





jewelry they bought, or even a trip they are taking or seeing their family," Carrols described.

Over the years, Painted Door Salon Studios has become the haven for all of Carrols' passions. Recently, she added another to her business' roof her love for animals.

This year, she noted that she began to research healthy all-natural treats for dogs. She contacted women who specialize in the field and who were licensed by their agriculture department to make them.

"I made my choice of the healthiest all-natural treats and set up a treat bar for guests who are in the studio to purchase treats for their pets. My mind is always working on how to expand on what I already have in

hen like-minded people come together with a shared vision, the possibilities of what they can conjure and achieve are limitless. Anna Rivera-Guthrie and Maggie Hernandez have set out on a mission to make luxury spec homes affordable in Artesia, N.M. and Las Cruces.

Their business, Inspiration Homes, was established three years ago by Rivera-Guthrie in Artesia. Rivera-Guthrie is no stranger to the construction business. She started in real estate in Albuquerque, N.M. in 2008. After she sold her first new-construction home, she had a realization that the process of selling

new rather than resale homes was for her. This led her to working with more builders. Rivera-Guthrie recalled that a builder moved her from Albuquerque to Las Cruces where she worked for eight years. After she met her husband, who was from Artesia, they moved back to his hometown

and decided to go into the building business themselves and created Inspiration Homes.

"Right now, our focus is more on a luxury spec home. Maggie and I go through starting from the floor plan all the way through design, all the way through construction. You could kind of say our motto has become, what would we do if this was our house?" Rivera-Guthrie, Artesia division manager, said.

Living by this motto and maintaining that mindset has helped Inspiration Homes stand out. Rivera-Guthrie explained that she and Hernandez make decisions not only in the color selection, but in where the best views are going to be for the home, where

will the client mount their TV or place their internet router?

"We're really just trying to take the time to make sure that everything just flows the way we would want it. And then from there, she and I, we go to El Paso, Texas. We go and we look at all the color sections and we will spend an entire day there, if not more,

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

just working on one house," Rivera-Guthrie began. "Going back and forth and back and forth pulling out all the different sections and putting stuff back, bringing it forward so we get where we're happy with it. Then we start the build process. We're both heavily involved in the construction"

This attention to detail is part of what sets their business apart. Inspiration Homes is women-run and operated, however, they do have a silent partner in Rivera-Guthrie's husband Jamie. Hernandez explained how being a women-led business is one of their strengths.

"For the most part it's Anna and I, even the realtors whom we deal with, there's a lot of women involved. I think you can definitely see that touch in the homes when you walk in. It's the attention to the small stuff that in the end, you wanna have a home that feels like a home. That's not just four walls. I think that essence of a woman is in those homes," Hernandez, Las Cruces division manager, said.

Hernandez joined Inspiration Homes in the last year when the company expanded to Las Cruces. She began working with Desert View Homes in 2016 and worked on utilities permits, went to the purchasing department and worked three years as an

operations manager.

"There's a lot of awesome women that I've met within the industry. They're strong and they're so smart. That's one of the things I want kids who are graduating high school to know. The sky's the limit and the limitations are those we place on ourselves," Hernandez said.

As a team, Hernandez and Rivera-Guthrie are able to be on site for their homes in Artesia and Las Cruces respectfully. However, they both do travel to each city to help each other. This hands-on approach allows for their clients to work directly with them and ensures there is

transparency and quality going into each build.

There are four floor plans for Inspiration Homes starting at 1,700 square feet and they currently go up to 2,300 square feet. They can also custom build as well.

In Las Cruces, they are building in Sonoma Ranch and have plans to start in Metro Verde. Rivera-Guthrie stated it was always the plan to expand to Las Cruces. Once Hernandez became her partner, it solidified the move. Both partners having had experience and connections in Las Cruces helped Inspiration Homes start up in the

"We are still getting started in Las

there and we have more under construction," Rivera-Guthrie said. "In Artesia, because of what we've been able to do and the relationships we've been able to build, we've been trying to help people. We have one lady that we're helping right now try to do some things to fix up her home. If we didn't have these trades, we wouldn't be able to give back like we are now. That's our hope in Las Cruces as well because we've been so blessed. We want to make sure that we take those blessings and be able to give to others as well."

INGREDIENTS:

4-5 mint leaves 1 oz fresh lime juice 4 blueberries 2 oz of coconut rum ¾ oz blueberry syrup Soda water

DIRECTIONS:

Muddle mint, blueberries and lime juice in shaker. Add coconut rum and syrup. Add ice to shaker and shake. Strain into Collin's glass, add ice and top the rest of with soda water. Garnish with a fresh mint leaf and a few blueberries.

INGREDIENTS:

1 can sweetened condensed milk

½ cup Nellie & Joe's key lime juice

1 block (8 oz) full fat cream cheese

1 graham cracker crust

DIRECTIONS:

Let the cream cheese get to at least room temperature; a little on the warmer side is fine. Using your mixer place cream cheese in bowl and begin beating. Beat the cream cheese until smooth, add the sweetened condensed milk and the lime juice. This recipe calls for rotating between both the milk and juice. I prefer dumping one in, then the other in. Now set the timer and beat it until smooth for




at least 10 minutes - this is the secret. After beating, pour the mixture into crust and freeze.

SERVING NOTES:

It will never completely freeze because of the sugar content in the milk. Do not refrigerate because it becomes soupy. It pairs

excellently with homemade whipped cream. You can make this recipe vegan down to the whipped cream. Gluten free graham crackers are available at Natural Grocers. I always make the crust and use salted butter. I prefer that additional break in the sweetness.





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

















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
