Award Criteria:

1. The purpose of the Mobile Bay Area Veteran of the Year Award is to recognize a living Mobile Bay Area veteran who has not only served his/her country in an outstanding manner, but has used the leadership skills and abilities learned in the service to our Nation to improve the community through selfless volunteer service to the Mobile Bay Area.

Must be a resident of the Mobile Bay Area, 2. which includes Mobile and Baldwin Counties of Alabama.

3. Must be a living veteran of one of the six armed forces of the United States, including Reserve and National Guard, or the United Sates Merchant Marine.

May be awarded for a single act or for 4. continuous service.

5. May not be a previous recipient of the Mobile Bay Veteran of the Year Award.

6. A DD-214 or other proof of service must be submitted with the nomination packet.

The award will be presented at the Honors Luncheon at Fort Whiting National Guard Armory on Veterans Day, Friday, November 11, 2022.

The nomination will be valid for three years.

Korean War Veterans Memorial

Wall of Remembrance Dedication Ceremony

On Wednesday, July 27, 2022 the Korean War Veterans Memorial Foundation hosted the Korean War Veterans Memorial Wall of Remembrance Dedication Ceremony.

The Wall of Remembrance will be a new focal point at the Korean War Veterans Memorial — a remembrance wall featuring the names of more than 36,000 Americans who died supporting the War and over 7,100 Koreans who died while augmenting the Army.

Why are there different numbers of soldier statues at the Korean War memorial?

The statues **represent the different branches of the military, Army, Air Force, Navy and Marines**. On a sunny day you can see the reflection on the wall of the 19 statues. If you count the 19 statues and the reflections on the wall you get 38. The 38th parallel is the demilitarize zone.

How many US citizens died in Korean War?

Almost 40,000 Americans died in action in Korea, and more than 100,000 were wounded. Was Pork Chop Hill North or South Korea?

Was Pork Chop Hill North or South Korea?

With the final signing of the armistice agreement at Panmunjom on July 27, 1953, Pork Chop Hill became part of the demilitarized zone between **North and South Korea**. It has since become a symbol, both positive and negative, of a controversial war. How did the Korean War end?

After three years of a bloody and frustrating war, the United States, the People's Republic of China, North Korea, and South Korea agree to **an armistice**, bringing the fighting of the Korean War to an end. The armistice ended America's first experiment with the Cold War concept of "limited war."

The Carey Gold Star Family - attended the Korean War Memorial "Wall of Remembrance" dedication in D.C.



On July 27th, in Washington DC, Col Steve Carey, with his brother Col Tim Carey and daughter Camille, attended the Korean War Memorial "Wall of Remembrance" dedication as a Gold Star Family honoring their uncle, Lt James Desmond Carey, who was shot down as an F-86 pilot in the 334th Fighter Squadron in 1952.

Lt James Carey never returned home, but this wall with his name engraved gave our nation a chance to honor his sacrifice. Steve's father commanded the 334th Fighter Squadron and deployed the first F-86s to Korea in the summer of 1950. Two years later, his younger brother, Lt James Carey, deployed and flew out of the same squadron defending the Korean Peninsula. Lt James Carey was part of a family legacy of aviators who flew in World War II, Korea, Vietnam, and the Gulf War. Lt Carey left behind his wife and a new baby boy that he never had a chance to meet. The Carey sons continued their family's Air Force tradition and someday hope to bring their uncle home.

VFW Elects First Iraq War Veteran to Lead Organization

When it comes to recruiting and retention, 'Every Veteran Counts!'


KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Timothy M. Borland, of Benson, Arizona, was elected today as the new national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), a congressionally chartered veterans service organization comprised of more than 1 million eligible veterans and military service members from all six branches of the armed forces.

"My slogan this year is 'Every Veteran Counts," said Borland. "It's our service to country, and courage to defend that country that makes us veterans. Every veteran from every war and conflict is important."

Borland's election as the VFW's 114th Commander-in-Chief occurred at the conclusion of the organization's 123rd national convention in Kansas City, Missouri. The gathering was the first full national convention since 2019. During his acceptance speech, Borland urged the members both attending in person and watching via live-streaming video, to welcome the new generation of veterans eligible for membership in the VFW, noting the significance of his election.

"There's a new wave of veterans that have returned home from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan and they're ready, willing and waiting to join our ranks. One of those veterans is standing right here behind this podium," said Borland, referring to himself. "I am an Iraq War veteran and very proud to be the first as your Commander-in-Chief."



Since May 1, 2013, Alabama veterans have had the option of displaying proof of military service on their driver licenses.

To establish proof of service, a veteran must visit one of the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency's Driver License examining offices, a license commissioner's office or probate office, and present a DD-214 form from the U.S. Department of Defense that shows an "honorable" or "general under honorable conditions" status.

There is no additional charge for the veteran designation for a first-time driver license applicant or for an individual seeking to renew his or her license. A veteran who chooses to add the designation before his or her renewal date, however, must pay the standard fee for a duplicate license.



New 988 number for mental health crises has launched

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (WSFA) - A new three-digit number that connects callers directly to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline will go online Saturday.

The line will connect callers to trained counselors who will listen, provide support, and work to understand the mental health problems these callers are experiencing, and connect them to resources.

It's no secret that people with mental illness don't get the help they need when they experience a crisis. The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline has proven effective since its establishment in 2005. The threedigit number 988, similar to 911, will make it even easier for folks across the country to connect with help near them.

The Lifeline has a network of counselors at local crisis centers who answer the contacts the Lifeline receives every day. Numerous studies have shown that callers feel less suicidal, less depressed, less overwhelmed, and more hopeful after speaking with a Lifeline counselor.

It allows grant cemeteries such as the cemetery in Spanish Fort:

PUBLIC LAW 117-103 THE CONSOLIDATED APPROPRIATIONS ACT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022 (Burial Equity for Guards and Reserves Act)

NCA Notice 2022-04 Public Law 117-103-Burial Equity (va.gov)

- Any member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces who was discharged or released from service under conditions other than dishonorable or whose death occurs under conditions other than dishonorable while a member of the reserve component.
- Any member of the Army National Guard or the Air National Guard who was discharged or released from service under conditions other than dishonorable or whose death occurs under conditions other than dishonorable whose death occurs under conditions other than dishonorable while a member of the Army National Guard or the Air National Guard.
- Any member of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) of the Army, Navy, or Air Force whose death occurs under conditions other than dishonorable while a member of the ROTC.
- Any spouse of any member described above.
- Any minor child or unmarried adult child (as defined in 2402(a) of Title 38) of the above individuals.

On a recent Monday morning, the citizens of Kanawha County, West Virginia, came to check out a new chapter in the life of an old institution. After more than two years and \$32 million in renovations, <u>downtown Charleston's public</u> <u>library</u> reopened to the public – less a warehouse of books, and more a marketplaces of ideas.

Inside, visitors discovered a brand-new cafe, a tool-lending library, and an "idea lab" full of the latest technology. From podcasting booths to computerized sewing machines to augmented reality screens, the facility has been updated for the modern age.

There was an excitement you could see AND hear – which is exactly what the librarians were hoping for. Erika Connelly, director of the Kanawha County Library, said, "Librarians from time immemorial, like, you're 'Shh'!"

The library was officially reopened to the public in May 2022 following a <u>\$32 million renovation</u>, more than a decade after plans first originated to rebuild or renovate the library. The multi-floor branch now includes 20,000 square feet of new space and a Sky Bridge across Quarrier Street.

When Saddam Hussein ordered the invasion of Kuwait, the Marines were one of the first units to respond. By Feb. 23, 1991, I Marine Expeditionary Force was controlling two reinforced Marine Divisions poised to strike Iraqi forces in Kuwait.

The 100-hour ground war cost the Marines five killed and 48 wounded. In that time, they fought over 100 miles through occupied territory, crushed seven Iraqi divisions, destroyed over 1,600 tanks and armored vehicles, and took over 22,000 prisoners.


Medal of Honor recipient Gary Wetzel, a Legion Rider from Post 434, will greet riders at their final stop and join them in closing ceremonies. Legacy Run participants are then invited to participate in a bike night outside the nearby Harley-Davidson Museum campus.

Money raised prior to and during the Legacy Run benefits the American Legion Legacy Scholarship Fund, which provides college scholarships to the children of U.S. military personnel killed on active duty on or after 9/11, as well as children of post-9/11 veterans with a combined VA disability rating of 50% or greater. The 2021 Legacy Run raised \$11 milion, bringing the total raised for the Legacy Fund since 2006 to more than \$15 million. - Steven B. Brooks
