From the **Board President**

January 2025

Dear Friends and Fellow Descendants,

This annual report highlights some of WCA's activities in the cemetery and Eastex-Jensen community, recognizes descendants and the friends whose support makes operating the Association and maintaining the cemetery possible, and presents WCA's financial position as of December 31, 2024.

McDaniel Street Cemetery, which contains multiple family cemeteries, is an important historic anchor deeply ingrained in the identity of the Eastex-Jensen community. (It is sometimes referred to as Westcott Cemetery by the neighborhood). Our vision is to preserve the integrity of these early settlers' homestead cemeteries for future generations of descendants while creating a place of community pride, serenity, and learning for people living and working in Eastex-Jensen. With your support, we are making progress.

A year ago this month, the WCA board of directors met in a facilitated retreat to create a strategic plan that would guide us as we implement the Vision Plan, continue routine maintenance, operate the Association, and build reserves for sustainability and emergencies. As of December 31, 2024, donations and pledges in the amount of \$45,929 (18% of the \$250,000 goal we set at that retreat) have been received. Initially, we planned to raise all these funds by the end of 2026, my final year on the board of directors. However, last spring, extreme weather events—the Derecho followed by the summer's Hurricane Beryl—depleted WCA's Emergency Reserve Fund, and we recognized that we would need to extend this ambitious timeline and our fundraising strategies beyond 2026 in order to implement all the elements of the Vision Plan. We invite your participation in making McDaniel Street Cemetery a greenspace asset to be enjoyed by the neighboring northside community and descendants for generations to come.


Around 1849, Richard D. Westcott moved his family to Harris County, Texas, and purchased a large tract of farmland with a sawmill on it. The Westcott family homestead cemetery was established on that property and formally dedicated for community use in 1893. Over time, the land was sold to a small group of intermarried neighboring families including the McDaniel, McDonald, Cours, Farmer, Newton, and Schuller families. John Farmer, who owned land just west of the cemetery, also retained a portion of that property for the cemetery. The earliest burial is reported to have taken place in 1850, with interments continuing into the early 1960s.

Today, the cemetery is situated between I-69 (Eastex Freeway) and the Hardy Toll Road, off Jensen Drive and East Crosstimbers, at the curve of McDaniel Street and Schuller Road. During the cemetery's 110-year history, the surrounding area developed from white rural homesteads to a primarily African American residential neighborhood. Today, the community is mostly Latinx.


WCA was formed in 2018 by three Westcott descendant siblings. Working with Texas Historical Commission, in 2020 the previously unnamed property containing the Westcott and other family cemeteries was collectively named McDaniel Street Cemetery and designated a Historic Texas Cemetery. WCA became the legal conservator of the cemetery, responsible for its care and maintenance, in October 2021.

Winter 2024

Texas Cemetery Restoration was back in the cemetery in early February to complete the work begun in 2022 to reset the rest of the grave markers.

WCA joined the Greater Northside Chamber of Commerce (GNCC), serving one Houston's most historic and resurgent communities.

Board Retreat



WCA held its first facilitated board retreat at the offices of the Houston Chronicle. The board began developing a three-year strategic fundraising plan to raise \$250,000 to implement the Vision Plan, add to the Cemetery Emergency Fund, and the Association Reserve Fund. The retreat was facilitated by Cindy Lucia, who graciously volunteered her time.



The three security cameras, funded with a grant from Outreach Strategists LLC in 2023, were reprogrammed and re-installed in new locations, and Houston Tool Bank volunteers built and donated two picnic tables for the cemetery – just in time for the third annual Descendants Day.



Descendants Day was held on April 28 with members of the Farmer, Montgomery, Newton and Westcott families attending.

WCA installed two limestone quarry blocks at the curve of McDaniel Street and Schuller Road (in front of the temporary front fence) as barriers to car impacts.

Spring 2024

On May 16, the powerful windstorm known as the Derecho took down 8 trees in the cemetery and damaged the temporary front fence on McDaniel Street, where one of the limestone barriers is positioned. The security cameras were irreparably damaged in this storm as well.



Summer 2024

Hurricane Beryl felled another 10 trees in the cemetery in July, causing more damage to the temporary front fence and parts of the permanent perimeter fence.



With multiple bids in hand to remove the 18 fallen trees, the WCA board selected Dr. Lopez Tree Landscaping – referred by next-door neighbor Houston Car Wash – which offered a volume discount and the flexibility to remove half the trees in August, with the rest to be removed in the future, pending the availability of funds.

Fall 2024

Board members Lloyd Prince and Sara Haynes visited with neighbors, including District H Councilmember Mario Castillo, who served as co-Marshall of the 10th Annual Jensen Jubilee parade on October 19 in Shady Lane Park.



OFFICERS



Sara W. Haynes is WCA’s founding board president and is currently serving her third and final three-year term in this role. Her connection to the cemetery is through her maternal grandfather’s Westcott mother and grandparents. Sara formed WCA as a nonprofit in 2018 with her two surviving siblings. She graduated with a B.A. from the University of Texas at Austin, completed the Nonprofit Executive Certificate program at University of Houston, and is a graduate of Leadership Houston’s XXV Class. 
