1 ea. RED, YELLOW, GREEN BELL PEPPERS

1 rib of CELERY. chopped

1 medium ONION, chopped

1/2 cup of sliced SCALLIONS

1 Stick of BUTTER

2-3 cups shredded MILD CHEDDAR CHEESE


SEASONINGS/HERBS...

SALT; PEPPER; RUBBED SAGE; CURRY POWDER AND DRIED PARSLEY FLAKES

Crumble Breads in a large bowl; Saute all Vggies
Add the Squash and Veggies to the bowl

Mix to desired consistency







Leadership Service is More Than a Notion


BOARD OF DIRECTORS. Nice title. But not all are equal. Nor should you approve of every invitation. I have had the privilege of serving on over thirty Board of Directors. My last positions were President, Dearborn Street YMCA and Vice-Chair Mobile Chamber. I do not agree to serve unless I can make a positive impact. So there are several factors I consider before agreeing to serve:

- 1. Is this a ceremonial or a working board? This information helps you to access the resources and time needed to participate.
- 2. What is the current status of Board and Organization? Hopefully the organization presents you with a Board package: clippings, annual statement/990 Forms, financial summary, strategic summary, list of present Board members and By-Laws. If they do not, you need to research or conduct an inquiry.
- 3. Is the organization in compliance with their By-Laws? In particular I look for issues with accounting, terms, chain of command, and/or meetings.
- 4. Is the organization facing any compliance issues with funders, government, and/or vendors?
- 5. Does the organization utilize the same auditing firm over a long period? I am concerned that familiarity often breeds lax procedures and oversights.
- 6. Is the Board diverse and inclusive? It is wise to have a healthy balance of generations. Several times I have led the charge to appoint younger members when the Board is dominated by my peers (Baby Boomers).
- 7. Are there factions on the Board? Though we would like to believe that adults will think independently, many are followers. Even worse, some are appointed to boards to represent the interest of others and not the organization.
- 8. Does the organization have an updated strategic plan?
- 9. What are the Key Performance Indicators (KPI)? Are they being actively measured and evaluated?
- 10. Is the accounting process and system efficient. Bad numbers create worse decisions.
- 11. Ensure there is an active Directors and Officers (liability) Insurance policy.

In no means are the above in order of priority. But before agreeing to serve ensure you have the knowledge of the commitment of resources and time needed to make an impact.



Joseph McGill and Herb Frazier



The book is a fascinating read that shares the experiences and conversations with persons in those communities to enhance the stories. •





Dr. Ronald B. Mincy


Despite the overall economic gains in the 1990's, many young Black Men continue to have the poorest life chances of anyone in our society. Joblessness, low earnings, deconcentration of blue-collar employment, and criminal justice policies, has left less educated young adults contributing to reductions in marriage, increases in non-marital childbearing, and a host of other social problems. Mincy assembled a distinguished group of experts who examine how less educated Black Men fared relative to other less educated young people during the economic expansion of the 1990's and why. Two chapters comprehensively review policy opportunities to assist less educated young Black Fathers and discuss how to overcome political resistance to initiatives serving less educated Black Men.





Shelby Steele

In 1955 the killers of Emmett Till were acquitted because they were white. Forty years later accused murderer O.J. Simpson went free after his attorney Johnny Cochran portrayed him as a victim of racism. This book discusses the age of white supremacy, which still lingers today, to an age of white guilt, and it argues that neither has been good for African Americans. Through articulate analysis and engrossing recollections, acclaimed race relations scholar Steele sounds a powerful call for a new culture of personal responsibility.

When people are elected into positions of governmental power, they carry in their agendas to obfuscate the details of history. At understanding how power is used, it is not a stretch to imagine cataclysmic rewrites considering the notion that Christopher Columbus never existed let alone that he found something that was not lost in the first place. At the current rate of obfuscations, of fact or the erasure of same, just as African slaves can be described as willing itinerant unpaid immigrant cotton pickers for four hundred years, Martin Luther King Jr. will soon be described as a white man who committed suicide over his frustration and his inability to help poor Whites rise up beyond their station in America.

Should you think that these rewrites of history cannot happen, try to remember the plight of the indigenous people of this continent whose house the refrigerator was that contained the sandwich. School textbooks and encyclopedia will probably discuss the arduous eight years after George W. Bush in which America did not have a president. In the absence of explaining diversity, try explaining the deaths of 90 million people who died in World Wars I and II. How can you talk about pilot-astronaut turned Politician, John Glenn, without discussing the diversity of the theaters of war in which he piloted planes or of the Black female computers who plotted his safe return to earth from space? Assuming Jesus Christ to have been a real human being, in what ethnic script was his story first written before being translated into English and thousands of other languages? Considering the part of the world where Jesus, The Christ was born and lived, he was of an ethnic group other than Caucasian. The next-door that you hear will be that Jesus the Christ was a Christian...

He visited Davis Avenue, had dinner at the Patton Home, and also made visit to Josephine Allen's summer home in Coden.

Washington also visited Plateau, where he talked with the Africans who were illegally brought to America on the Clotilda. One of his tour guides was Alex Herman, (father to former U.S. Secretary of Labor Alexis Herman) who would later become the King of the Mobile Area Mardi Gras Association in 1940.





Those of us who have found ourselves with children to support and hard denials of assistance from the other parent have learned some difficult lessons. In 1851, there was no Domestic Relations Court or Department of Human Resources to manage child support in the manner that we have now. Women had to find a man to assist them in their endeavor to petition the court as well as find a man to accept the role of legal guardian of a child with no father. Women, who were expected to be caregivers and nurturers for all life, did not have the right to be the legal guardians of their own children. It was required that a man would oversee the financial aspects of rearing them.

Rosalie Colin was no different. She was the daughter of Theodore Colin and Jeanne Andry. In the late Spring or early Summer of 1850, Rosalie found herself pregnant. And on February 21, 1851, she delivered a girl, Marie Lorenza. Just before Marie was a month old, Rosalie petitioned the Honorable Sydney T. Douglass, Justice of The Peace, for support from Louis Z. Chastang, who had denied paternity. Douglass quickly passed the case to Edwin Rust, Judge of Probate. The two men who stepped up for Rosalie and her daughter were Louis Vivaret and John Trenier. They had been farmers and cattlemen in their earlier years. Trenier was also a founding member of Creole Fire No. 1. Vivaret was to be Marie's guardian and Trenier assisted him with a \$600 bond required by the court to demonstrate his ability to help raise baby Marie. That amount is the equivalent \$24,509.61 today. Neither party had ever married previously, so Rosalie did not have to compete with another woman with children for support. But she did have to fight Louis. Her petition to the court states that she asked him to step up to his responsibility but that he refused to do so. He made no provisions for maintenance or education of Marie Lorenza. Rosalie signed with her letter of mark, a sideways "X".

Louis Zenon, the son of Pierre Zenon Chastang and Marie Therese Bernoudy, made clear he had no intention of being a parent. A jury trial was required. As witnesses on his behalf, Louis brought with him Pierre Chastang, James Chastang, Henry Chapman, John A. Roper (an English merchant), James Black, and Alfred Chastang. Rosalie had herself and the State of Alabama behind her. The jury of "twelve good and lawful men" convicted Louis of Bastardy of young Marie who was brought to the court by her mother on September 8, 1851. The court mandated child support at \$30, paid annually each September for ten years. In comparison, the average farm laborer in Alabama in 1860 made \$18.90 per month. Court costs were also required of him. The following day, Louis Zenon Chastang washed his hands of the whole matter when he provided the court with a \$1000 bond, enough money to pay all the court costs and let the court pay out the \$30 annually for the next ten years.

The win was barely a subsidy. And like so many women today, Rosalie faced the difficulties of raising a child as best she could, on her own, accepting help where she found it necessary and safe. She and Marie lived with her parents, Theodore and Jeanne, during Marie's younger years. After 1860, the two faded into obscurity until November 13, 1906. There is a death of a Rosalie Collins on that day at 202 Washington Ave. The 1906 Mobile City Directory also shows Mary L. Collins, dressmaker, living at that address. In 1924, the death of a Mary Collins was documented, whose mother was Rosalie Collins. Could this be them? They are buried together in Magnolia Cemetery, Square 26, Lot 410.



Sometimes, I have to wonder why in the world people are so hell-bent in perpetuating harmful, racist myths — especially when it affects immigrants of color. All it does is create a lot of problems, and can lead to dangerous consequences. During the Presidential debate between Donald Trump and Kamala Harris, there was a question asked about immigration, Trump, being Trump, went into one of his infamous tirades, using the city of Springfield, Ohio as a prime example of 'immigration gone wild."

A little background, if you will: Springfield is located in the southwest part of the state, and has just under 59,000 residents as of the 2020 census. African-Americans make up 18 percent of the population. Notable famous people to come from the city include singer-musician John Legend. At one time, the city was booming, but a decline in industry caused the city to fall into economic decline. City leaders launched a movement designed to attract immigrants to the community to help improve the local economy. When new businesses arrived and a labor shortage occurred, Haitian immigrants arrived in Springfield in 2017 to work at local produce-packaging and machining factories. The city eventually rebounded, but there was still a labor shortage because of the addition of new jobs. When Haitians in other parts of the U.S. heard from relatives about the opportunities in Springfield, they did the natural thing—they took the shot and went there. To add to the matter, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, citing unrest in Haiti, granted temporary protected status to Haitian immigrants, allowing the existing migrant population living in the U.S. to live and work without the risk of deportation.

Well, you know what happened during the debate. Trump said that in Springfield, Haitian immigrants were eating dogs and cats, as well as geese, which was totally false. But you know, as with most rumors, this one really sprouted legs, gaining popularity with far-right and neo-Nazi groups, and causing bomb threats against schools, municipal buildings, and the like. It caused a migrant advocacy group to file a lawsuit against Trump and J.D. Vance for spreading a dangerous claim that Haitians

were killing dogs and cats, and killing and eating geese. But what happened in Springfield did not stay in Springfield. Here's where things really got crazy...in good ol' Alabama, no less. Rumors of a huge influx of Haitians in Sylacauga and Albertville were quickly debunked by officials of both cities, and Fairhope had to deal with the same issue. Hell, the media was barred from attending a meeting in Enterprise regarding mass migration, no doubt spurred on by Trump's rhetoric.

The latest discussion regarding Haitian immigrants came during a September Mobile City Council meeting. That day, several members of a conservative group complained that 1,000 Haitians would be coming to Mobile and surrounding communities, and wanted the city council to wave a magic wand, as it were, to stop that from happening.

Of course, the Mobile City Council has no control over immigration policy. That is a concern for federal lawmakers. City council members Joel Daves, Cory Penn, and William Carroll made that perfectly clear. For Carroll, it was especially painful, because his wife is Haitian and his children are first-and-second-generation Haitians. Not surprisingly, he took exception to the negative comments about migrants. I'm going to say this, and I'm going to be perfectly clear — the misinformation needs to stop, and stop now. Sure, it's fine if you have legitimate concerns about immigration policies. But when they involve people of color and they are unfairly targeted, then that's a whole new ball game. What do you think would've happened if a bomb had actually gone off in Springfield due to unchecked rhetoric and someone was hurt, or maybe even killed? Then what?

If people are coming here to America for a better life, all well and good. But don't make their lives miserable because you don't like their skin color or if you choose to follow the words of a brain-dead lunatic.



Black People Don't Know History






The Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd holds significant importance as one of the oldest historically Black congregations in the country. It is the oldest Black congregation in the state of Alabama and the fourth oldest in the city of Mobile. Particularly notable is that it was founded in 1854 by seven enslaved and free men and women under the support and guidance of Trinity and Christ Church of Mobile. This was at a time when the antebellum south embraced slavery in its harshest forms.

The first place of worship was opened for "Divine Service" in 1855. From there the church relocated in 1884 to State and Warren Streets and remained until the present location was erected in the Toulminville area in 1964. During those many years, the Church fostered several day schools, two missions and the absorption of parishioners from the Congregational Church in the area known as "Down the Bay".


Now, after 170 years of its founding, the Church of the Good Shepherd is an active member of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast and the city of Mobile. It has weathered the challenges of slavery, civil war, reconstruction and the era of Jim Crow. It continues to offer spiritual comfort and direction amidst both historical and modern struggles. It is a testament to hope and the "Audacity of Faith" that the founding seven imbued. In 2017, a historical marker was dedicated on the site of the present church for their seven founders; John Bryan, Joshua Davis, Mariah Davis, William Johnson, Hynson Jones, James Scott, Lucy Trueheart.

The parishioners of the Church of the Good Shepherd continue to guide, support, love and to serve, giving thanks to God for our rich heritage. The public is invited to join them Plea on Sunday, November 3, 2024, 10:00AM, for Holy Eucharist in thanksgiving of these 170 years. A reception and a special dedication will follow the service.
