## **Goodbyes Are Hard**

Recently the SMC family reluctantly said "Goodbye and Good Luck" to some of our long-serving and beloved volunteers.

Carl Fisher, MD, has taken care of patients at SMC for nearly 30 years. He started volunteering when he and his wife, Lois, started spending time in Pawleys Island while both were still working in Charlotte. Although trained as an OB/GYN, Dr. Fisher quickly found that he was treating a lot of diabetes, hyperten-

sion and other chronic diseases since the clinic had a limited number of providers. In 2008, Dr. Fisher graciously agreed to be the interim Medical Director when that position was unexpectedly vacated. Assured by the ED and Board of Directors that it would be short-term, he remained in that "temporary" position for 10 years!

In addition to providing patient care, Dr. Fisher and his wife, Lois, have always been great champions for Smith Clinic, recruiting new volunteers, engaging donors, and enthusiastically promoting the clinic to funders. Lois helped update our donor database and supported various fundraisers, even grabbing a bag and acting as a "secret shopper" to encourage buyers during a clinic yard sale!

The risk of contracting COVID-19 forced Dr. Fisher to reluctantly step away from patient care in April. He and Lois continue to be vocal and active supporters of the clinic and they will be dearly missed when they move back to Charlotte to be near children and grandchildren in September.

To honor Dr. Fisher's outstanding contributions to the clinic, the highest level of Volunteer Recognition has been named for him: The Dr. Carl Fisher Lifetime Achievement Level. This level recognizes those, like Dr. Fisher, who have contributed more than 5000 hours of volunteer service to the clinic. The only volunteer (other than Dr. Fisher) to reach this lofty level is our beloved nurse volunteer: Anne Duncan. (Story continued on pg. 2)

# Tammy's Story: "I don't know what I would do without Smith Clinic."



Tammy Howell has been a Smith Clinic patient for over 10 years, having lost her insurance after her divorce. "Smith Clinic has been a lifesaver for me," she says, kind eyes sparkling above her mask. "I don't know what I would do without this place."

After a recent medical visit, Tammy Howell came to my office to tell me how much she appreciated the "wellness check" telephone calls she receives regularly from Anne Duncan, a SMC volunteer nurse. She said that the calls meant a lot to her, and that she was grateful to Anne for checking to make sure she was able to get her medicine and that she was doing ok, especially during the pandemic.

Tammy was working as a waitress when she started coming to the clinic. During the tourist season, she made decent money, however, during the off-season she often found it difficult to make ends meet. Always determined and hard-working, she held yard sales to earn a little extra income. Eventually, she found a job as a caregiver four nights a week. "I couldn't do it without the clinic," she says, "I have to take care of my diabetes and high blood pressure, otherwise, there is no way I could work those 12-hour shifts."

Tammy is also grateful to SMC for helping her get much-needed surgery this year. "I appreciate all of you. Everyone is so nice and helpful. You just don't know how much it means to me."

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## Jere's Story: "Smith Medical Clinic saved my life"

Jere is an active 64-year-old man and a hard worker, but he hadn't felt right lately. He wasn't a complainer, but he told his wife that his knees were bothering him and he just didn't have any energy.

When his wife shared her concern with a Smith Medical Clinic volunteer, the volunteer suggested that she make an appointment for Gere.

After listening to Gere's symptoms, Fred Polando, PA, diagnosed him with congestive heart failure and immediately sent him to the emergency room. Gere had a stroke at the hospital. "The doctors said if I been home when it happened, I would have either died or have suffered permanent brain damage," Gere said, and then added, thoughtfully, "I wouldn't have gone to the hospital. I would have laid in bed thinking I would feel better soon."

Gere is not alone. The Cleveland Clinic recently surveyed over 500 men aged 18 to 70 across America and found that only three in five men get


### Chuck Swenson

Chuck Swenson, a retired school administrator, died July 20 at the Lakes at Litchfield. He was 97.

Mr. Swenson worked with Dr. Cathcart Smith to help refurbish a mobile home, fixing walls, stairs, and adding cabinets, that would become the very first Smith Medical Clinic building.

He was born Charles Nathaniel Swenson, Sept. 19, 1922, in Chicago, the son of Albin F. Swenson and the former Jennie R. Olson. He grew up in Erie, Pa. His father was an engineer with General Electric who died when Chuck was 3. His mother took in boarders during the Depression. He graduated from North Park College in Chicago and served in the Navy as a chaplain's assistant during World War II. During training at Middlebury College in Vermont, he met and married the former Betty Lou Chamberlain.

Mr. Swenson attended Yale Divinity School and intended to go into the ministry. He worked summers at a boys camp in Vermont run by his father-in-law, a teacher at Rye Country Day School in New York. That experience led him to earn a teaching degree from the New York State Teachers College in Oswego.



He had been an avid woodworker since childhood and started teaching industrial arts, which was also known as shop class.

He taught in Vermont and New York before taking a position as a guidance counselor at Pocantico Hills Central School District in the Rockefeller estate in New York. He earned a master's degree from Hunter College and later became the assistant administrator at the district, overseeing the expansion of the school and its integration in the 1970s. He received the annual humanitarian award from the local radio station.

Mr. Swenson retired in 1979 and moved with his wife to North Litchfield Beach. He was a member and lay reader at All Saints Church, where he also sang in the choir and helped start the preschool. He worked with Ruby Forsythe at Holy Cross Faith Memorial School, tutoring students and helping maintain the campus. It was during this time that he became involved with Dr. Smith, setting up a mobile home on the site that became what is now the Smith Medical Clinic.

After the death of his wife in 1986, Mr. Swenson married the former Greta A. Lindquist, a teacher in Santa Barbara, Calif., where they lived until her retirement. He worked in the facilities department at Westmont College in Santa Barbara. He was also involved in church missions that took him to Kenya and Nepal to build schools and built homes in the U.S.

The couple moved to Michigan, where Greta Swenson died in 2017. Mr. Swenson returned to the Pawleys Island area to live at the Lakes at Litchfield. His last building project was a model sailboat that he sailed in the lakes.

He is survived by his son, Charles R. Swenson (Squeaky), and grandson, Trevor E. Swenson, all of Pawleys Island; and several nieces and nephews.

# Dr. Cathcart Smith

Smith Medical Clinic was established in 1985 by Dr. Cathcart Smith and his wife Nancy in an 8-foot wide trailer with office and medical equipment from Dr. Smith's former medical office. Initially, Dr. Smith recruited five retired doctors and a dozen nurses to volunteer at the Clinic. This volunteer model has become a Smith Clinic tradition. Today, over 200 volunteers, aided by a small, part-time staff and financial support from our community, provide complete medical care for over 2,000 low-income, uninsured, Georgetown County residents a year for less than \$250 per patient per year.

"For years, I had suggested to many retirees who had come under my care that they should consider retiring to something rather than from something."
