4. Eligibility Requirements

- Be at least 18 years old.
- Hold a current Australian driver's license (a Medium Rigid license is preferred but not mandatory at application stage).
- Have a good level of physical fitness.
- Pass a National Police Check and provide satisfactory references.
- Meet health and medical standards, including drug and alcohol testing.
- Meet literacy and numeracy requirements.

5. Application Process Overview

The application process is designed to assess a candidate's suitability across multiple competencies and includes:

- Submission of an online application
- Completion of online cognitive assessments
- Physical Aptitude Test (PAT)
- Panel Interview
- Medical Examination
- Background and Reference Checks

6. Recruitment Stages

Stage 1: Online Application

Submit your application during an open recruitment period via the FRNSW Careers Portal.

Stage 2: Cognitive Assessments

Online tests evaluate numerical, verbal, and abstract reasoning.

Stage 3: Physical Aptitude Test (PAT)

Includes simulated firefighting tasks such as hose drag, ladder raise, casualty drag, and stair climb with weights.

Stage 4: Interview

A structured panel interview to assess communication, teamwork, problem-solving, and alignment with FRNSW values.

Stage 5: Medical and Background Checks

Medical exam to ensure you meet health standards. Includes drug and alcohol screening, hearing, vision, and cardiovascular fitness.

7. Training Academy: What to Expect

Successful applicants attend the FRNSW Emergency Services Academy in Orchard Hills, Sydney. The 13-week Recruit Training Program includes:

- Firefighting theory and tactics
- Hose and ladder drills
- Breathing apparatus training
- First aid and CPR
- Road crash rescue
- HazMat awareness
- Community safety and education

Graduates are then deployed to fire stations across NSW as Probationary Firefighters.

8. Life as a Firefighter

Firefighters in NSW work a rotating roster, typically involving four days on (two day shifts, two night shifts) followed by four days off. Responsibilities include:

- Responding to emergency incidents
- Conducting fire safety inspections and community education
- Maintaining equipment and station readiness
- Participating in ongoing training and development

Q: Do I need firefighting experience to apply?
