Smith Medical Clinic was established in 1985 by Dr. Cathcart Smith and his wife Nancy in an 8-foot wide trailer with office and medical equipment from Dr. Smith's former medical office. Initially, Dr. Smith recruited five retired doctors and a dozen nurses to volunteer at the Clinic. This volunteer model has become a Smith Clinic tradition. Today, over 200 volunteers, aided by a small, part-time staff and financial support from our community, provide complete medical care for over 2,000 low-income, uninsured, Georgetown County residents a year for less than \$250 per patient per year.

THE DYNAMIC DU0

I just met one of Smith Medical Clinic's Dynamic Duos – Dr. Thomas and Betsy Buter – volunteers who treat SMC patients with orthopedic concerns. Dr. Buter is a recently retired orthopedic surgeon whose 35-year plus practice was in Charlotte, NC. His wife, Betsy, is a retired ICU and recovery room nurse. To-gether, they treat orthopedic patients one or two days a month at the Georgetown clinic location. They live in Charlotte half the time and either Georgetown or visiting grandchildren the other half.

Why would retired medical professionals choose to volunteer their time to the clinic? Isn't retirement the time to sit back and relax? Dr. Buter explains, "When you retire from an intense medical practice there's a void; you come to miss the challenge of troubleshooting in a fast-paced environment. Working at the clinic gives us the opportunity to keep our toes in the water, so to speak. From a spiritual angle, we feel lucky to have the opportunity to love on our patients and show them they are valued and cared for. When we work at the clinic we feel the hands of God on everyone there."

Dr. and Mrs. Buter have some observations they feel are worth sharing with anyone thinking about joining the volunteers at the clinic. For them, volunteering at SMC feels quite different than working in private practice. The patients are so appreciative for the care they receive. The volunteer determines the length of time they want to spend with each patient. For example, the Buter's volunteer 4 hours at a time and see 8 -12 patients in an unhurried personal session, allowing plenty of time to get to know each patient and prescribe therapy specific to their lifestyle and needs. When more than basic care is needed, the Buter's get additional assistance (i.e. x-rays, an MRI, surgery) through the Smith Clinic network. When physical movement is the best option, Betsy shows the patients exercises they can do on their own and/or sometimes patients are referred to the Georgetown YMCA who partners with SMC to provide memberships to patients. Sometimes patients are referred to physical therapy through the Tidelands Community Care Network, an important resource partner to the clinic. Given the number of patients in need, however, Betsy says that the clinic would really benefit from having some Physical Therapist volunteers onsite to treat patients, too!

For anyone thinking of becoming a volunteer provider, Dr. Buter said, "Practicing at the clinic is not intimidating at all. All that is required is a regular medical or volunteer license. The staff at the clinic makes it so easy to serve. We average one or two half days a month and have been so richly blessed. The few negatives (time, convenience...) are minimal when compared to the positives we receive." This dynamic duo, married for 49 years, always knew they were destined for service in the medical profession and feel blessed to have found a partnership with the Smith Clinic where they can continue to use the gifts God has blessed them with. They would be happy to talk with anyone thinking of becoming a volunteer and can be reached through the clinic.

A rising junior at UNC-Chapel Hill, Madeline Rieker has volunteered at the clinic since her senior year at Waccamaw High School. To gain more exposure to clinical medicine, Madeline took the initiative to become a Certified Nursing Assistant.
