effort, it's still possible—and safe. That's true of voting, too.

No matter which party you support or how you're planning to vote, we know our democracy will be stronger if you make your voice heard and make a plan to vote.

Voting Game




- We are going to play a more realistic version of our last voting game
- Does anyone know what the electoral college is?
- We are going to have candidates A and B. Everyone else will be voters, assigned to either the 10, 15, 20, or 25 electoral vote state.
- You will be told whether you can vote in the election and what your vote is for
- We will do three rounds of this activity
- Why did we modify the voting simulation this way?

Voting Rights Simulation



- Form three groups
- Milk vs. dark chocolate election
- Group A can only vote in round 1
- Group A and B can vote in round 2
- Group C can vote in round 3 if they pass the voter eligibility test

Voter Eligibility Test

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- Who was the 1st president?
- Who was the 31st president?
- Who is currently the president?
- These tests were things that Black people, people of color, and women often had to face in order to vote. These groups had much higher barriers to voter participation.

Answers

- 1. George Washington
- 2. Herbert Hoover
- 3. Joe Biden







Debrief

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- For people in groups A and B, how did this activity feel?
- For people in group C, how did it feel? Did this feel unfair to you?

 - o C: Male emancipated slaves and women


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What do people vote for?



- When choosing how to vote for, most people (but not all) vote by party, meaning for the democratic or republican candidate
- However, it is important to be an informed voter by understanding each candidate's stances on specific political issues
- By understanding the different political issues, a voter can ensure that their vote aligns with what they care about
