The 92nd Division Buffalo Soldiers of World War II will present their first Film Festival at the City of Prichard Auditorium on Saturday, February 01 at 2 pm. The festival is designed to generate national and international news as the city has some of the most had some of the most historic and decorated Black men of World War II. Some of those men are still living and doing well.

The first movie of the festival is a 63 minute documentary entitled "INSIDE BUFFALO". It includes a clip of a 1944 dogfight by the Tuskegee Airman who shot down the first WWII Jet Aircraft. This award winning feature film, by filmmaker Fred Kuwornu, tells the story of the 92nd Buffalo Division of the U.S. Army. This was the all African American segregated combat unit that fought with outstanding heroism in Italy during World War II. They were called Buffalo Soldiers, named after the 10th Calvary Regiment formed at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, on September 21, 1866. That nickname came from the Native American Tribes who fought against those all Black Regiments on the western frontier. These men fought two wars; one against the Nazis and the other against racial discrimination, and those that were blessed enough to survive found that their contributions went unnoticed upon their return to the United States. Former President Barack Obama and Family also make a cameo appearance in the film.

The festival will feature three additional films in this inaugural year that will be shown in various locations across the area that are still being confirmed. The featured films will include the following:

#### **Buck and The Preacher**

STARRING SIDNEY POITIER, HARRY BELAFONTE AND RUBY DEE. Released in 1972, the movie features Poitier as a ex-soldier turned trail guide who leads former slave to the West after the civil war. He's joined by his wife played by Dee, and a comman preacher played by Belafonte.

#### In The Heat of the Night

STARRING SIDNEY POITIER AND ROD STEIGER
This 1967 film features Poitier as Virgil Tibbs, a Philadelphia police detective, and Steiger, as a racist police chief in Sparta, Mississippi, where Tibbs is initially accused of a murder in that town. Once he's cleared, Tibbs reluctantly agrees to help solve the case. This film won five (5) Academy Awards and 3 Golden Globe Awards. It was also nominated for two (2) additional Academy Awards.

#### **The Wereth Eleven**

A World War II documentary about eleven African American soldiers who were overrun by German forces in Wereth, Belgium during the Battle of the Bulge. The soldiers were from the 333rd Field Artillery Battalion, a racially segregated unit, and their position was compromised by a local resident who reported there whereabouts to a SS scouting party. These soldiers had been separated from the rest of the battalion after a battle and sought shelter in the town. Once captured, the group was taken to a field where they were tortured and shot on December 17, 1944. Their frozen bodies were discovered six weeks later when the allies re-captured the area. This film tells the stories of all involved including the convictions of those involved and the honors bestowed on the massacred eleven.



## Fighting and Fixing Others

# Dianco Williams

#### SELF-PROCLAIMED FIXER

Williams she says that what angers her the most about having cancer-- she can't fix it.

"I'm a fixer by nature. And it was tough for me to accept that I can't fix cancer.

"Williams says that from her professional life to her home, among family and friends, she is known as the fixer.

"It's one of the many hard lessons that I've learned on this journey. I can't control everything. And maybe while I was doing all that fixing, perhaps I should have encouraged others more to lean on God and wait for Him to do the work." Williams was diagnosed with Her2 positive breast cancer earlier this year and decided to share her journey with the world via social media.

"I had no intentions of telling anyone besides my closest family members and friends. But one day, I was convicted."

Williams said she attended a worship service and a minister-- with whom she had not spoken to about her illness-- told her that she knew what was happening in her life but there were miracles happening all around her as well. "At that moment I knew I had to share my journey and the goodness of God," Williams says.

On June 24, 2024 Williams, who works as a supervisor and Director of Marketing at Crane Title in Mobile wrote on her Facebook page...

Often you all see me with champagne asking you to book your closings with me. Often you see me with a ton of people at a party that I've planned for Crane Title. Often times you see me with my children at their games, graduations, or just around. What do you see? A big smile from me. Well today I will share with you a moment when the smile paused.

She went on to explain that she had been diagnosed with breast cancer and that she must be a testament to God's grace, mercy, and faithfulness in her life. She admitted that she expected her journey to be filled with tears, prayers, laughter, and ultimately victory.

Williams has been and sharing her journey ever since, via Facebook and TikTok. From highs and lows of feeling ill after treatments to the ordeal of losing her beautiful head of hair, Williams says it is important to share her journey because tomorrow it will be someone else's journey. She wants to encourage others to fight. "Cancer is sneaky," Williams said. "People think they are doing all the right things, checking themselves regularly as they should, and still end up with cancer."

Williams said she never felt a lump in her breast, but had been told repeated by doctors that she has very dense breasts, a diagnosis often given to black women. "This is why it's so important to have your mammogram. And I want to encourage women, especially women of color to be relentless about it."

[Statistics show, that while there has been an overall 42 percent decline in breast cancer deaths over the last three decades—there is a persistent mortality gap between Black women and white women. According to the

#### **HAPPY NEW YEAR & BLESSED DAYS AHEAD!**

Thank you all for your readership and we hope we are meeting your expectations. This being fruitcake season, I have a new version of Grandma's fruitcake. This cake is good throughout the year and easy to make, got it from "A World of Baking, circa 1968.

#### **Cream Cheese Fruitcake**

1 lb **Cream Cheese** (room temperature)

1 lb **Butter** (room temperature)

3 cups Sugar

7 large **Eggs** (room temperature)

4-1/2 cups sifted **Flour** 

1 tbsp Baking Powder

1/2 cup Apple Juice

1 cup **Candied Pineapple**, crushed

1cup **candied Cherries**, halved (red and green)

1 cup **Chopped Pecans** 

1/2 cup Blanched Slivered Almonds

Grease three (3) loaf pans. Line pans with wax paper and grease the paper.

Sift FLOUR and BAKING POWDER together; set aside. In a separate bowl, beat CREAM CHEESE and BUTTER until well blended. Add SUGAR and beat until light and fluffy. Add EGGS one at a time until blended. Fold in 3-1/2 cups of FLOUR mixture with the APPLE JUICE.

Thoroughly coat the CANDIED FRUIT and NUTS with the remaining FLOUR mixture and fold into batter.

Fill the three (3) pans 3/4 full with batter and bake 325F for one (1) hour and 20 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Let cakes cool in pans on cooling rack((s) for 10 to 15 minutes before removing from pan.

Remove wax paper before wrapping and storing. USE CAKES WITHIN 10 DAYS OF STORING.

American Cancer Society, Black women have a 38 percent higher death rate from breast cancer than any other race. Statistically Black women are more likely to have diabetes, heart disease, and obesity, and are less likely to breastfeed after childbirth—all of which are risk factors for breast cancer. However, many aren't aware that biology also plays a role. Black women are disproportionately affected by more aggressive subtypes of cancer, such as triple-negative breast cancer (TNBC) and inflammatory breast cancer. At the time of this interview, Williams was completing phase one of her chemo treatments. She says that wants women to know that the journey is not easy.]

"Chemotherapy is hard and tough. Most days I've felt like I can't do it anymore. But with the amazing support system I have, I know I have to keep fighting."

Williams is the mother of three children, twin boys and a daughter. She says that their devotion and support, along with that of a devoted friend, Andrew Crane, is what makes her stronger.

"They constantly tell me I'm beautiful, even when I feel I'm not. And before each chemo, myself, Andy and my kids go out to dinner to celebrate one step closer to finishing chemo." While in the fight of her life, Williams is still encouraging others daily. During the month of October, her social media posts included a gorgeous photo shoot encouraging women to "fight like a girl" and "don't let your boobs kill you."

"I just want women to know that early detection can save your life!!! Cancer can rob you of so much, but it doesn't have to be your life!"

After she finished chemo, Williams says she will have a double mastectomy and reconstruction with her own body tissue.

"As I fight and WIN it is my prayer you all are healthy and take care of yourselves too."

Williams support system has created pink wristbands that say "Fight With Dee". She says that although, they read "Fight With Dee" let them be a reminder to you that we all have battles to fight and together we can conquer anything. "There is a scripture in the wristband, Mark 11:24- Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours."

#### **Commissioners Honored by NAMI-Alabama**

Commissioners Connie Hudson and Merceria Ludgood were recently recognized as Friends of the Court by the National Alliance on Mental Illness Alabama Chapter. Dr. Cindy Gipson, AltaPointe's Associate Director of Crisis Services, delivered their awards at the Oct. 28 Mobile County Commission meeting.

The NAMI Alabama Awards acknowledge the dedication of individuals or organizations that have made significant contributions to the organization's mission: to advocate, educate, and support people and families affected by mental illness so they can build better lives. NAMI-Alabama's Friend of the Court Award recognizes individuals associated with efforts in the justice-involved arena who have shown exceptional advocacy and support to those going through the court process and have worked to support better treatment and solutions for people with mental illness.

Gipson explained they were nominated together as a "Dynamic Duo who are true mental health champions."

- **District 1 Commissioner Merceria Ludgood** was nominated for her local efforts to champion the Stepping Up Initiative and her decades of effort to prevent unnecessary incarceration and lessen recidivism through mental health programs. According to Gipson, "her unwavering commitment to supporting individuals facing mental health crises, has made a profound impact on the community."
- **District 2 Commissioner Connie Hudson** was nominated for her "passion for improving access to treatment for individuals living with mental illness, especially those who are justice-involved," said Gipson, and for her support of mental health initiatives through her many years of elected office. Gipson touted her leadership in securing mental health clinicians at Community Corrections and in the 2023 launch of the new Mental Health Court.

Mobile County's Mental Health Court, supported by the Mobile County Commission through American Rescue Plan Act funding, focuses on treatment through collaboration with mental health providers and shortens the time that individuals with mental illness spend in jail through program compliance monitoring.

Gipson also touted their support of Sequential Intercept Mapping to identify service gaps, co-response initiatives between law enforcement and clinicians, and Crisis Intervention Team training, which she said have led to better outcomes for individuals in crisis. She concluded her award presentation by sharing that the NAMI-Alabama's Awards Committee described these two Commissioners as the most impressive nominees in the state. •



## **Get to Know...**



#### **INCREASING AWARENESS...** The Sickle Cell Disease Association of America

It was a passion for people that caused Gulf Coast native Gerald Alfred to come back to Mobile and take over as executive director of the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America (SCDAA)— Mobile Chapter. "No matter about what I've done in my career, it all goes back to giving," he said.

The SCDAA-Mobile Chapter, which serves Mobile, Baldwin, Choctaw, Clarke, Conecuh, Covington, Escambia, Monroe, and Washington counties, certifies community health partners and social workers, not just in Mobile, but throughout the United States. "We have people from all over the United States come to Mobile once a year for certification and training that we're sponsoring with the University of South Alabama, because we have a close relationship with the school," said Alfred, who has been executive director since September. "Who would've thought that? People outside the city know, but what about people here in Mobile?"

To that end, Alfred is embarking on a campaign to make people more aware about the organization. The program, entitled 'Be Heard,' which stands for Bridging Education, Hope and Empowerment, Advocacy Research, and Dedication. "You got people out there who can really benefit from it, and that's through education and outreach," he said. "Within that campaign, I've got people who have a skill set that's second to none, and you're going to hear 'Be Heard' all over this city. You're going to see it on vehicle wrap, billboards, Tik Tok videos. It's going to cover so much of everything. There are those who know we deal with sickle cell, but we also help with utility assistance, groceries, transportation, clothes, school uniforms, GED prep, after school tutorial and enrichment programs, as well as applications for going to college. If I can learn about all this in three months, certainly we can spread the word. We're trying to make an impact and educate

this area and remove some of these barriers.'

Alfred has the background necessary to bring more awareness about SCDAA-Mobile Chapter — after all, he's a native of Prichard and a Blount High graduate. From there, he attended Jackson State University, where he majored in voice. Then, he decided he wanted to make a change. "I decided that I didn't want to major in music," he said. "So, I decided to go to Miles College and graduated from there. Actually, this music space that was there paid for my education; I was able to sing in the choir and be a student director without majoring in music." As for his professional career, Alfred began with the City of Prichard, where he worked under the Jesse Norwood administration as the Director of Community Development and Director of Economic Development. "I had the opportunity to work on a lot of great

projects, and learned to do a lot of grant writing," he said. "I did a lot of great things that I'm proud of, including the development of Renaissance Park and working closely with the Weed and Seed Initiative. I worked with all of those different entities, and eventually became the director of Weed and Seed."

Alfred continued to work in the non-profit space, working closely with the Justice Department, city officials, county officials, and state and federal officials, and managed to do a lot of great things in the city. "Pollard Park was one of our major things," he said. "At one time, that park was dormant. We worked with the County Commission and revitalized it. From there, the space went into

the public sector. I started doing consultant work for the

federal government, and finally, I got hired on at the WAVE Transit System." He was in senior management with WAVE for 18 years, and was responsible for the day-to-day operations at the intermodal facility in downtown Mobile at the GM&O building. From there, he started working deeper in operations and administration. "I had the chance to learn all the planning and workings of the operations system," he said. "It put me into a position to not only be there, but to do something I never thought I would be doing. I was benefitted with the opportunity to go to Birmingham, where I was the Chief Operations Officer for the city's transit authority. "Keep in mind, my mom never had a car; the way we got

around when I was a kid was on the bus. We went to church, we went to the grocery store, everywhere. Fast forward, and who would have thought I would be the head person of the largest transit system in the state of Alabama?'

One project Alfred worked on while with the Birmingham Transit Authority was the Birmingham Express, a rapid transit system that was the first in the state of Alabama. As part of the transit authority, he wore many hats while managing numerous departments. "I had a very dynamic team to help roll that system out," he said. "This was a fleet that consisted of 15 totally-electric buses that will get you from one side of Birmingham to another. And while I was there, I was responsible for operations, maintenance, compliance, planning, safety, facilities, and marketing."

When the SCDAA-Mobile Chapter's executive director position came open, Alfred jumped at the chance. "I saw the opportunity," he said. "I realized that I wanted to stay here in Mobile. I had opportunities to leave the city again, but Mobile is home... Prichard is home. There's so much more I can do here; I see kids every day, I see people every day that I know. I truly believe in what Sickle Cell is doing, and when I did research, one thing that really caught my attention was if people knew what was Sickle

I would like to address the concerns and phenomenon of urban decline in AMERICAN cities, focusing on the socio-economic, political, and environmental factors that we are truly facing that contribute to the deterioration in urban areas. This paper aims to understand the complexities of urban decay and implications for residents and policymakers. Oftentimes, they might simply need a ride to their treatment, someone to hold their hand, someone to pray with them, someone to cry with, someone to try on wigs with, someone to listen, and someone to be there as they ring the bell. Cell doing. People knew what was Franklin Memorial Clinic was doing; what about Sickle Cell? That's when Alfred began to dig deeper and draw on past experiences to learn about sickle cell anemia. "I remember when I was in middle school I was told that I had sickle cell trait," he said. "One thing that made me realize was that I can't cry no more because I thought I had sickle cell (disease). The education piece wasn't there for me, so why can't we go out and educate?"

The 'Be Heard' campaign, said Alfred, will be a big start in educating the public and initiate programs never done before. "It's going to be a new way of doing things," he said. "We're going to concentrate on being heard. "We're going to really concentrate on digging deep and being as transparent as we can to make a difference in all nine counties. One of the programs we'll be rolling out are creating a demand-response transportation program, based on the dial-a-ride, where you're able to actually call in and within 24 hours schedule us to pick you up, take you to where you need to go, regardless of where it is.

"Can we do it? Yes, we can, because we're doing so many things right now, but we've got to get the word out. It's going to be the board; it's going to be all of us. I want my board involved, because we have a lot of resources with those guys. I want them being drum majors for us, and they're doing that right now."

## **Creole History Highlights** Tracy Neely

#### **What's in a Name**

Our names are so much more than just a few letters spoken in a particular order or written on a page. They hold history. Andry, Brue, Baptiste, Chastang, Collins, Durette, Trenier, Laurendine, Juzang, Petite, Heninburg, Baudin, Nicholas. These are just a few of the more recognized names which have their early origins on this continent connected to Mobile. Some came from France, some from Spain, and some from Italy, by way of Canada, but they all converged upon the Gulf Coast, leaving their mark on Mobile. All contributed to our Creole family. All are connected. Once Spain finally turned over the keys of the Port City to the American government in 1819 and Alabama became a state, the desire to anglicize through development increased. Mobile's new identity would be one stitched to the evolution of Confederate fabric. Those who had been white identified Creoles during French and Spanish occupations would drop their Creole identity to merge with the new Anglo establishment. Another tiny but effective piece of this evolution was the non-English surname. When record keeping began under the American flag in Alabama, record keepers did not check for spelling. Census takers just had to be able to read and write, and spelling was not a requirement of the job. As a result, many names in many documents were spelled in a manner that was comfortable to the writer with no consideration for whom the name belonged. One of the best examples of this occurrence is the surname, Yrigoyen.

Miguel Yrigoyen (sometimes spelled Yrrigoyen) was the keeper of the Spanish Royal Hospital while Mobile was occupied by Spain from about 1803 until December 1819. He fathered six known children with Constance Hugon, a Free Woman of Color: Marie, Francis, Candelaria, Matilda, Ygnacia, and Julian. Ygnacia and Julian died extremely young, but the other four children grew to adulthood and had families. Francis married Emily Daniel (the widow of Baptiste Serra) and later Zoe Dauphin. Candelaria partnered with Ulysses Barnard, and Matilda married John Martin and later, Felix Compagno. Marie, the oldest daughter of Miguel and Constance, married Pierre Laurendine. Early on, her maiden name is transformed. In her marriage record, Henry Lewis, the court clerk, anglicized her entire name from Marie Yrigoyen to Mary Gregory. And by this time, Pierre's ancestral Italian name, Lorandini, had long been altered to Laurendine. Had either Marie or Pierre been able to write, they would have signed their names much differently than the clerk did. Similarly, Chastang and Chestang are the same family. Despite what some might say, it is not a matter of race that determines which vowel you get. It was a matter of who was doing the writing and what that person knew about the spelling of the name and were they just spelling what they heard pronounced. Even the formerly enslaved Major Pierre Chastang's name was written with an A and not an E in his obituary. Neither spelling is better than the other. It is simply happenstance.

This change in spelling is often referred to as "bastardization" and it is now understood to be a term intended to "other" people who did not carry the original spelling of a surname. But that change in spelling is not indicative of baseness in any way. It is, however, evolutionary. It is part of the human journey. It is part of the writing of one's personal history and the future history of one's own descendants. We must remember that our name, first and last, is important. It carries us through all we do. Some names inspire and some make people cringe. But it is our unique first impression upon this world. Our first name sends us forward and our last name tells us where we come from. We only have to look, because with every breath we are writing our own history. •

#### **Bishop State/Alabama A&M Transfer Scholarships**


A partnership between Bishop State Community College and Alabama A&M University will provide new full-tuition scholarship opportunities for Bishop State graduates planning to transfer. Through the memorandum of understanding, the institutions aim to streamline the pathway for students to continue their education at the four-year university, while offering financial support to those who qualify. The MOU outlines that Alabama A&M will dedicate 10 Transfer Merit Scholarships for Bishop State graduates who meet the minimum criteria, which include a 3.25 GPA or higher and at least 60 credit hours. Recipients must maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.1 and complete a minimum or 30 credit hours per academic year in order to retain the scholarship for up to four semesters.

These scholarships are designed to ease the financial burden for students pursuing bachelor's degrees at AAMU and reflect the institutions' shared commitment to increasing access to higher education for all students, particularly those from underserved c ommunities.

Also as part of the MOU, Bishop State graduates with a 3.33 GPA or higher will be given priority consideration for the AAMU Honor's Program, and a 15% tuition discount will be extended to full-time faculty and staff employed by Bishop State who are pursuing an online Ph.D. program at AAMU. In addition to these benefits, the MOU emphasizes academic collaboration and ongoing support for transfer students, ensuring a smooth transition from Bishop State to Alabama A&M University.











#### Souls of Time Returns

Japonica Brown wears many hats.
She is an author, actor, counselor and director, to name a few. But Brown is much more than her bachelor's degree English and Creative Writing and her Masters of Fine Arts degree in Acting. Japonica Brown is a prophesy fulfilled. At the tender age of nine, Brown was told that God had a special job for her to do. And today, some, thirty years later, she says she understands the call.



Japonica Brown is the writer of "Souls of Time,' an original production commissioned by the Mobile County Board of Commissioners to educate Mobile residents about local black history. The highly successful musical drama debuted at the Mobile Civic Center Theater in 2024 to a soldout audience and will return to the stage at the Mobile Saenger Theater on January 17, 2025. Produced and composed by Mobile's own Yvonne Matthews and sponsored by The Mobile County Commission, the musical drama explores the life of a15-year old girl residing in Mobile, Alabama in 2020 who is transported to 1963, living in the body 15-year-old girl who lived in the same house 57 years earlier. Brown says you will "surely not leave the same" after seeing this production, "especially if you grew up in Mobile." She explains that the storyline shares so much history, good and bad, about life in this city, while paralleling current issues. "The story is multi-layered—it's about family, and the power of the church and activism and how those things were a part of everyday life," she says. "Three things were very necessary for me in this presentation -- that we reflect, remember and celebrate those times."

Brown, who is also a former school counselor, says it was extremely important to her that "Souls of Time" touched every age group. "I had to reach the kids. And I actually drew from my experiences as a school counselor in the writing of the story. I wanted to draw the kids in as well." Brown says she has witnessed the connection between therapy and the theater. "It can teach and heal." And standing on the state of the Mobile Civic Center Theater preparing for the presentation of "Souls of Time" Brown says she realized she was answering her life's call through her work.


"I was so emotional because I remember being in that theater, standing on that stage and saying I would love to present something here one day. It was humbling." Brown says she recognizes that she is not able to do what she does alone. She is definitely led by a higher power who gives her the stories and leads her through the process. #### **Black People Don't Know History**

Brothers and Sisters, I have written numerous articles on, "Black People Don't Know History." Also, Trump was supporting electrocuting the 'Central Park Five' after they were exonerated in 1989. The members were exonerated because the actual perpetrator confessed, and DNA proved it. #### Let's Fool Around with Politically Correct Speech and Writing.

Is it important as to how you address yourself and introduce yourself to others? We feel that it is important. Several years ago, some of us decided to drop the description, African-American, from our lexicon.
