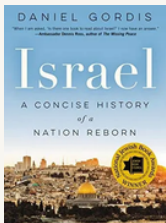

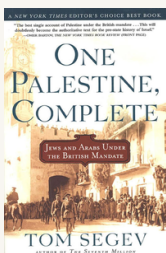
Historical Narratives of Palestine & Israel



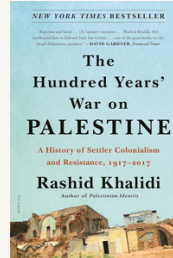

Israel: A Concise History of a Nation Reborn, Daniel Gordis - Offers a comprehensive overview of Israel's history from its pre-statehood era to the present day.



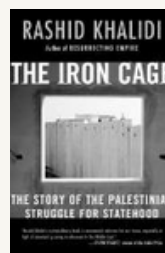

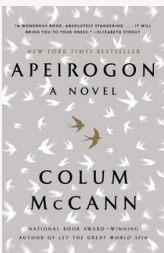
The Lemon Tree: An Arab, a Jew, and the Heart of the Middle East, Sandy Tolan

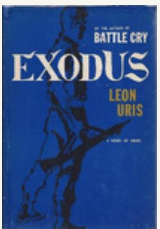

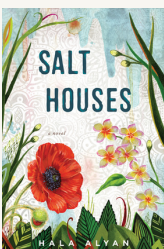

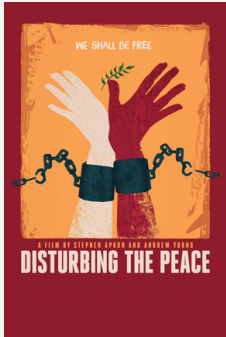


Exodus, Leon Uris - A historical novel set around the founding of the State of Israel in the late 1940s. It centers on the journey of Jewish refugees from post-World War II Europe, particularly through the story of the ship Exodus, which carries Holocaust survivors to Palestine. The novel intertwines the personal stories of key characters—most notably Ari Ben Canaan, a passionate leader in the Zionist movement—with the broader struggles for Jewish independence, Arab-Jewish tensions, and the geopolitical complexities surrounding Israel's creation. Uris blends history, drama, and romance, offering a compelling narrative about resilience, identity, and the fight for homeland.

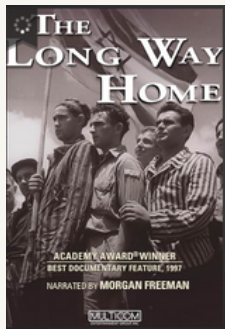


Salt Houses, Hala Ayan - This is a multi-generational novel that traces the lives of a Palestinian family displaced by war and conflict. It begins in the 1960s, with the Yacoub family forced to leave their home in Jaffa during the Six-Day War. The story follows subsequent generations as they scatter across the Middle East and beyond, struggling to maintain their identity amidst constant upheaval. Through vivid, intimate portraits of family members, Ayan explores themes of displacement, loss, memory, and the search for belonging, painting a poignant picture of how exile shapes lives over time.

"DISTURBING THE PEACE" is a documentary about the transformative journeys of former enemy combatants, including Israeli soldiers and Palestinian fighters, who unite to challenge the status quo and advocate for nonviolent solutions. The film explores their evolution leading to the establishment of Combatants for Peace. Set in the Middle East, it touches on universal themes, urging viewers to reject narratives that no longer serve humanity and actively contribute to creating a more peaceful world. "The Long Way Home" is a documentary depicting the struggles of Jewish refugees post-World War II and their pivotal role in the creation of Israel. The film underscores the hardships faced in Europe due to antisemitism and poverty, as refugees sought emigration to Palestine, often leading to detention in Cyprus. Narrated by Morgan Freeman and winner of an Academy Award for Best Documentary Feature in 1998.

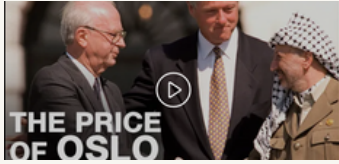

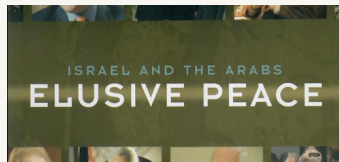


The Present

The Price of Oslo, a two-part documentary that explains the path leading to the Oslo Accords, the tale of private political negotiations, efforts for mutual understanding and the involvement of an unexpected mediator: the Scandinavian nation of Norway.
