

HOW TO PROPERLY DISPLAY MIITARY BRANCH FLAGS

Just as the U.S. military forces conduct themselves in an orderly fashion, so too does a military flag display follow a strict set of rules and order. When flags from each military branch are carried in a horizontal line formation during a parade or flown from a fiveflagpole display, the flags must be flown in a certain order. The proper military flag order was prescribed on October 31, 1977, by the <u>U.S. Department of Defense</u> <u>Directive 1005.8.</u>

It states that from left to right, the prescribed peacetime military branch flag order is: <u>Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force</u> and <u>Coast Guard</u>.

The Directive's prescribed flag-flying order mirrors the order in which each military branch was created, with the lone exception of the Coast Guard. While the Coast Guard is technically the fourth oldest military service branch, with its origins pre-dating that of the Air Force by 157 years, the Coast Guard is excluded from this date-of-origin or "birthday" rule. This exception is due to the fact that during peacetime, the Coast Guard falls under the auspices of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security rather than the Department of Defense. During times of war, the Coast Guard typically shifts its reporting structure from the Department of Homeland Security to the Department of Defense. When this transition occurs, so does the prescribed placement order of the Coast Guard flag. During wartime, the Coast Guard flag must be moved from the farthest right position to second from the right, between the Navy flag and the Air Force flag.

With the addition of the Space Force military branch and flag, there has been some confusion in the direction from the military about the placement of the new Space Force flag. On August 18, 2020, <u>Air Force Instruction 34-1201 documentation</u> stated, "2.22.6 When displayed with departmental flags of other United States military services, precedence is as follows: Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard and Space Force." Yet, in official Space Force event photos and at national events, such as the Super Bowl, the Space Force flag was placed between the Air Force and the Coast Guard flags in their military flag displays.

Adding Other Flags into the Display Mix

When military branch flags are flown in conjunction with the American flag and/or a state flag, the prescribed peacetime flag order is, from left to right: U.S. flag, State flag, Army flag, Marine Corps flag, Navy flag, Air Force flag, Space Force flag and Coast Guard flag. During wartime, the Coast Guard flag should be moved between the Navy and Air Force flags. When the POW/MIA flag is added to the display mix, it should be flown to the right of either the U.S. flag and/or a state flag and to the left of the flags of the U.S. military branches

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How to Properly Display Military Branch Flags | Carrot-Top Industries

Before 1956, the U.S. Army was the only branch of the Armed Services without a flag to represent it as a unit in joint service ceremonies. Based on this need, several designs were developed, and the Secretary of the Army Wilber Brucker selected the design as you see it today. The U.S. Army flag was officially adopted by President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1956. With a white background and a blue rendering of the official seal of the U.S. Army, this military flag is classic and recognizable. The seal on the U.S. Army flag goes back to the American Revolution, when it was used to authenticate documents from what was then called the War Office. It bears the year of the Army's establishment in 1775 and a rattlesnake (hearkening back to the "Don't Tread on Me" rattlesnake) holding a scroll with the words "This We'll Defend" in its mouth. Also included in the seal are a Revolutionary War American Flag, a Roman cuirass, a musket, a cannon, a snare drum, mortar and two bomb shells. The US Army flag is to be displayed first of the American Services Flags in honor of the Army's precedence in creation (it was the first service branch created by the United States Government).

As a bit of related military branch trivia, below are the birthdays of each U.S. military branch:



Joe, 80, passed away on Friday, December 25, 2020 at his nephew's home in Charlotte, NC.

He was with his nephew and was under the care of hospice. Born October 17th, 1940, he was the son of the late James McCormack, Sr. and Una McAuley

McCormack. Joe graduated from Northeast Catholic high school in Philadelphia and served 20

years in the Air Force, including 10 months in Vietnam. After leaving the Air Force, Joe became the Marshall for the town of Blue River, CO until 1986. Day of the Deployed

Day of the Deployed is a day to honor our deployed troops and their families for their bravery and the sacrifices they are making for our country. Supporters of the military are urged to get personally involved in activities that send care packages, offer messages of encouragement, and other morale-boosting activities to those currently deployed overseas and the military families of the deployed.

Day of the Deployed will be observed on Wednesday, Oct. 26, 2022.

History of Day Of The Deployed

In 2006, then-governor of North Dakota John Hoeven was approached by a constituent, Shelle Michaels Aberle, to have a day that honored the deployed. The inspiration was her cousin, LTC David Hosna, who at the time was deployed to Iraq. Former Govenor John Hoeven initiated a move for a State of North Dakota proclamation that Oct. 26th, David Hosna's birthday, would be recognized as Day Of The Deployed. Following that state recognition, the first-ever Day Of The Deployed event was held in Grand Forks, North Dakota, (the home of Grand Forks Air Force Base) honoring local units deployed to Afghanistan.

Only four years went by before most states had some form of recognition of the holiday. While Day Of The Deployed is not treated like a state holiday with facility closures and time off from work, it is celebrated much in the same fashion as <u>POW/MIA Day</u>, with ceremonies by private and public institutions to honor those in uniform. Today, all 50 states recognize Oct. 26 in some fashion.



VA caregiver benefits expand to all vets on Oct. 1

Veterans of all eras will be eligible for caregiver benefits starting Oct. 1, an expansion that is expected to add thousands of families to the program in the next year.

The move was originally scheduled to take place in 2020 but had been delayed two years as officials refined processing and support for the program. Currently, only veterans who served before May 1975 or after September 2001 are eligible for the benefits.
