Spring Refresh By Sarah Boothe

s the warm desert winds of Southern New Mexico usher in Lthe spring season, homeowners and businesses are eager to embrace the opportunity for transformation. influences, drawing from both traditional and modern aesthetics. "I love the Santa Fe style, but I also love modern design. 

TRAILS END and beyond By Sylvia Quintanilla

ary Biel has a vision for the art district in Las Cruces. Biel, who is an artist himself, owns Trails End Gallery, located at 1732 N. Mesquite St. He recently purchased more property in the Mesquite Historic District with the intent to expand and improve

Biel is a former landscaper who began painting after he was diagnosed with a brain tumor. His father had a plumbing business in the building previously, which Biel then transformed into a gallery that breathed new life into the structure.

"That building next door [the gallery] - that was a house. My dad added this on as a shop," Biel began. "This is all one big room. It was a plumbing shop. Then I turned it into my landscaping shop. We had the pipe in here for sprinklers. And then, when I started getting sick and started doing art, I started building all this [the art studios]. So, it's evolved, and I think it's improved. That's my vision for Mesquite Street, is to make it better. Not to change it, but to make it improve and preserve what's here; take those old buildings, make them the best they can be."

Trails End Gallery is home to several artists, including Penny Simpson and C.C. Cunningham, whose artwork can be found in the various rooms of the gallery. In Simpson's room, the walls are adorned with her still life watercolors of fruits, green chile, florals, and even local wine. Cunningham has vibrant and modern art in her room, which is located just to the left of the gallery's entrance.

In addition to having their work on display, multiple artists have a studio in the space

where they can create - like Robert Highsmith, who paints in watercolors and acrylics, and recently began using oil paints again. Highsmith has a series of paintings depicting Stahmann Farms throughout the seasons. Armando Garcia is a jeweler who not only works with silver and turquoise but can also repair jewelry. Fiber artist Svea Peterson is a felter from Stockholm, Sweden. Peterson knows several Indigenous people who limit shaving their sheep to once a year so she can use their wool without causing harm to the animals. She makes table runners, bags, cat houses, scarves, and more. Biel also has his own studio space. He paints in acrylics, drawing much of his inspiration from desert landscapes and agriculture of the Southwest.

There are two other art galleries on North Mesquite that join Trails End: Gallery 925 and Unsettled Gallery and Studio. With the new properties, Biel is passionate about helping reverse the negative reputation of Mesquite Street and preserving it for generations to come.

Biel has deep roots in Las Cruces. He noted that his aunt founded the historic district and his great-great-grandfather, Pablo Melendres, drew the lines where Las Cruces was to be built. With this new venture, Biel hopes to one day see the area as the Camino Real Art District.

Two blocks down from Trails End at 1747 N. Mesquite St. is an old adobe house that was once rock-faced. The building is easily identifiable by the massive Italian Cypress tree outside. Biel said he is in talks with interested parties who may turn the space into a co-op gallery. With this idea, artists would not only have their

Recipe

Coconut Shrimp

INGREDIENTS

1/3 cup all-purpose flour or whole wheat flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

2 large eggs, beaten

3/4 cup Panko breadcrumbs or Italian breadcrumbs 1 cup sweetened or unsweetened shredded coconut

1 pound raw large shrimp, peeled and deveined with tails attached

1-2 cups vegetable oil, coconut oil, or olive oil (or until a medium skillet/pot is filled to ½-1 inch in depth)

Optional for topping: 1 tablespoon finely chopped cilantro

DIRECTIONS

Start with 3 medium bowls. Combine flour, salt, and pepper in one bowl. Beat the eggs in the second bowl. Combine breadcrumbs and coconut in the third bowl.

Dip the shrimp into the flour, then into the eggs, and then dredge the shrimp in the coconut mixture, pressing gently to adhere. You want a lot of coconut on each shrimp. Set the coated shrimp aside on a rack or plate as you coat the remaining shrimp.

Add enough oil to cover the bottom of a large skillet over medium heat and bring to 350 degrees; a candy thermometer works great to monitor the temperature. Fry the coconut shrimp in batches of 5-6 shrimp at a time – but do not crowd them in the pan. Flip after 2 minutes and fry the other side for 2 minutes or until golden brown.

Place the finished coconut shrimp on a plate lined with a paper towel as you fry the rest. Sprinkle with finely chopped cilantro. Mix dipping sauce ingredients together and serve with shrimp.

Serve alongside a cabbage-based slaw with a light dressing.

Cover and store leftover shrimp in the refrigerator for up to 3 days.



SERVING SAUCE (optional)

3 tablespoons Thai chili sauce

6 tablespoons orange, peach, or apricot jam/preserves *If you don't have Thai chili sauce, a healthy dose of rice vinegar added to the preserves works well!

work on display, but they would be able to work in the gallery, as well.

Another adobe home Biel will be working

on is nearby at 1447 N. Mesquite St. He said while it already has a new roof, two rooms, a bathroom, and a kitchen, he will continue to work on making sure the building is comfortable for new tenants.

Biel's hopes for the properties are mainly centered around art, but he remarked that a coffee shop or ice cream parlor would fit in nicely for art lovers.




