USCG-ATC was the host of the February meeting, taking 40 individuals on a personal tour of the Coast Guard Training Center.

SAVC was honored to have Chief Paul O. Prine speak. Prine has been the City of Mobile Chief of Police since November 12, 2021.

Twenty-twenty-four will be another exciting year for Vets Recovery: On Monday, May 15, 2023 Veterans Recovery Resources announced that it will be rebranded as Vets Recover - Transforming the Culture of Care. We will continue to offer the same expert level of care for mental and physical health.

We accomplished a lot:

Planned and executed events such as Memorial and Veterans Day activities, Armed Forces Day & Blue Star Salute, POW/MIA Candlelight Ceremony, Flags of Glory, conducted 11 monthly meetings and newsletters to over 550 members, participated in Veterans Seminars and meetings, etc.

We are looking forward to 2024 planning and participating in all the Veteran Annual Events, and bringing our Veteran's information and news to help improve their day-to-day life.

In August We heard from Judge Windom on the Veteran Treatment Court. We attended the initial opening of the court on 25 August and it was a total success.

We also heard from Chief Jason Lewis about his career in the Navy and his local community support. During the meeting, we heard from Elbert Winfield, Veteran and owner of Saucy Q's, and we temporarily resolved our breakfast situation. Charlie Wilson, Medicare Specialist, and two other organizations offered to provide breakfast in September, October, and November--thanks to all.

We said goodbye to Captain Chris Hulser and welcomed USCG – ATC Mobile, AL Commanding Officer: Captain Scott E. Lugo.

Captain Lugo assumed command of the Coast Guard's Aviation Training Center in April 2023 and is responsible for all aspects of Coast Guard pilot and aircrew training, including the standardization for 26 air stations and 43 flight deck-equipped Coast Guard cutters, the development of Coast Guard aviation capabilities, and an operational element that provides disaster surge response and 24/7 a fixed-wing operational response and for America's Gulf Coast.

We supported the Traveling Vietnam Wall on 12-15 October at Serenity Funeral Home.

Twenty-three was a good year for SAVC and we have covered just a few of the things we have accomplished this past year.

A veteran and POW from WWII, he went on to graduate from Purdue University. He was an active member of the American EX-POWS, and South Alabama Veterans Council, among many other veteran organizations.

COL Bob Barefield enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1968 as an 11B Infantryman and retired at the rank of Colonel after 30 years of service. He also served in Vietnam. His other assignments included the invasion of Cambodia with the 1st Cavalry Division, commanding the 1st Battalion, 508th Airborne in Panama leading up to Operation Just Cause and last commanding the 5th Brigade, U.S. Army Cadet Command.

Barefield is a highly decorated veteran holding the Combat Infantryman Badge, Expert Infantryman Badge, Ranger Tab, Army Aviation Wings, Master Parachutist Badge and Pathfinder Badge, Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal with "V," Bronze Star Medal (third award), Purple Heart (fifth award), Meritorious Service Medal (seventh award), Air Medal and Army Commendation Medal with "V."

Edward Philip Evans, US Army Retired 95, born May 14, 1928, in Seminole, AL to Edward B. & Pauline Mary Burke Evans, passed away December 26, 2023.

He joined the United States Army in September 1948 retiring as a 1st Lt. USAR, Command Sargent Major on October 1968. He is a Korean War survivor. He served 3 tours of duty in Korea. He received the Bronze Star Medal with V Device for Valor Medal, Purple Heart Medal, Combat Infantry Badge, Army Commendation Medal, Army Good Conduct Medal, Army Occupation Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Korean Service Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, United Nations Service Medal, Rok War Service Medal, Korean Defense Service Medal throughout his service to our country.

He was a member of the DAV Chapter 45, Purple
Heart Chapter 2206, VFW Chapter 5658, American
Legion Post 99. He had the honor of being selected as
the 2021 Alabama Purple Heart Patriot of the Year
with a seven-day trip to New York, Purple Heart
Museum, Ground Zero, and West Point.
He had the honor of making all the municipalities in
Baldwin County into Purple Heart Communities.
He was a Board Member for the Alabama State
Veterans Memorial Cemetery in Spanish Fort, AL

Marvin Roland Carpenter, age 97, was born November 21, 1926, in Kiln, Mississippi, and departed this life on December 24, 2023. At the early age of 16, Marvin joined the US Coast Guard during World War II and participated in four invasions, including D-Day at Normandy. After the war, he continued to serve in the Coast Guard until he retired as a Master Chief with 26 years of service. Upon retirement, Marvin and his wife Carolyn, son, and three daughters settled in Mobile, Alabama, where he would live for the rest of his life.

REMEMBER THE BULGE - 79th ANNIVERSARY

The Battle of the Bulge, also known as the Ardennes Offensive, was the last major German offensive campaign on the Western Front during World War II. The battle lasted for five weeks from 16 December 1944 to 28 January 1945, toward the end of the war in Europe.

What happened at the Battle of Bulge?

The Battle of the Bulge marked the last German offense on the Western Front. The catastrophic losses on the German side prevented Germany from resisting the advance of Allied forces following the Normandy Invasion. Less than four months after the end of the Battle of the Bulge, Germany surrendered to Allied forces.

How many Americans died in the Battle of the Bulge?

19,000 men

Soldiers fought in brutal winter conditions, and the U.S. Army lost approximately 19,000 men (and suffered some 75,000 total casualties) in what became the United States' deadliest single World War II battle.

Amid recruiting woes, active-duty end strength to drop again in 2024

The <u>smallest U.S. military force in more than 80 years</u> is about to get even smaller.

Under end strength levels outlined in the <u>annual defense authorization bill</u> passed by the Senate Wednesday evening and expected to be passed by the House on Thursday, the total number of active-duty troops in the armed forces will drop to 1,284,500 in fiscal 2024. That's down nearly 64,000 personnel in the last three years and the smallest total for America's military since 1940, before the United States' entry into World War II.

What are the new VA benefits for 2024?

Disabled veterans with a current VA disability rating of 10% or higher will receive a 3.2% increase in their VA disability pay rate for calendar year 2024. For example, a veteran rated 100% with no dependents receiving \$3,621.95 in 2023 will begin receiving \$3,737.85 in 2024 due to the 3.2% COLA increase.

CLAIMS REPRESENTATION AND COUNSELING

Veterans Service Offices

The Alabama Department of Veterans Affairs (ADVA) has veterans service offices located in 60 counties throughout the State of Alabama. The primary function of the ADVA service offices is to assist veterans, their dependents, and survivors in the application and processing of claims for benefits and entitlements available from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the benefits provided for veterans by law from the State of Alabama earned by honorable service in the armed forces of the United States.

Services include processing compensation and pension applications; appealing VA decisions; filing for survivors' death benefits; applying for aid and attendance and housebound benefits; certification of claim documents; requesting for military service records; upgrading military discharges; applying for special veteran license plates.

ADVA veterans service officers are accredited to perform claims actions by nationally chartered veterans service organizations including the American Legion, American Ex-Prisoners of War, Fleet Reserve Association, and Blinded Veterans Association.

The Fifth And Final

Project Stage Teakdecking Systems Of USS ALABAMA's Teak Deck Replacement Project Starts In January 2024.

The onset of the new year at USS ALABAMA Battleship Memorial Park marks a significant milestone: the completion of the teak deck replacement project. In a monumental effort to preserve the rich history of the WWII battleship, USS

ALABAMA Battleship Memorial Park is on the brink of completing its three-year, \$8.5 million teak deck replacement project. The decision to replace the over-80-year-old teak deck was not taken lightly. The balance between maintaining historical authenticity and safeguarding the ship's future was carefully considered. The park's Deputy Executive Director, LTC Ebb Counts, (USA Ret.) stated, "When we started on this deck replacement project, in October 2021, there were a couple of things that came as a surprise to me. First and foremost, the level of public interest and support has been phenomenal. Folks have followed the progress of the project on social media and financially supported the project through donations and the purchase of items crafted from the salvageable teak planks."

In June of 2023, teak sales began. Since then, USS ALABAMA Battleship Memorial Park's gift shop has sold many items including coasters, plaques, pens, unfinished planks and more all made from the original teak deck of the USS ALABAMA.

Proceeds from the teak sales go toward the funding of the project.

The USS ALABAMA Battleship Commission anticipates that the project will be completed earlier than projected. Park Executive Director MG Janet Cobb, USA (Ret.), notes that the project's meaning extends beyond the physical aspects of the USS ALABAMA. "The work reflects the preservation of WWII naval history. It is a tribute to more than 6,000 crewmen who served aboard the "Mighty A" during her years of service."

The fifth and final project stage starts in January 2024.
