Message from Asher Cohen, President and Founder of Voters2Be

I hope you are doing well and finding ways to reflect and connect with your community during these emotionally challenging times. At the heart of Voters2Be's mission is a commitment to community engagement, and over the last couple of weeks, our organization has explored how the current global challenges impact how individuals engage with issues in their community. It is through this work that I have been exploring a few new ideas that I hope to introduce into Voters2Be's programming.

Although the most standard form of civic engagement is casting a vote in an election, there are other ways for individuals to engage with community issues. Civic engagement can be as simple as knowing who your legislators are, sending letters to your local politician, joining an organization to support an issue you care about, or attending City Council meetings.

Upon thinking more about how all of these things fall under the broad category of civic engagement, I realize that Voters2Be needs to expand its programming to teach our youth population the different ways they can advocate for issues they care about. Over the next six months, I hope to work with Gabriel Rhodes, our Chief Program

Officer, to develop an advocacy lesson that will teach students how they can fight for the issues they believe in. I hope to debut this lesson and expand our five-part *Democracy and You* course by adding an extra class on this topic in the Fall of 2024.

In addition to long-term planning, I am also happy to announce a few new things you can now explore on our website. The first is pictures from our fall in-person classes at the Association to Benefit Children in Harlem. You can access those photos here. The second thing I am excited to announce is the first output of our research center. You can now find our research on voter turnout levels here. Finally, I am excited to announce that I will be giving a presentation at the Morningside Heights Public Library on January 20th at 2pm. The presentation will focus on how parents can keep their kids civically engaged and kids can find ways to engage with politics.

Research Center Updates

We are excited to share the first output of our research center: a report on voter turnout levels and demographics. Over the last couple of months, members of our team at Voters2Be have been working on a state-by-state level to study current voter turnout levels and the demographics of each state based on the most recent census data. Using this information, we produced comparative charts by looking at each region of the country and averaging the data from the states within those regions.

From our research, we have identified a few important trends. The first trend confirmed our previous program framework: diverse areas tend to have the lowest voter turnout rate. This finding confirms how our programming must continue to reach diverse groups of students. Our research also identified how there is not a strong correlation between age and people choosing to vote. So, we have decided to re-evaluate our programming and consider expanding our classes. We are considering offering classes for adults where we go over the same key topics and skills related to civics and politics. Finally, our research determined that some areas of the country have much lower voter turnout levels than other regions. We are committed to expanding our programming to areas like the Southwest and Southeast that have the lowest voter turnout levels.
